


Elsie Lions hosted a Red Cross Blood Drive back in April.


St. Johns Lions Club







Podcast Interview Strategies for Success

In many of our past articles, our focus has been on how to get your club publicity about your service projects in local publications and on local TV news. These publicity vehicles depend on short-format interviews, featuring brief talking points and extensive editing by the local news outlet to fit into their limited segments they have available for local news.

In past years, being interviewed in studio by a local personality at a nearby TV or radio station allowed Lions Club spokespeople to have more time to tell their service stories to a more targeted audience. These studio sessions usually lasted about 15 minutes or so. They gave you the advantage of being able to tell longer service stories. And even though the audience was initially smaller, they often had Internet and rebroadcast capabilities to widen both reach and frequency.

While those local TV and radio opportunities <u>still exist</u>, there are now even more long-format interview opportunities available. Everywhere it seems in today's media landscape, podcasts have emerged as a powerful platform to reach engaged, niche audiences.

For Lions Clubs looking to spotlight their community service, local podcasts may be an untapped media to distribute your message to more community residents and prospective new Lions Club members. Unlike traditional news program outlets, podcasts offer longer-format conversations and storytelling — perfect for sharing the real purpose behind Lions Club initiatives.

Here's a few tips about how you can get your Lions Club's service featured on local podcasts:

- 1. Identify the right podcasts -- Start by researching local and regional podcasts that align with your mission. Look for community-focused podcasts (e.g., "Inside [Your Town]" or "Michigan Voices"). Also consider nonprofit or volunteerism-themed shows, local college or high school podcasts, public radio-affiliated podcasts, lifestyle podcasts with local relevance. Use platforms like Apple Podcasts, Spotify, or Podchaser to search by topic and location.
- 2. Craft a Compelling Pitch -- Podcast hosts receive many requests, so a clear, tailored message matters. Your pitch should include who you are (e.g., "I'm the president of the Bay City Lions Club..."), what you do (briefly explain a project, like KidSight screenings or eyeglasses recycling), and why it matters (mention the community impact or emotional stories,). Be sure to consider why their audience would care by connecting your mission to their podcast theme or listeners). Don't forget to make a clear "ask" (request to be interviewed or that they cover your story idea).
- 3. Be ready with your spokesperson (and a relevant guest or story) -- Podcast hosts appreciate organized guests. Decide who from your club would speak well on mic? Choose someone relatable, passionate, and comfortable in conversation. Check out the Lions of Michigan "Lions Spokesperson Coaching" toolkit resources to prepare. Do you have a compelling service story? For example, "A local family whose child was screened by KidSight and received life-changing glasses." Bring a short list of talking points or anecdotes but don't over-script. Podcasts thrive on natural conversation.
- 4. Leverage events and campaigns -- Use public events to create newsworthy moments, like kicking off a back-to-school event that includes vision screening. These events provide natural reasons to approach local podcasters with, "Would you like to cover this story?"

Once your episode goes live, maximize its value by sharing it on your Lion Club's Facebook, LinkedIn, and website. Email it to members and community partners. Put in your publicity toolkit pull quotes or highlights for future promotional use. A single podcast episode can become weeks of quality content.

Getting your Lions Club's service featured on a local podcast isn't about luck — it's about knowing your audience, having a story to tell, and approaching podcast hosts with respect and enthusiasm. With just a little effort, podcasts can amplify your service and connect your Lions Club with new volunteers, donors, and community members who care about your mission.
