



Lions International extends its condolences to the family of former U.S. President Jimmy Carter. President Carter believed in building alliances, in the virtue and just pursuit of human dignity, and in the power that we must transform not only our world, but ourselves.

Lions Clubs International Foundation has been proud to partner with The Carter Center for nearly 30 years. Our partnership is among the most important and long-lasting relationships enjoyed by the SightFirst program and LCIF. Together, we've worked to combat avoidable blindness around the world through our joint efforts in onchocerciasis and trachoma control programs. The Lions family is grateful to President Carter for his lifelong humanitarian spirit and dedicated service to the people of the world.



Lionism Changed Jimmy Carter's Life By Lion Bob Reddick

"Lions changed my life," said former president Jimmy Carter. "I would have never been ambitious enough to run for Governor of Georgia. I would have never dreamed of being President of the United States if it were not for the Lions."

Jimmy Carter followed in his father's footsteps and joined the Plains Lion Club in 1953 a week after he resigned from the navy. During his term as club president in 1957-58, the Plains Club built and began operating a community swimming pool. Also, their club was involved in blindness prevention projects in Georgia and Honduras.

Lion Jimmy Carter found that Lionism is a great way to engage in public service. It helped him to expand his horizons and he credits

the many lessons he learned while serving his community as helping him in his career as a politician and peacemaker. He says the Lions' commitment to service showed him the importance of caring for others.

Being zone chairperson, district governor and chairperson of the Council of Governors in Georgia gave him a visible involvement with the Lions. This high profile with the 208 clubs throughout the state of Georgia helped him immensely with his campaign for governor in 1970. During his presidential campaign in 1976, he tributes his "civic involvement as a Lion contributed to my identity as a community leader."

After leaving the White House, Mr. Carter and his wife, Rosalynn, founded The Carter Center in 1982. Its mandate was to advance human rights and diminish human suffering around the world.

In 1994, the Carter Center partnered with Lions International Foundation (LCIF) SightFirst program and focused on two blinding diseases, trachoma and river blindness. River blindness is a vector-borne parasitic disease that leads to blindness, and trachoma is the leading infectious cause of blindness worldwide.

From 1994 to 2018, the partnership resulted in more than 236 million treatments to eliminate river blindness and over 177 million treatments to halt the blinding effects of trachoma. Over 799,000 sight-saving surgeries to reverse the advanced stage of trachoma have been performed, and more than 3.2 million latrines have been built to reduce transmission of infection. Since 1994, LCIF has approved more than 60 river blindness and trachoma grants totaling over US\$67 million.

LCIF and The Carter Center believe in the power of partnerships. No single organization or country can hope to eliminate tropical diseases like river blindness and trachoma on its own. As we see today, to conquer these dreaded diseases and viruses takes the efforts and cooperation of many diverse teams.

Training to Every Client's Needs

Learn about our DeafBlind Program and Adaptive Services

At Leader Dogs for the Blind, our top priority is ensuring each client receives customized training that allows them to develop exceptional skills to travel independently with a white cane or a guide dog. Though all our guide dog mobility instructors (GDMIs) and certified orientation and mobility specialists (COMS) are skilled at adapting the training process to accommodate a wide range of personalities and individual needs, the GDMIs on our adaptive services team also individualize client and dog

training for additional client needs or disabilities that may be physical or intellectual. Some examples of ways we are able to adapt training are:

- Train a dog to work on the right side for someone who has experienced a stroke, has a
 prosthetic hand or has lost a limb.
- Identify and train a sturdy dog for someone with an uneven gait due to cerebral palsy that can
 offer a little counterbalance and be easier to control.
- Provide one-on-one instruction at a gradual pace for someone who has experienced a traumatic brain injury.

People who are both deaf and blind can find navigating the world to be challenging. After working closely with DeafBlind clients, we began offering guide dog training in 1992 using American Sign Language (ASL) as the main method of communication. A guide dog working with a person who is DeafBlind must be extremely mature. Their training stresses partner awareness because they receive all commands from their handler via hand signals. Much attention is placed on traffic awareness and proper street crossings since these can be extreme safety issues for people who are DeafBlind.



