Eversight 4th Quarter Report 2022

Happy New Year! We hope you all had a restful, enjoyable holiday break and are excited to renew partnerships and provide sight-saving transplants and research for even more individuals in 2023!

But first, below is an update on Eversight's work during the final quarter of 2022.

Tissue Transplants

In Michigan, 440 donors selflessly gave the gift of sight as cornea/eye donors from October 1 to December 31, 2022. Below is a breakdown of how donated tissues were used.

Research & Innovations

In 2022, Eversight's research team published three highly significant and impactful research articles. The first was on understanding the effect of increasing povidone-iodine exposure on corneal tissue and its impact on the growth of microorganisms. This research conducted by Eversight developed an innovative protocol for all other eye banks to follow that can improve outcomes for corneal transplant recipients and reduce risk of infection after corneal transplantation.

The second study, published in the prestigious and high-impact factor journal 'Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences' discovered the important biological process of visual phototransduction in the retina collected from cadaveric human tissue procured and processed by Eversight. This study allowed Eversight's research team to gain additional recognition amongst our peers as a leading research-driven eye bank. This work serves as an example to the ophthalmic research industry that cadaveric ocular tissues play an important role in understanding the physiology and pathology of various ophthalmic diseases and the visual photo-transduction process.

The final study revealed histopathological assessment of retinal blood vessel changes in a patient with COVID-19, providing a deeper understanding of the impact of COVID-19 on the retina. This study was published in the journal 'Graefe's Archive for Clinical and Experimental Ophthalmology.'

Education & Training

In the final quarter of 2022, Eversight staff held 13 educational wet lab trainings for 79 surgeons, residents and fellows at partner institutions on three common types of cornea transplant procedures: Descemet Membrane Endothelial Keratoplasty (DMEK), Descemet Stripping Automated Endothelial Keratoplasty (DSAEK) and Deep Anterior Lamellar Keratoplasty (DALK). During these sessions, surgeons practiced graft insertion and positioning with individualized, real-time insights from trained, highly experienced surgeon instructors.

Global Development

In December, Eversight and the Department of Health – Abu Dhabi (DoH), the regulator of the healthcare sector in the Emirate, are partnering to establish the first eye and tissue bank in the United Arab Emirates (UAE). The partnership was formalized at the recent International Conference for Initiatives on Organ and Tissue Donation and Transplantation in Abu Dhabi.

Eversight will handle the development and implementation of comprehensive medical standards, quality assurance protocols and standard operating procedures in compliance with all laws and regulations of the UAE and in accordance with eye banking best practices. The DoH will be responsible for obtaining all necessary approvals for the establishment and operation of the eye and tissue bank, serving as an importer for corneas and other eye-related tissues into the region and working to integrate the eye/tissue banking program with the UAE National Program for Organ Donation. This initiative will also strengthen mutual collaboration in activities related to knowledge sharing, human capability building and clinical research.

Eversight also continues to meet with Pakistani partners to discuss ongoing training and development initiatives, via a combination of virtual and in-person meetings.

SERVICE AREA Updates

MI: In November, 52 individuals registered for Eversight's first-ever Virtual Baking event with the renowned Zingerman's Bakehouse. This event raised a total of nearly \$1,500 to support organ and tissue donation and transplantation. Additionally, on Giving Tuesday this year, contributors gave nearly \$6,000 in support of Eversight's mission to restore sight and prevent blindness. Thank you to everyone who participated in the fun while supporting the gift of sight!

The number of delegates your club is entitled to for the District 11-C2 Convention is determined as follows: To be counted, the person has to have been a Lion for one year and one day as of February 1, 2023, meaning they have to have been listed as a member by January 31, 2022. (Note - They do not have to be a member that long to be a delegate.)

When you complete your Member Report Form for January, you can compute the number of delegates and alternates your club is entitled to and select your representative(s). List their names below on the **left** side of this form and include whether each representative listed is either a "delegate" (D) or an "alternate" (A). The Melvin Jones Fellowship Program



Lions Clubs International FOUNDATION

The Melvin Jones Fellowship Program is a generous way to show commitment to the humanitarian work of LCIF.

The MJF Program was established in 1973 in honor of Melvin Jones, the founder of Lions Clubs International. The MJF program recognizes donations of US\$1,000 to Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF).

New MJFs receive a pin, commemorative plaque and a letter from the LCIF Chairperson. If the donor so chooses, he/she may use their donation credit to recognize another individual with a MJF.

The Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship Program

The Progressive Melvin Jones Fellowship (PMJF) provides an opportunity to advance in the Fellowship program. For each subsequent donation of US\$1,000 beyond the initial MJF donation, donors receive a unique PMJF pin in accordance with their level of giving. Like MJFs, donors can recognize another individual with PMJF donations.

Areas of Giving

Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF) will now be able to help more people than ever before by making an even greater global impact with a focus on vision, youth, disaster relief and humanitarian work. Donors will receive MJF and PMJF credit when directing their support to:

- The Empowering Service Fund
- The General Disaster Fund

Empowering Service Fund: Any of LCIF's causes (sight, youth, disaster relief, humanitarian support, diabetes, childhood cancer, hunger, the environment).

Disaster Relief: Enables LCIF to direct the funds to the area's most in need following disasters to provide for immediate, mid and long-term relief. The Foundation will be able to immediately provide funds for large-scale disaster relief, rather than collecting and distributing funds over a period of weeks or months.





