
October 21 PDG Becky and myself volunteered at the MSU/UM football game with the hard working Wacousta Lions to help them with their concession stand fundraising activities.

Youth Camps & Exchange Program Outgoing Young Adult Ambassadors

Selection of a Lions Young Adult Ambassador

The appropriate selection of a young adult to represent a Lions Club, community, state, and America is of paramount importance. The choice should be a young adult who, it is believed, will make a good "ambassador" both in words and actions. Both areas of character are a reflection of the USA and are of equal importance. Academics are a factor in the selection process, but other areas of a person's character also demonstrate qualities of strength that make a good ambassador. These could be sports, music, leadership, technology, and the like. A young person with good character is what the Lions seek. A request to travel has never been denied if a young adult has interest. Young adult ambassadors that <u>have not</u> traveled with YCE previously will fill the slots for a country before a young adult ambassador that <u>has</u> traveled with YCE.

Lions believe that every opportunity should be extended to a young adult to expand his/her knowledge, international understanding, and education in cultural diversity. People of the world need to appreciate and understand one another. This can be done through exposure to the culture, through an immersion in the life of a family. As the world becomes smaller through technology, it is imperative that young adults have the opportunity to experience international cultural diversity in order to nurture an improved relationship with America's international neighbors. We do this with the International Lions Youth Exchange Program!

Time Line

September/October/November: District Chairs and committee members promote the program, focusing on and making personal contact with LEO Clubs and/or high schools in their District. Upon a young adult's commitment, the District Chairperson sends the initial application to the State Chairperson, Lion Elvie Marfil. A formal recognition of the young adult's acceptance into the Lions Club Youth Exchange Program will be sent from the state chairperson to both the District Chairperson and the young adult.

December 15 or before: The signed Application, Indemnity Form, and Compulsory Items must be received by State Chairperson Lion Elvie Marfil, epmarfil5@gmail.com. Some exceptions may apply with permission however, it must go through the District Chair to the State Chair. Signatures are needed at each level.

Upon Commitment until March 30 the LYE (Lions Youth Exchange) young adult's responsibilities include:

- Contact clubs via a phone call, letter or email correspondence to obtain donations for travel expenses. Make arrangements to meet with the club personally. A list of clubs and pertinent information is furnished by the District Chairperson. Many clubs will not donate unless there is face-to-face contact. The clubs want to know why this experience is important to the LYE young adult.
- Contact family and friends to solicit funds for travel expenses.
- Create, schedule, and execute fundraisers to raise money for the LYE experience.
- Attend the Fall District/Regional Lions Conference (usually in October) to make the LYE visible to the clubs. The clubs want to know why this experience is important to the LYE young adult.
- Obtain a passport and/or visa.

March 30: All funds should be gathered for travel expenses and submitted to State Chairperson Lion Elvie Marfil. February 28 is the deadline for all trip donations from the clubs.

March/April/May/June: Host families are found and flight tickets are purchased. Contact between the host country and the state LYE chairperson is not always immediate. Flight tickets cannot be purchased until a host family is found. Please stick closely to this timeline.

May: Youth and family must attend a mandatory meeting in Lansing for LYE parents/guardians, district LYE chairperson, and/or committee member. The LYE young adult will receive a backpack, shirts, pins, banners, flight tickets, insurance information, and general information about airports, security, filling out immigration forms, etc.

IMPORTANT: Any young adult not making the timeline as listed above will be dropped from that year's program, unless cleared by the District Chair and State Chair. This is a very time-consuming process for all involved, and it requires all involved to closely follow the deadlines.

Suggestions for LYE Fundraising

Create a display board, short 5-10 minute video, PowerPoint, or oral presentation about yourself and your desire to travel abroad. This can also be used when visiting a foreign country's Lions Club during your stay overseas.