Youth Camps and Exchange Sponsor Lions Clubs

The Sponsor Lions Clubs are the resource for exchange youth to have a close working relationship with their district or multiple district YCE Chairperson. If a Sponsor Club does not have a district or multiple district YCE Chairperson, a Club President will be required to sign for the Exchange Youth along with the district governor, and to work directly with the YCE Chairpersons in the host countries of interest to make all arrangements. The following are general responsibilities for the Sponsor:

- Ensuring that the YCE policy is followed;
- Ensuring compliance with local laws governing youth protection;
- 2 Verifying the exchange youth have sufficient accident, life, personal property, health and liability insurance to cover all contingencies during travel to and from their host country;
- Recruiting, screening and selecting qualified exchange youth;
- Help Exchange Youth use the <u>YCE Directory</u> to find their desired programs;
- Conduct an orientation session for outgoing exchange youth;
- Assist exchange youth with travel arrangements;
- Potentially provide assistance with or full financing for exchange youth travel costs including air fares, insurance, airport service fees, customs duties and any layover or overnight costs in route;
- Maintaining communications between the exchange youth, host Lions club, host family and YCE Chairperson.

How to Become a Sponsor Club!

- Write a press release about the YCE program requesting youth who are interested in the YCE program to contact your club; and
- 2 Contact local schools and universities, especially the foreign language or international studies departments, with information about the YCE program to recruit young people.

Host Lions Clubs work closely with the selected youth participants, host families and the district or multiple district YCE Chairperson. If a Host Club does not have a district or multiple district YCE Chairperson, a Club President will be required to sign for the exchange youth along with the district governor, and to work directly with the YCE Chairpersons in the sponsoring country to make all arrangements.

The following are general responsibilities for the host Lions club:

- Ensuring that the YCE policy is followed;
- Ensuring compliance with local laws governing youth protection;
- Verifying the exchange youth have sufficient accident, life, personal property, health and liability insurance to cover all contingencies during travel to and from their host country;
- If your club is hosting an International Camp, your club should do research in case you need to secure separate insurance coverage for the camp itself depending on the activities of the camp;
- Making arrangements for the youth exchange's arrival/departure;
- Recruiting, screening and providing orientation to host families;
- Maintaining communications between the youth participants, Sponsor Lions Club, Host Family and YCE Chairperson; and
- Providing transportation to events organized by your club, including meetings and service projects.

Talking Points for "Lions United for Vision" Week

In a previous article "What to Say to a Reporter," we discussed the importance of using talking points. Using talking points effectively in a TV news interview is essential to deliver clear, impactful, and memorable messages. Recently, I was asked to provide talking points for two of our "Vision" cause projects: Project KidSight and Eyeglasses Collection. Both projects are being promoted during LionsUSA's "Lions United for Vision" or LUV campaign during the week of January 11-17, 2025.

General Lions talking points can be found at the http://resources.mdalions.org/web%20page%20articles/ Key%20Lions%20Messages%20and%20Questions.pdf site. That file contains points to help in your preparations prior to any activities where the media might be present. It contains suggested answers to commonly asked questions. However, here are the specific talking points for our two projects:

Lions Club Brightens Lives Through Eyeglasses Collection and Recycling – These points highlight the program's global impact, community involvement, and the opportunity for viewers to contribute to a meaningful cause:

- Our local Lions Club, along with hundreds of Lions Clubs throughout Michigan, have a commitment to vision health. We believe that simple actions—like donating used eyeglasses—can make a profound difference to ensure that everyone has access to the gift of clear vision.
- Vision impairment affects over 2.2 billion people worldwide, with many unable to afford corrective lenses. Through the support of community members, Lions Clubs have recycled millions of eyeglasses, delivering them to individuals in need via vision health missions and partner organizations in over 100 countries.
- Something as simple as a pair of eyeglasses can change a life. Clear vision opens doors to education, work opportunities, and a better quality of life, and the Lions are proud to play a role in making that happen.
 Eyeglasses are distributed in over 100 countries through Lions missions and partner organizations.
- By providing recycled eyeglasses, Lions Clubs empower individuals to read, work, and lead independent lives.
 Eye health professionals who participate in mission trips around the world share many stories of people who received glasses and experienced a life-changing improvement in their vision.
- In Kenya, a farmer received eyeglasses that allowed him to read market prices, improving his business and family income. In Guatemala, a young girl in elementary school gained her first pair of glasses, allowing her to read and write for the first time. In India, a grandmother regained her independence after receiving glasses during a Lions mission in her village.
- The donation process is simple yet impactful.
 Community members donate their used eyeglasses and