Districts, clubs and individuals can donate to LCIF through the Melvin Jones Fellowship Program, but only an individual can receive the recognition. MJF applications using collective donations from multiple donors must be accompanied by written consent from all donors to use their donations for MJF recognition for the individual specified on the application.

Melvin Jones Fellowships can be named in honor or in memory of an individual.

Melvin Jones Fellowships do not need to be paid in full at one time; minimum installments to LCIF of US\$100 can be paid over a five-year period to total US\$1,000, at which time the MJF Application is completed.

To whom it may concern:

Tri-County Office on Aging (TCOA) has been working with Lions Club International, specifically Lions of Michigan District 11C-2 with Dr. Tom Doyle, since January 2020 on the Diabetes PATH (Personal Action Toward Health) workshop. Diabetes PATH is a 6-week, evidence-based program to help individuals take control of their health and improve their self-management skills. The workshop was originally developed by Stanford University and TCOA has been directly offering it to residents of Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham Counties since 2015.

With the financial help from Lions Club International, TCOA has offered workshops in several formats to fit the needs of the community, including in person, virtual via Zoom, and mailed tool kits + weekly phone calls. The funds have also allowed TCOA to purchase 50 copies of the updated book for the workshop, "Living a Healthy Life with Chronic Conditions."

Since January 2020, TCOA has offered 3 in person workshops, 2 in person workshops that transition to virtual at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, 6 virtual workshops, and 9 mailed tool kits + weekly phone calls workshops. Combined, we have been able to reach 143 residents in our service area. With the funds still available, TCOA will continue to offer workshops in these different formats, and additional funds will go toward a leader training scheduled for March 2023 in Lansing, MI.

We appreciate the Lions Club International partnership and support for Diabetes PATH. If you have any questions, please contact me anytime.

Build Your Booth Show Success

What if you threw a party and nobody came? That's what it sometimes feels like at a booth show. If your Lions Club is typical, there are several times a year when you will participate in booth shows. Many clubs are shocked that so few people stop at their booth, but here's the truth: people make their minds up about your booth as soon as they see it. It only takes a second for them to determine whether they are interested in what you have to offer.

Your job is to make the most out of that second. Whether held inside or outside, the usual "two folding chairs behind a table" setup desperately needs changing. You are virtually invisible to people walking in front of your booth if you are sitting in a folding chair right behind a table. First, get any tables up to counter height and push them to the front of the booth. If possible, leave room to stand next to them, not behind them. If you need to relax a bit between visitors, bring a sturdy tall stool to perch on.

Backup staff who are ready to engage can stand behind the table. Put the folding chairs in the back of your booth and use them only for in-booth breaks or side conversations. Any additional staff should be able to rise, move forward, and engage as necessary. Below are some other simple steps you can take to increase your chances of meeting, engaging, and connecting with supporters, donors, and prospective members at your next event:

- Member staffers should Be friendly at the show. A simple smile and hello make it easier for people to talk with you. Have your most engaging people there to engage the attendees. And contrary to popular opinion, it's not all about extroverts. In fact, your introverts may make better staffers because of their skills in listening to other people.
- Having well-trained staff is a necessity at shows. They are meeting people face to face and need to be able to ascertain their interests quickly. Have them minimize discussions with other staff to focus on the attendees. If appropriate, they should also be able to capture contact information and follow up personally after the show.
- Personalize your approach. Prepare several possible questions for starting conversations with attendees who walk by the booth. You can say something simple like: "Do you have any old eyeglasses or hearing aids stashed away at home somewhere?"
- Know your assets. You should be able to explain and articulate what makes your club stand out in your community. This is particularly important when you are introducing a new project or working to revitalize a familiar one.
- Dress up. A "Lions look" ensures that people can identify your members right away, even when walking around outside the booth. Lions-themed clothing and gear makes members look distinctive and look like they're having fun!
- Be responsive. If people look thirsty, offer a bottle of

water. If they look tired, offer them an opportunity to sit down. (That's why you put the folding chairs at the back of your booth!)

- Stay hydrated. The reason many staffers have sore feet after working a show is more a product of dehydration than improper footwear. When not in use, stash your water bottle somewhere handy, but just out of sight.
- Get small giveaways to attendees. Tie them to your promotional message. Make sure the gifts you purchase are relevant to your audience. In another related article, we'll talk about the PR value in holding contests and sweepstakes.
- Consider adding a subtle appeal to the senses. Maybe a pleasing scent can be diffused -- or bring along fresh-baked cookies or popcorn.
- Good graphics are a great way to tell your story. When designing your materials think about the target audience. You want to pique their interest, so they want to talk to you and build a relationship.
- Only display information you want to showcase. People don't need to know everything about your club upfront. You can stash additional items behind or below and pull them out when appropriate to your conversation.
- Follow all the show guidelines. Always follow the rules. Remember, being invited back is very important. For example, If they say, "no balloons," don't do balloons! If they say, "stay in your booth," don't move out in the aisle.

There is no promotion quite like word of mouth. Talk with attendees! Flyers, brochures, and business cards only "aid word of mouth," they do not substitute for it. Bringing people to your booth is a matter of making your booth a great place to be. If you've got fun and games and the next booth doesn't, people will pass them by to get over to you. If you follow all these tips, you will have great success gathering attention with a small space and a positive return on investment. Good luck at your next show!
