Grand Ledge Lions Club










Ovid Lions Club

A NOTE FROM PDG TOM DOYLE, OD:


One of the tenets of the Lions is preservation of sight. Diabetic retinopathy is a leading cause of blindness in this nation. Your club can help in the fight against this vision-robbing disease.

Through the Tri-County Office on Aging and MSU Extension we can provide intensive education for diabetic and prediabetic patients. Often, they may feel confused or lost by the sheer amount of information they have to consider.

The larger healthcare system cannot offer the clear and comprehensive training that Lions can now help to provide. The class is called PATH and it is a 6 week program to allow patients to better understand the ins and outs of their health care, especially as it relates to diabetes.

To help your own community members, all your club needs to do is find a suitable facility for 6 weeks of use – preferably at no charge. Then, contact me, so we can set up your club's partnership with Tri-County or MSU Extension. Your club's biggest job after that is publicizing the event in your area churches, doctors' offices, pharmacies, urgent care offices, etc.

Right now, our District 11-C2 account has some funds to pay for these types of events. The St. Louis/Alma Lions Club recently completed one in their community that was an enormous success. 



Scholarship Criteria:

- Must be legally blind and provide verification (letter from optometrist or ophthalmologist or letter from vocational counselor). (A person is considered legally blind when their vision acuity is 20/200 or less in the better eye with best correction, or when their field of vision is 20 degrees or less in the better eye.)
- 2. Applicants must be a United States Citizen or have an F1 Visa. (Official proof required)
- Scholarships will be awarded with PRIORITY given: 1st to Michigan residents, 2nd other state residents (state ID required), and 3rd international residents with an F1 visa.
- Applicants must be either attending or accepted by an accredited trade or business school, college or university. (Documentation on school letterhead required.)
- 5. Applicants' GPA must be a minimum of 2.5 (transcript required).
- Applicants must complete the official scholarship application and submit an essay outlining need for funds. One (1) letter of recommendation is also required.
- Winners are strongly urged to attend the Lions of Michigan Forum luncheon on 2/28/26 in Kalamazoo, MI. Acutal checks will be issued to trade or business college/university upon acceptance.
- 8. Completed scholarship applications must be postmarked NO LATER THAN DECEMBER 30th, 2025

Searching for Your Lions Club Online

The way people search for information online is changing rapidly. Traditional search engines like Google have long relied on keyword matching, backlinks, and site authority to decide what results to show. But now, artificial intelligence, especially a tool like ChatGPT, is reshaping how people discover content online. For service organization, this shift represents both a challenge and a major opportunity.

From Keywords to Conversations

Lions Clubs International is planning to roll out opportunities to redo our websites soon. When that happens, we'll need to know more about AI-driven search that doesn't just look for matching words; it understands meaning. Instead of typing "best local service club Mason MI," users might ask, "What service club has a project to feed the hungry near me today?" ChatGPT and similar models analyze intent, context, and even tone to provide more accurate, conversational answers. This change means that optimizing AI search requires more natural, human-centered writing. Lions Clubs that answer real community members' questions in plain language will stand out

Building AI-Friendly Content

To stay visible in this new landscape, websites need to provide clear, structured information that AI can easily interpret. Adding schema markup (code that you add to your website to help search engines better understand your content) creates an enhanced description. Instead of a search engine just seeing "5 stars," a schema tells it that this is a "Rating" for a "Service." It helps AI understand what your organization does and where you serve. Easier for our Lions Clubs is simply making sure we have well-written FAQs and conversational blog posts to give AI models the context they need to reference our sites in results.

Al search systems also value authority and trust. Consistent branding, genuine reviews, and high-quality backlinks still matter, but now they work alongside clarity and transparency. If your content is confusing, outdated, or too promotional, Al systems are less likely to surface it.

What This Means for Our Clubs

For local groups online, AI search and tools like ChatGPT are leveling the playing field. Someone asking about "trusted service clubs near Grand Ledge" or "best community groups offering free eye screening near Lansing" could now find recommendations directly through conversational search, without even clicking to a traditional results page. Lions Clubs that maintain complete Google Business Profiles, accurate directory listings, and content that reads naturally have a distinct advantage.

The Bottom Line

Al search isn't replacing SEO — it's evolving it. Lions Clubs that move away from keywords and adapt early will be easier to find, easier to trust, and better positioned for the next phase of digital discovery. Create content that speaks both to people and to AI, ensuring you stay visible wherever your community is searching.