Include these points and others as seen fit for your presentation:

- Name and family members
- Where you live
- Your involvement in sports, clubs, music, activities
- Other involvement, whether academic or community-based
- Places you have visited in the past
- Why do you want to visit another country? What will you take from the experience? As an Ambassador for the American Lions Clubs and America, how will you relate to the people of a foreign country? Will you be open to new experiences? Will you taste new foods? Will you practice your foreign language skills?
- 1. Contact clubs via a phone call, letter, or email correspondence to obtain donations for travel expenses. A copy of the PowerPoint or video could be sent to the clubs in lieu of a formal visit when letting the club know of the intent to travel with LYEP.
- 2. VERY IMPORTANT: Make arrangements to meet with the club personally. A list of clubs and pertinent information is furnished by the District Chairperson. Many clubs will not donate unless there is face-to-face contact. The clubs want to know why this experience is important to the LYE young adult. Present your short program to the clubs. They understand that you may be nervous. If timing or distance from a meeting is a problem, send your PowerPoint or a DVD of your video for them to present at a meeting. Follow up with a phone call to be certain that it was received; ask if there are any questions. Write a thank-you note for viewing your presentation at their meeting shortly after the meeting date. Do not wait for any funds to arrive; the clubs look for effort and gratitude.
- 3. Contact friends and family members. Email and/or Facebook are a good way to get the word out to distant family members. Send your PowerPoint or Video presentation. This demonstrates that you have exerted some effort in exchange for their monetary donation. It demonstrates responsibility and adult behavior.
- 4. Contact your church (if applicable) and ask to have a bake sale or car wash after Sunday Service.
- 5. Conduct a community car wash or bake sale. This could occur at a community function, library, or outside a local business.
- 6. Run, walk, or bike ride in an event. Gather pledges before the event occurs.

Public Relations Rules for Social Media

Maybe because the topic of the Public Relations Society conference I attended recently was "How to Use Generative AI," I was again reminded that I was now what they call an "old-school" communicator. However, I think that even as a PR and marketing veteran, some old-school rules can still apply in the social media age. (I'll tell you more about what I learned about using artificial intelligence in a future article.)

Social media has transformed classic public relations and marketing and is providing organizations like ours with countless opportunities to expose more stakeholders to our Lions message of "We Serve." Sounds like the best of all possible worlds, combining newer media with old? Maybe. Anyone can set up a Facebook page or Instagram account, but you probably need to still follow some traditional PR rules on these platforms.

Problems can arise when we rely too heavily on social media at the expense of tried-and-true PR and marketing strategies. As a PR practitioner for over 40 years, I've witnessed first-hand the advent of social media and the mistakes that were made when organizations jumped in quickly without considering goals and objectives in advance. To help you get acclimated, here are some "Be" rules for avoiding common pitfalls:

- Be honest, transparent, and authentic. Do not misrepresent yourself or your organization. Do not post false or misleading information or omit relevant facts. Disclose any affiliations, sponsorships, or conflicts of interest. Acknowledge and correct any errors or mistakes promptly.
- Be respectful and professional. Do not post anything that is offensive, abusive, discriminatory, or harmful to others. Do not engage in personal attacks, trolling, or flaming. Respect the privacy and confidentiality of others. Do not spam.
- Be strategic and relevant. Have a clear purpose and goal for your social media activities. Know your target audiences and tailor your content and tone accordingly. Provide value and quality to your followers. Use appropriate hashtags, keywords, and tags to optimize your visibility and reach.
- Be engaging and responsive. Listen to what your audience is saying and join the conversation. Encourage feedback and interaction. Respond to comments, questions, and complaints in a timely and courteous manner. Build relationships and trust with your followers.
- Be ethical and responsible. Follow Lions ethical standards. Respect the rules and policies of the social media platforms you use. Use reliable sources and cite them properly. Protect your reputation and credibility.
- Be personal. Sure, it's important to follow influencers and journalists on social media to keep tabs on their work. But social media "follows" won't necessarily lead to interviews and coverage of your service projects. Face-to-face relationships with media still bring the best results. With local news folks, you'll find that they always pay more attention to the community leaders they've met.
- Be attentive. Understand some of the media's hot buttons. Some reporters have designated "beats." Recently, I assisted a columnist from The Macomb Daily who specializes in writing about service organizations! Sometimes they are assigned to a geographic area. It's important to know any "assigned" topics and cater to precise coverage needs.
- Be visually memorable. Use quality photos and videos. With the advent of YouTube, video has become a more popular medium for distributing news and information. Avoid creating "grip and grin" photos or video "hideos"— tedious talking heads interspersed with PowerPoint slides. Sometimes your best video bet is to link to local TV news stories that cover your Lions Club activities.

Used as part of an integrated approach to communications, platforms like X (Twitter), Facebook, YouTube, and even Pinterest can amplify the impact of PR to build your Lions Club's reputation, create a loyal community of followers, and attract interested prospective members. But remember that social media is a communication tool, not a substitute for all communication.