- hearing aids at collection boxes located in locations such as schools, libraries, or optometry offices. Contact your local Lions Club to find out where to donate in your area. Go to www.lionsclubs.org and click on "Find a Club."
- Lions Club volunteers collect and count the glasses.
 From there, the glasses are sent to one of many Lions
 Eyeglass Recycling Centers, where they are cleaned,
 sorted, and categorized before being distributed to
 those in need.
- Eye exams are provided to individuals in underserved communities and the proper corrective lenses are dispensed by ophthalmologists, optometrists, and opticians to individuals during vision health missions, often paired with child vision screenings and educational efforts.
- Reading glasses and sunglasses are also welcome in the collection. Hearing aids may also be recycled in the same boxes. By collecting glasses and hearing aids of all types, refurbishing them, and redistributing them globally, the Lions are helping people see and hear clearly and lead better lives.
- This program not only helps individuals but also supports environmental sustainability by reducing waste. By repurposing eyeglasses, Lions Clubs contribute to global efforts to protect our planet. Glasses and hearing aids that are unable to be refurbished are sent to specialized recycling centers.
- Community members can get involved by dropping off used eyeglasses at a Lions collection box. They may also assist by becoming Lions Club volunteers and help in the collection and counting process. Some may also wish to explore participation in mission trips. Go to www.lionsclubs.org and click on "Find a Club."

Lions Club "Project KidSight" Vision Screenings Change Children's Lives -- These points highlight the program's impact on schools, families, and the community, and educate viewers to enable them to spread the word about this meaningful cause:

- Project KidSight is a Lions Clubs initiative aimed at detecting and preventing vision issues in children. It is focused on children aged 6 months to 6 years, a critical age for early vision development. Thousands of children are screened annually through the program to ensure children receive basic eye screenings and follow-up care when needed.
- Poor vision affects learning, social development, and overall quality of life. Many childhood vision problems, like amblyopia (lazy eye), are treatable if caught early.
 Vision problems often go unnoticed because young children may not realize they can't see clearly.
- According to educational experts, 80% of learning is visual. If children can't see well, they will have more difficulty learning. 1-in-3 young children have poor but correctable vision – often just needing eyeglasses. Some vision problems undetected by the age of 7 can become permanent.
- Approximately 25 million children now in school went nearly two years without a basic vision screening due to the pandemic interruption. Many kids have worsening eyesight from prolonged "screen" time.
- KidSight screening is done by trained Lions Club volunteers. Teams of three to six people – certified as a children's vision screener or assistant –spend one half day or more to conduct the vision screenings. They use advanced vision screening technology. The screenings are quick, non-invasive, painless, and do not require verbal responses from the child.
- Volunteers will provide any assistance needed in securing written parent or guardian permission. A responsible volunteer also ensures that all KidSight screening data for an event is collected and forwarded to a Lions District KidSight Coordinator or the Lions of Michigan Foundation office.

- Screenings are offered at no cost to families, ensuring accessibility for all. Screenings are conducted in public and private schools, daycares, community centers, and public events. These partners provide permission to host a vision screening and KidSight works closely with educators, healthcare providers, and parents.
- About ten percent of children screened are referred to an eye care professional for further evaluation and timely treatment. Children whose vision problems are caught and treated early, do better in school which improves an entire family's quality of life.
- Parents and relatives are very grateful for the early detection of their child's vision issues. The program helps educate parents on signs of vision problems, like squinting or difficulty focusing. The volunteers emphasize the importance of routine eye checks for children, even if they don't report symptoms.
- Referral information is provided to each family with a child requiring follow-up eye care with an optometrist or ophthalmologist. Families without insurance or who need help with obtaining follow-up eye care for their child or children are referred to their local Lions or the Lions of Michigan Foundation office - www.lmsf.net info@lmsf.net - 517-887-6640.
- Lions Clubs throughout Michigan encourage schools and community organizations to partner with them to host vision screenings. Viewers should consider joining their local Lions Club to support Project KidSight and other community service initiatives. They may also donate to Lions of Michigan Foundation and contribute to funding the program and expanding its reach.

You can ensure your talking points resonate with the audience and leave a lasting impression by remembering a few more tips:

- Know your talking points inside out so you can discuss them naturally without sounding rehearsed.
- Tailor your points to the audience, the interviewer's style, and the length of the interview.
- Be ready to pivot from your talking points to address specific questions while staying on message.
- Avoid sounding like you're reading or reciting. Use conversational language.
- Show enthusiasm and use relatable examples to make your points resonate.
- Share personal anecdotes or success stories to humanize the topic.
- If you don't know the answer to a question, acknowledge it and pivot to your key points.

At the end of many interviews, reporters will often ask whether there's anything else you'd like to add. Most interviewees are so relieved their interview has ended that they decline that golden opportunity. End by encouraging viewers to donate, volunteer, or visit your website. Never miss out on the chance to give a "boilerplate" message about joining your Lions Club. Share how people can learn more or get involved.
