Leadership, loyalty and service....

Whether you've been a Lion for 35 years or 3 weeks, we all are confronted in our own clubs with the dynamics of effective and less than effective leadership styles that often predicate the success of our efforts in service to our communities.

LCI feels so strongly about growing and helping new (and seasoned) leaders that each year the 'leadership' forums expand the number of classes offered at annual forums, on-line, at multiple district, district and zone levels as well as the Lions University to help us all learn more and polish our leadership skills.

So, who is a leader? More pointedly, what is leadership? What kinds of leadership will work at the club and district levels to move our organization forward and not stagnate as many other organizations have experienced? Designated 'leaders' are our elected officers, appointed committee chairpersons and board members – those presumed to be accountable. That's just the tip of the iceberg. There are the undesignated leaders, those non-elected, non-appointed Lions who are also leaders who influence and make things happen or not with voices of concurrence, support, or ambivalence, the voice listened to and actions taken. Leaders lead people – managers manage things – Lions are leaders in Service.

There's another "L" word – loyalty. Because we elect our leaders each year, we often don't realize nor understand the totality of the responsibilities associated with a particular position. Some of us joined Lions not realizing the scope of commitment that is required when

accepting a leadership position. Rather than question, some Lions take up a position often supplied by an undesignated leader and then parrot an opinion derived from another Lion who may not be as loyal to the leadership goals of the current leader. Bottom line: Progress happens when everyone is pulling on the same end of the rope – perception is reality. Use the tools available on our e-district and also LCI's website to learn.

If Lions leaders (designated and undesignated) are loyal to the Lions Code of Ethics and promote the initiatives of our elected leaders (LCI, MD, district and club), we ALL look good to the public. Positive words about our clubs and the service that our clubs perform for our communities creates opportunities to invite and include other like-minded potential Lions. Get the facts straight first and then publicize what we do.

21-B Lions Clubs are each unique but supposedly all on the same page about service. If we engage in conversations with potential recruits to discover their passions and share the stories about our clubs' service, about our impact locally, statewide and globally, we will often find an opening for another conversation for an invitation to join us – giving us more hands with more heart for more service. We just need to ask. Let's all talk about the Centennial Service and Legacy Challenge and invite and engage those who wish to be part of our success for the next 100 years!

ROUND OUT YOUR CENTENNIAL PROJECTS WITH YOUTH

If your club is looking for a youth project that is manageable and yields immediate results, perhaps a Shoe Party is the way to go.

Schools are a great way to find a need and a partner to help fill that need. Most schools have a parent volunteer, outreach person or a coach that can help you determine how you can help. We approached our local school district and offered our assistance and together we came up with the shoe idea. We then partnered with a local Payless shoe store to organize the event and we chose a date and time during non-working hours to have it.

The school knew who the children were who needed new shoes, they took care of necessary parent permissions and organized transportation to the event, and allowed parents to attend. Store personnel were on hand to measure shoe sizes and help out and Lions were present to assist children in making appropriate choices and participate in the program. Of course, photos were taken, with proper permissions.

We found that a \$30 per child budget yielded a pair of shoes and some socks and a little change. We took our change in the form of \$30 gift cards which were then given to the school for use on an as needed basis. A word of caution, pre-paid cards are like cash and once handed out could be used by a parent or older sibling, so once again, working with the schools insures a degree of confidence.

We found that for about 10 hours of organization time and a \$600 budget we were able to complete a worthwhile project that involved Lions, kids, parents, school personnel and helped out 20 families. The school took photos and posted them in their Newsletter and Facebook Page, so we were visible and set the stage for further projects with this school.

Greetings from your 21 B District Energizer Bunny, Lion Gary Gjerstad

It's great being able to share a positive message with you. I missed one in January, so I ask your forgiveness. Between my involvement with Britt Lions, & the West Hancock high school pep band, things have been a little busy.

Let's talk Lions. On January 5, I was the program for the Britt Lions Club. This came about, because the fellow who was supposed to line up the program, didn't have one. Open one's mouth & volunteer, then chances are, what you volunteer for will be accepted.

My presentation centered on talking about my life, where I attended school, the happenings in my adult life, including my years in Arizona, & so on. I then spoke of my role as the information officer for the club. I felt that before any publicity could be done for a specific endeavor, the specific publications/radio station had to be contacted. It's a unique approach perhaps, but I felt it necessary. I explained who I was, that I was totally blind, that I had just moved back to Britt after spending 14 years in Arizona. I indicated that I was publicity Chairman for our Lions Club, & would appreciate any assistance they could provide in promoting our events. In all cases, the response was positive.

This past Friday night, our Lions Club served smoked pork loin sandwiches in conjunction with the Britt West Hancock, Forrest City basketball games. Money raised goes for improvements at our Lions Park Shelter. Last year, our club netted \$1,000. I'm elated to report that after expenses, we netted \$1155. I received the information for this from our club secretary on Saturday, January 16. By January 19, I had all of the info sent to all of my contacts I had communicated with earlier. K10W, a radio station in Forrest City, started airing this public service announcement, the morning of January 22. It was aired for a week. As if that weren't enough, the announcement was put on their website.

