

I would like to say Thank you for the donations to LCIF so far this Lions year. We have had 27 individuals, and 3 clubs make contributions this year. This year's clubs in the district have awarded one Melvin Jones Fellowship award and One Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship Award.

Interested in experiencing life in a different country? Join the exchange program where you can participate in the day-to-day life of a local family and meet other students from around the world.



Filing deadlines for all applicants vary by country. Most Countries have a filing deadline range from February 15 to March 31 depending on the country you pick. Please choose your country early and contact us right away.

A \$100 Youth Exchange Supplies fee is required with all applications. Fee includes shirts, backpack, MD11 Youth Exchange pins and banners and orientation booklet. There may be an additional charges for camps within your chosen country that are not included in the price of our program. You will be required to purchase your own airfare and international travel insurance. The travel insurance must be accepted in the country you are visiting.

Age requirements are typically 15 - 22

Our students usually depart the U.S. the last weekend of June or beginning of July for a 3 to 5 week stay depending on the Youth Exchange program in those countries. Please note that all counties are on a first come basis and fill up fast so the sooner you apply the sooner we can confirm your acceptance.

- Core responsibilities, maintaining club roster and member contact information, Club and BoD meeting minutes, support club service and social activities.

- MyLCI and MyLion are the main tools and have simplified reporting

- New member portal is mostly cosmetic and will come online sometime in 2024.

- Entering Service; Every club has a choice about what service to enter, the question to answer is "why?". Part of joining a global service organization is the SUM of the parts. Each member's service adds to the global total and proves in print. Lions are Changing the World.

- Members will have new ways to report their own service using the new member portal, service chairs, and President's, and Secretaries can report to LCI. In short, there is help if the Secretary chooses. Membership and service reporting should only take around 15 minutes per month.

- January is halfway through our Lions Year. Now is a good time to review the criteria for the Club Excellence Award, there are still months ahead to qualify if needed. Also look at the rosterbook to find the deadlines for year end awards, ie. 100%Secretary, Ralph Lynam, Mission 1.5

- Secretaries feel like they are well trained and have been doing the tasks for multiple years as a reason for consistently low participation at district training.

- Club treasurers use a variety of software to keep track of budgets and finance. Custom Excel spreadsheets, QuickBooks, MS Money are examples. CT Lion Bob is willing to share the spreadsheet he uses.

- Treasurers feel like they are well trained and have been doing the tasks for multiple years as a reason for consistently low participation at district training.

- Dues increase was discussed as well as the difference between Admin and Activities accounts.

Remember the Rule of Seven

As part of "Mission 1.5," many of our Lions Clubs are focusing more than ever on getting new members. This may mean you need a slight shift in your communication strategy to include the "Rule of Seven." That is a communication and marketing principle that states that it can take hearing or seeing a message seven times before we might act on that message. The rule is all about repetition. Most people don't pay attention the first time they are exposed to just a single message—or 2, or even 3. That's especially true to our messages about joining your local Lions Club.

The principle is an age-old heuristic (or rule-of-thumb) based on the idea that the more contact you have with your target audience, the easier it is to develop relationships and convince them to act. This concept has been around since the 1930s when movie studios first coined the term. These studios realized that they needed to expose prospective audience members to advertising materials an average of seven times before they committed to a trip to the movie theatre.

When you're just looking at the number of touchpoints you need to achieve different goals, new member campaigns often prioritize frequency and brand awareness campaigns prioritize reach. When you have a finite amount of time to devote to communication strategies, you must strike a balance between increasing reach and frequency. Generally, expanding your reach reduces your capacity for sending out recurring messages. Similarly, increasing your frequency limits the amount of time you can spend on reach. So, which one should be prioritized? This often depends on the unique goals you're trying to achieve.

Increasing reach is a great tool for expanding awareness in your community. Your neighbors may not yet be aware of your Lions Club, so trying new media or using broader communication channels for better reach is a great way to increase exposure. I would also recommend focusing on reach if your objective is letting people know about new programs or services. Increasing reach ensures that the largest number of people gain familiarity with your Lions Club activities.

However, if your goal is to get more members to join up, frequency is the way to go. That gets us back to the "Rule of Seven" Using this strategy is especially important in our modern world where people are constantly bombarded with information. If you can create seven memorable experiences and target the right people, then it will be much easier to stand out.

The rule of seven is not an exact science. It's not a case of exposing your Club's message to prospective members exactly seven times to generate a new membership. It's more about enhancing the visibility of your Lions Club's offerings to those prospective members. The more times they interact with your messages, the more memorable your Lions Club will become, and the more likely you are to build trust and credibility.

Research from the University of Sussex into people's tendency to see the expected suggests that being presented with the same message over and again in the same media could do more damage than good. It may be better to see or hear a slightly different message each time or use different media for a similar message. What appears to be key is variety to avoid messaging fatigue and overexposure. Even interested prospective members may get turned off by seeing the same message too many times in the same way over a short period of time.

The real answer to effective communication is much more nuanced than the rule of seven may suggest. Also, how has the rule of seven changed since the age of digitalization? The average person processes a huge amount of information every day. This means that brands need to be unique and memorable to stand out from the crowd.

I can't remember where I heard it, but some advice I keep in mind when communicating is that by the time you're tired of saying it, others are just starting to hear it. It's not a bad thing to repeat your main message. Thankfully, we now have access to a lot more tools that can help with following the rule of seven. In the 1930s, advertising was limited to ads in newspapers, posters in shop windows, and billboards. These days we have access to multiple platforms that make it a lot easier to interact with your target audience and create memorable experiences that leave a lasting impression.

Social media is particularly effective at engaging certain groups of people and forming meaningful connections with them. Use social media to your advantage. If you aren't already active on social media, now is the time to build a presence there. Social media is perhaps the best platform for communicating short, frequent messages to your target audiences.
