Mason Lions Club accepting donations of used eyeglasses and hearing aids

MASON, Mich. (WILX) - More than 2.2 billion people live with vision impairments, and 400 million people need hearing aids, according to the World Health Organization (WHO). The Mason Lions Club is working to help reduce those numbers.



"There was a girl who, her script was minus 13, and she had to have everything this close smushing her nose for her to be able to see, and her reaction was a lot like what we see kids do over here but much more dramatic, she said 'I can see the leaves,'" said Chad Linsley, an optometrist with Mason Family Eye Care.

Lions Clubs across the country aim to make moments like those happen. "We ask that people take their old used eyeglasses and drop them off in one of our drop boxes," said Doug Klein, Mason Lions Club secretary.

Linsley has been on seven mission trips with Lions Club glasses in Kenya, Costa Rica, and Peru. He helped distribute the donated glasses to people who needed them.

"I'm struck by how much more dramatic the cases are that we see and it can sometimes be overwhelming. There's some people that have preventable blindness that it's too late

and that's very heartbreaking," said Linsley.

Along with eyeglasses, donations of used hearing aids are also being accepted. "So we can refurbish hearing aids as well as glasses and those can be distributed through audiologists," said Klein.

"It could be as simple as a kid that has no chance to see a page in front of them or has no chance to see a board where the educational material is being presented," said Linsley.

Mason Family Eye Care, the Mason Library. and Mason City Hall are just a few places where donations are accepted. The Lions Club of Mason is accepting donations up until Jan. 19.

She became trapped in the underworld of prostitution and drug addiction for over 20 years. On July 4, 2000 Leslie miraculously found the strength and the courage to break free. Since 2003, she has been intensely engaged in working with individuals who find themselves trapped in the same horrors that she experienced.

KAYLEIGH GRATZ, PRESIDENT, MICHIGAN JAYCEES

WKAR loans qualified listeners a special portable radio free of charge. The pre-tuned radio includes the Radio Reading Service signal and 90.5 WKAR. You can listen within a 60-mile radius of WKAR's Okemos/ Meridian Township broadcasting tower or on your computer at WKAR.org through a variety of streaming applications.

ORIGINS

Radio Reading Services was created by WKAR's Dick Estell in 1973, as Radio Talking Book.

HOW TO QUALIFY

Participants must meet at least one of these qualifications:

- Trouble reading or using printed materials as a result of a visual, physical or cognitive condition
- Macular degeneration, glaucoma, retinitis pigmentosa or dyslexia

How to Connect in a Disconnected World

In the age of smartphones, streaming services, and online platforms, the ways we connect with one another have changed dramatically. Yet, as much as technology seems to bring us closer, it may often leave some feeling more alone. Even family and work obligations may erode over time leaving people "up in the air."

Evidence of a lack of cohesion and the disintegration of public civil society is all too easily seen in our lives today. To counteract that feeling of loneliness, many people have regained a sense of place and purpose in their local communities by meeting with others and sharing their personal stories face-to-face.

These critical conversations are necessary to establish and maintain the personal connections that bind a community together. A new aid to help Michigan Lions better prepare for those conversations of is a small booklet that is making its way around Lions Clubs called the "Recruiter's Passport – Pocket Reference: Sharing My Story." Here is why effective use of this reference booklet is so important:

In his groundbreaking book "Bowling Alone," sociologist Robert Putnam warned of the dangers of declining social capital—the networks and relationships that enable communities to thrive. One of the most concerning trends he identified was the dwindling participation in civic organizations, which historically fostered these critical connections.

The decline of membership in such groups coincides with rising rates of social isolation. Humans are wired for connection, and when we lose opportunities to interact face-to-face, we feel the impact not just emotionally, but physically. Numerous studies have shown that loneliness can be as damaging to health as smoking 15 cigarettes a day.

The disappearance of civil society is not inevitable. By investing in organizations like Lions Clubs, we can reverse this trend and build stronger, more connected communities. As we often say, "Where there's a need, there's a Lion." But perhaps just as important, where there's a Lion, there's a community coming back to life.

Sociologist Ray Oldenburg introduced the concept of the "third place" in his influential work, identifying the importance of spaces that exist outside of the home (the "first place") and the workplace (the "second place"). According to Oldenburg, these third places are essential for fostering vibrant communities and nurturing social ties. They serve as informal public gathering spots where people can come together, share ideas, and build relationships.

Lions get together in restaurants, meeting rooms, coffee shops, libraries, parks, and community centers where connections are made and ideas flourish. Lions Clubs meetings and events are shining examples of intentional third places, offering spaces where people of all walks of life can come together for a shared purpose: service.

A Lions meeting is a chance to step out of the daily grind, engage in meaningful dialogue, and feel a sense of belonging. Whether organizing a fundraiser for a local food pantry or collaborating to bring vision screenings to children, Lions create a space where members are seen, heard, and valued. In a world where many feel isolated, Lions Clubs provide a lifeline. As one member put it, "Being a Lion means being part of something bigger than yourself. It's a way to give back, but also to connect with people who care about the same things you do."

So, if you know of friends, family, neighbors, or co-workers who may be feeling the pull of disconnection or searching for a way to make a difference, consider inviting them to hear your personal "Lions story" and then join you in a visit to your local Lions Club event. Ask them to help with your next service project.

They might just find Lions to be more than a community service organization; they might find a second home, a third place, and a renewed sense of belonging. And our Lions Clubs can also increase our member numbers to enable even more service.