This is the beauty of being back in a small community. People came in groves; not only to support the basketball teams, but to support our cause as well. It truly made for a wonderful night. We're small in numbers, but as I heard someone say once, we're giants among many. We did ourselves proud.

For anyone who lived & spent winters in the Midwest, I can share that as of this writing, we're bracing for winter storm activity. We're expecting anywhere from 8 to 15 inches of the white stuff. & the winds? The radio is saying they could be anywhere from 30 to 45 miles an hour. Blizzard conditions with white-outs. Visibility will be a problem. It won't be a problem for the energizer bunny. I can simply say to people, "Welcome to my world!" With that, I'll write again in a couple of weeks.





Nominating committee time is here

"Volunteering is the ultimate exercise in democracy. You vote in

elections once a year, but when you volunteer, you vote every day about the kind of community you want to live in." Unknown

Volunteers are an interesting group in any setting with differing backgrounds and motivations. There are all kinds of involvement and interest based upon all the other responsibilities of family, business, and other commitments.

It's time for the nominating committees to prepare the slate of candidates for election of next year's officers. Lions will vote to determine the next leaders for each club. The results of the election of the new slate of officers can definitely change the direction of the club's success and progression.



Before tackling that project, this current clubs' leadership might consider a practice of one of our district clubs. While sponsors 'sell' the concept of Lionism and an orientation session educates the new member, their membership committee interviews new members about their desires to serve on existing committees. After all, we're Lions wanting to make a difference, and have a good time, too. Contact information, professional backgrounds, and particular skills are also catalogued. The team re-interviews each member a few years later to update the member's status regarding changes in physical capabilities or enhanced or changed interests in desired areas of service. Does the member have a new passion for service for an unmet need that the club could consider adopting?

Some members take 'ownership' of particular service projects and seemingly reject efforts to participate in any other or newer opportunities for service. Sometimes small special interest groups seem to develop a pattern of what may appear to prohibit inclusion for other members – 'that's XXX's project and he/she thinks that he/she is the only one who can do it'. Dissension can easily develop among those 'outside' creating a 'less than' feeling as a new or contributing Lion. Club leadership styles are critical to creating harmony among all volunteers – after all, we're all about service to our communities, not bickering and narcissism.

LCI encourages club members to complete surveys that hope to capture the current 'temperature' of attitudes and expectations about individual clubs and hopes and expectations about the future direction of Lions worldwide. The current membership team might consider canvassing members about their current expectations for their participation in the club when preparing the slate of potential officers and their desire (and capability) to be in leadership positions.

- Is the club an active service club with enough members for the scope of projects?
- Is the club evolving into more of a social club? Need to change meeting time and/or place?
- Are there too many service projects and the club needs to redefine and re-focus its efforts or perhaps start a branch club for a special purpose club?
- Would the member like to take on a club office? (Some members just want to be asked.)

There are the elected/appointed leaders in each club and there's also the unelected leaders who influence the direction of each club. Sometimes a Lion will accept an office "because no one else would take it" or because of a perception of implied prestige about 'being on the board' when in fact they are unaware of the scope of the associated duties. This factor can possibly sabotage club growth because of the officer's attitude and commitment to duties.

Perhaps there are members who want a chance to step into a leadership role. Let's review the general scope of responsibilities of each office of the Board of Directors:



President -

Presides at meetings of the club and the Board of Directors. Required by LCI. Serves as the club's CEO. The president advises the club secretary about the club agenda, both officers serve on the advisory board for the District Governor.

Vice President – (can be 1st, 2nd and/or 3rd) – LCI recommends these offices are filled. Performs the duties of the President when that officer is unable to attend or perform. Serve as committee chairmen for service projects.

Treasurer - Serves as the club's Chief Financial Officer. Receives funds from the club secretary for both bank accounts, Administrative for club only expenses (dues, PO Box rent, club supplies) and Service for all funds raised from the public and dispenses payment at the direction of the Board of Directors. Required by LCI, (can be a Secretary/Treasurer for small clubs.)

Secretary - Functions as the club's business manager. LCI requires this office be filled. Serves as the point of contact with LCI and district officers. Reports to the club president and Board of Directors. Receives all funds for the club and turns them over to the club Treasurer. Makes required monthly membership and activity reports to LCI and district. Prepares the agenda for meetings, records the minutes of the club and board meetings, maintains club records, receives correspondence and maintains and updates the club roster for the *Canyon State Lion*, and records of attendance. Some larger clubs have co-secretaries who split the functions of recording secretary while the other performs the rest of the duties.

Membership Chairperson – chairs a committee of three (themselves plus two others). **ALL CLUBS MEMBERS ARE PART OF THE MEMBERSHIP TEAM.**

Tail Twister is a vital part of promoting club harmony and fun.

Lion Tamer responsible for all club paraphernalia and meeting set-up.

1st and 2nd year directors – help form board policy.

Immediate Past President is also a member of the Board and helps form board policy. Per LCI the president, treasurer and secretary are the core of club officers.
