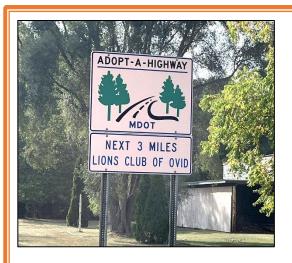

### A NOTE FROM PDG TOM DOYLE, OD:

One of the tenets of the Lions is preservation of sight. Diabetic retinopathy is a leading cause of blindness in this nation. Your club can help in the fight against this vision-robbing disease.

Through the Tri-County Office on Aging and MSU Extension we can provide intensive education for diabetic and prediabetic patients. Often, they may feel confused or lost by the sheer amount of information they have to consider.

The larger healthcare system cannot offer the clear and comprehensive training that Lions can now help to provide. The class is called PATH and it is a 6 week program to allow patients to better understand the ins and outs of their health care, especially as it relates to diabetes.

To help your own community members, all your club needs to do is find a suitable facility for 6 weeks of use – preferably at no charge. Then, contact me, so we can set up your club's partnership with Tri-County or MSU Extension. Your club's biggest job after that is publicizing the event in your area churches, doctors' offices, pharmacies, urgent care offices, etc.

Right now, our District 11-C2 account has some funds to pay for these types of events. The St. Louis/Alma Lions Club recently completed one in their community that was an enormous success. 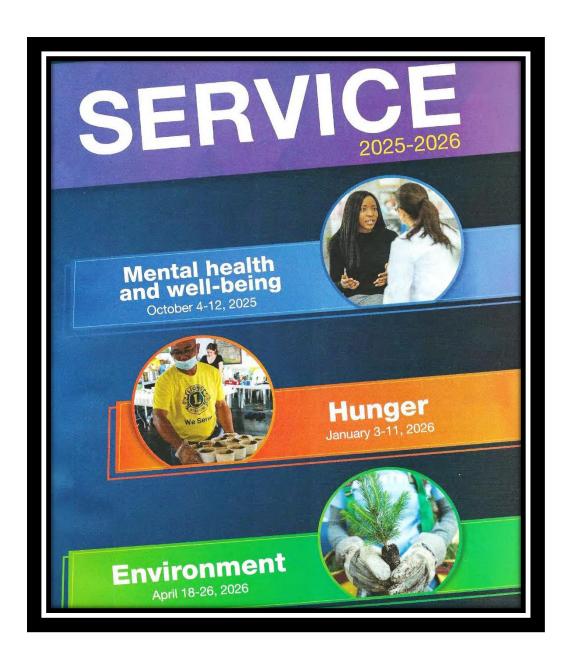
### FROM THE LIONS GLOBAL ACTION TEAM:

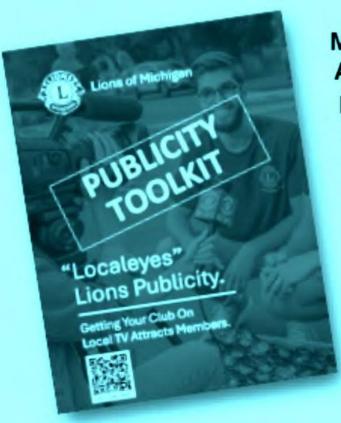
LCIF grants have already touched lives in Michigan—funding projects in vision screening, disaster relief, and youth programs. But to continue this level of support, we need every Lion to take part.

### **Tell Your Story About Your Lions Club**

In a world full of ads, pop-ups, and endless scrolling, facts and figures alone aren't enough to win over your audience. What truly grabs attention — and keeps it — is a good story. Storytelling isn't just about telling people what your Lions Club is about; it's about showing them why Lions can matter to them and creating an emotional connection that makes our service organization memorable.

One of the newer ways to assist Lions Club members to craft their own individual compelling stories is the "Recruiter's Passport." District Governors and other Lions Leaders can get these for you to distribute to your Lions Club members. The passport leads you step-by-step into how to come up with your stories and how to fashion them into riveting content.



It asks questions like "Why did you become a Lion?" that give you the basic blueprint for making your stories come from the heart — and making your stories work for you. Having quality conversations with well thought out "word-of-mouth" marketing communication strategies and tactics will make you successful.

Why does storytelling work? Stories tap into emotions, and emotions drive decisions. A great story makes your prospective members feel like they're part of the journey. Instead of saying, "We offer service," tell the story of how you went the extra mile for a community member in need. That narrative builds trust and makes your Lions Club relatable.

Here's how to tell a great story:

- 1. Know Your Audience: Understand their needs, challenges, and dreams so you can speak to what matters most to them
- 2. Show, Don't Just Tell: Use real examples, vivid details, and relatable scenarios. Let your audience picture themselves in your story.
- 3. Highlight Transformation: People connect with change. Share how your service takes someone from a problem to a solution.
- 4. Keep It Authentic: Audiences can sense when a story feels forced. Be genuine and honest.

Your story can live everywhere, from your website, social media posts, and videos to email campaigns and even printed materials. Keep the core message consistent but adapt the format to the platform.

When you weave storytelling into your quality conversations with prospective members, you turn your Lions Club from just another option for volunteering into a group with heart and personality. That's how you move beyond just informing people about your Lions Club and start building relationships that last.
