#### WE SERVE - YOUTH

Are there Lions in your club that are interested in working with youth as individuals, or perhaps your club would like to have a youth project or Leo Club? Are you looking for a place to expand your image in the community and seek out new volunteers at low relative cost to the Club? Think about becoming involved with your local school system, every community has one and, second to jobs, they are the most important focal point of most working families. It has a wealth of opportunities to serve, have fun and spread the message of Lionism.

Start by determining who in your Club might be interested and then form a committee of these Lions to approach your local school district and ask what things are needed. Chat with School Board members, parents, teachers, nurses, coaches, and administrators. They all have their own points of view and can come up with

ideas. In discussions with our schools we found a wealth of projects such as shoes for kids, gardens to be planted, musical instruments to be purchased, clubs that needed support, kids that needed rides to the optometrist, hearing screening, vision screening, reading and math tutoring, etc. Like sports? Seek out the coaches and see what help they need. Interested in science, math, ham radio, rockets or robotics? Work with a teacher to form a club in a high school. Interested in music, the band, orchestra, mariachi or steel band can always use help with getting gigs and moving kids around. Match school needs with Lions interests and skill sets. We found projects for individuals, projects for clubs and projects that required multi-club involvement. There is something for everyone.

Schools are very structured environments, so be prepared to sell your concept to different people at different levels, even perhaps to the school board. Working with children will likely require that you have a fingerprint check for each district. This usually costs about \$10-20 and sometimes is refundable by the district. If you want to work with more than one district, there is a state wide check that costs around \$65 that is good everywhere for 5 years. If you want to do vision or hearing screening you should consider the T3 training to become certified. Tutoring sometimes requires that you attend a class on tutoring. Be patient and prepared to fill out forms and do a little waiting. This is the perfect time to start the process to be ready to implement it next Fall when all of your Lions return to the Pride filled with energy to Serve.

Is there a potential Leo Club here? Contact Lion Dominic Dominice, of the Tucson Breakfast Lions Club, the 21-B Leo Chairperson for information and assistance on how to form and manage a Leo Club.

A word about publicity. We do not want to remain the best kept secret, and our service should be communicated to attract more clients, donors, volunteers and potential new Lions. However when working with children we need to follow the school's and parent's

wishes. This does not mean that you cannot take photos and post to your club's Facebook page. It does mean that you need an approved policy for doing so. Most schools have a newsletter, website and Facebook page, seek out the publicity person at the District and see how you can work together to get your project publicized for parents and faculty to see. This would also be the place to learn of the school's policy on your own publicity, get a copy of it and follow it. And remember to always wear your vest or club shirt and have business cards handy to pass out to potential new Lions.

Recruiting and retaining Lions

will always be a challenge. It's often difficult to recognize that illusive personal trait in others that cues them to investigate our organization. Communities are bombarded with many choices and options for giving back and our message about service can be overlooked.



Just as many businesses expand or reduce their product line, clubs should evaluate the effectiveness of the "what" that it projects. The "how" may be outdated and ineffective or in need of an updated delivery method. We sell the "what" (operations/projects) we do as Lions and explain the "how" (the process or strategy).

Every one of us has a different "why" we choose to belong to Lions as a way to give back – to help where there's a need.



Perhaps if we tell our

personal stories more like a vision statement of "why" we choose to be Lions, we can attract or reinforce the significance of belonging to our worldwide organization - being a member of a group with other like-minded people. Being a Lion affords the development of synergy for helping others with a unifying focus about our strategy for meeting unmet needs in our communities. We aren't a political, religious, nor fraternal group. We do what we can, when we can, while we can. We don't seek rewards. The results we achieve for our help is the reward. And we strive to make a difference, one person at a time.



Yes, being a Lion is a deliberate and personal choice – tell WHY you're a Lion and then

explain the WHAT and the HOW and project how we will perpetuate and grow our organization for the next 100 years of service.



#### **RESPONSIBILITIES:**

- ✓ Be responsible for at least one Board fund-raising project annually and for a Strategic Project as assigned.
- ✓ Attend and participate in Camp fund-raising events and identify/pursue community opportunities for promoting Camp.
- ✓ Actively participate in identifying and pursuing sponsors for Camp.
- ✓ Personally visit and develop a relationship with Lions Clubs as assigned.
- ✓ Attend all scheduled meetings of the Board (75% minimum required).
- ✓ Make an on-site visit to Camp and attend/complete a Board training seminar.
- ✓ Review financials and minutes and provide feedback.
- ✓ Abide by the bylaws and rules of the Board, MD21 and Lions Club International.
- ✓ Be informed about the Mission, Vision and Values of Camp.
- ✓ Help to identify potential Board members as needed.
- ✓ Annually complete a self-evaluation of year's activities and Board participation and give to the Board President on request.
- ✓ Other duties as agreed.
