





Youth Camp and Exchange Program

Is the YCE Program Right for Me?

Are you ready to embark on a life-changing adventure that will open your mind and heart? Are you curious about other cultures and ways of life? Do you want to develop your skills in a second language? Would you like to cultivate new friendships with individuals that have different backgrounds, beliefs, and customs than you? The Youth Camps and Exchange (YCE) Program may be the opportunity you are seeking.

Benefits of Participation

As a YCE you will:

- Live with a family in another country
- Meet people your age from around the world
- Learn about what it means to be a Lion or Leo in another country
- Deepen your understanding of yourself and the world around you
- Learn how to foster peace and understanding among peoples of the world

What to Expect

As a Youth Camp and Exchange you can expect to be immersed in a unique cultural experience with Lions and Leo club members supporting your YCE journey. Your host family will treat you as a member of the family, awaiting your engagement in typical daily routines and family meals. You will participate in social activities, possibly service projects and visit cultural places of interest. You are expected to familiarize yourself with the customs, expectations and basic language of the host country prior to your visit and have a desire to learn more.

You can learn more about the roles and expectations of a Youth Exchange by checking out the <u>Youth Camp and Exchange Handbook!</u>

Participant Eligibility

The suggested age range for Youth Camp and Exchange is 15-22. Please note age range can vary by specific Youth Camp and Exchange program.

Youth Camp and Exchange must:

- Be sponsored by a Lions club
- Be ready to represent your community, country and the sponsoring Lions club
- Welcome the opportunity to explore the customs of another culture
- Provide proof of insurance (health, medical, travel) and a liability release agreement
- Take initiative to learn the language of the host country (i.e. basic greetings and phrases)

What are the Costs?

Local program costs vary from country to country. Financial arrangements for transportation may be paid by the Sponsor Lions Club, by the Exchange Youth, the Exchange Youth's family or a combination of these sources. Host Lions clubs cover the costs of room and board with a host family. Exchange Youth are typically responsible for:

- Round-trip airfare
- Camp Fees
- Health, medical and travel insurance
- Travel documents (such as passports and visas)
- Spending money





- 2. Applicants must be a resident of the State of Michigan and a United States Citizen (International students must provide proof of citizenship) and either attending or accepted by an accredited trade or business school, college or university.
- 3. Applicants must complete the official scholarship application (both sides).
- 4. Must submit two letters of recommendation.
- 5. Must submit an essay outlining why you need the scholarship.
- 6. Must have a minimum GPA of 2.5 (transcript required).
- 7. Completed scholarship applications must be postmarked NO LATER THAN DECEMBER 15th annually.
- 8. Must attend the Lions of Michigan Forum to accept scholarship during a ceremonial presentation. (Actual check(s) will be issued to the school/university/equipment manufacturer upon submission of documentation.) Two weeks notice required.

Kick Up the Volume

Publicity is a brilliant way of telling your Lion Club's stories, sharing its successes, what you stand for, and standing within the community in which you are located. Sharing that coverage is another opportunity to drive engagement with your network of followers.

You should be happy if you've created a great story and outreached it to a top local media outlet and they tell you they love it and they upload it straight to their website and they link back to your website or Facebook page. Gladly you then upload that juicy piece of media coverage yourself straight to your other pages or groups, feeling content with a job well done. But what if I told you your job may not be completely over?

The truth is that landing that piece of quality coverage is just the first part of the job. Once you have it, part two kicks in: amplification. That piece of coverage deserves to be amplified and made to work as hard as possible to make sure as many people see and engage with it. Media amplification is the process of extending the reach and impact of media coverage. What follows are some amplification tactics you can use to get your media coverage in front of as many eyeballs as possible.

Share your coverage on all your social media. Think outside the box and, if appropriate, use channels like X (Twitter), LinkedIn, or Instagram. You can also promote your coverage better on all social media by using relevant hashtags and engaging with your followers. You also may wish to tag the journalist and publication. Utilizing links is a crucial part of digital marketing and by including them, you're actively trying to guide a reader to the story that they may have previously missed. This SEO tactic has grown over time, with journalists and media outlets also appreciating "follow links."

Repurpose your coverage into different formats. This could include creating infographics, blog posts, videos, or even little audio podcasts. By repurposing your coverage, you can reach a wider audience and make your story more engaging. After all, TV and radio outlets often transmit written versions of their stories through various media. You can do the same. Or you can work the other way, by making audio or video versions of print content.

Amplifying via social media is great alone, but implementing a member advocacy strategy will make your results even greater. In its simplest form, member advocacy is promotion done by the people involved in it by telling their own authentic, personal stories and experiences.

A Lions Club's biggest cheerleaders are its invested members and by getting them to share your media coverage, you're expanding the number of people that are seeing the story – possibly to an audience that was previously unfamiliar with your Lions Club and what you do. Embrace that good news story and let your other members bask in the glory, too, when you share it by e-mail or through an internal newsletter. And when they happen to take it one step further and talk about it on their own social media? Well, that's your bonus.

Engage with those who are talking about you. We've talked about member advocacy above but the thing about good news stories is that they are likely to get other people talking about you, too – including those outside your circle. If you see someone new has shared your story through social media, take the time to thank them or share their post with new comment. While there is the benefit of keeping the story alive a little while longer (engaging with their comment or share keeps it alive in other followers' feeds), this simple step projects your Lions Club as one that likes to engage with its audience and helps as part of any strategy to inject personalization into your communication.

Reach out to influencers in your community. Influencers can help you to reach a wider audience and build credibility for your Lions Club. Monitor online conversations about your Lions Club and about relevant happenings in your community. This can help you to identify opportunities to comment or "piggyback" on another posting to amplify your coverage.

By using a combination of these tactics, you can effectively amplify your media coverage and reach a wider audience. Remember that getting that coverage is just the first step. The results and the rewards can be far greater if you have an integrated amplification strategy in place.
