

Perhaps the most well-known

member of the club is Ralph Lynam, who had the distinction of serving as Lions International President in 1978-79. He was originally elected as Lions International Third Vice President in 1974-75, the same year that the St. Johns Lions raised funds to send the St. Johns High School Redwing Marching Band to the International Convention, held in Dallas, Texas. The event prompted the start of another well-known group – the Michigan Lions All-State Band. Following the success in Texas of the SJHS band, other Michigan clubs joined with St. Johns to form the All-State Band group, which was conducted for many years by SJHS band director and Lion, Walt Cole.

The Ralph A. Lynam Award was established by District 11-C2 in his honor and is presented to a club president who has done outstanding work in the club, district, and state.

Since the inception of the St. Johns Lions Club, three members have served as District Governor, including L. Russell Steffens (1954-55), Ralph Lynam (1967-68), and Charles Barnes (1973-74).





## **Lions Clubs Key to Leadership Development**

I was speaking with a small business owner recently and she told me that she was stressed out dealing with an influx of new hires in her company. She was now spending a lot of time helping train the newbies, especially in "soft skills" needed for customer service. She was also having quite a bit of trouble getting her current employees to step up to supervisory roles recently vacated by retirees. That meant she couldn't share the training load with many of her existing employees.

Remembering the last time this happened in our local economy, I was ready with a suggestion. Back then, I was attending a Chamber of Commerce event when the owner of a small chain of auto parts stores spoke up. "How can I find leadership training for my employees who are reluctant to be promoted? Some would be good managers if only they had confidence and learn the necessary skills," he said."

Several of us in the meeting suggested he look to community organizations for help. For a relatively small investment in "paid time off" and dues money, he could provide those opportunities for his folks -- and get some good public relations for his business at the same time. We told him that many companies (usually banks and other financial institutions) regularly assign their more senior employees to join local organizations.

Today's dynamic work environments place a premium on making sure there is a robust leadership pipeline for the future even in small companies. Identifying and selecting the best potential leaders are, therefore, critical strategic objectives for ensuring a sustainable, competitive organization.

Asking an employee to join and participate isn't enough, though. They usually need to be supported by their workplace and family. Lions can make a good case being the membership of choice, though. Those of us who are Lions Club members know that, as a global network of service clubs with over 1.4 million members, we are an impressive way to develop leadership skills. We offer our members a variety of opportunities to discover individual talents, network with other members, and work together to make a difference in our communities.

We also offer our members the opportunity to take part in a Lions Leadership Institute. That experience provides knowledge and skills focused on team building, managing change, presentation skills, action planning/goal setting, effective listening, and other qualities of leadership. However, it is your Club's job to let owners and managers know about all those opportunities.

When deciding which employees to promote, the Society for Human Resources Management suggests that companies should consider a variety of factors, including:

- 1. Performance: Employees who exceed expectations and deliver high-quality work should be prioritized for promotion.
- 2. Skills and experience: Employees who have the skills and experience required for the higher-level role should be considered for promotion.
- 3. Potential: Employees who have demonstrated the potential to succeed in the higher-level role should be considered for promotion. This includes employees who have taken on new challenges, learned new skills, and shown a strong work ethic.
- 4. Leadership potential: Employees who have shown leadership potential, such as by mentoring other employees or taking on leadership roles in projects, should be considered for promotion.
- 5. Cultural fit: Employees who are a good fit for the company's culture and values should be considered for promotion. It is also important to consider diversity and inclusion when making promotion decisions. Companies should strive to promote a workforce that reflects the communities they serve.

Now, you can see connection! Lions Club participation and leadership gives their people transferrable skills that make a company's promotion decisions much easier. Consider having quality conversations about all this with the local owners and top managers of businesses in your community. It is more than good public relations. It is also a good way for your Lions Club to help meet the "Mission 1.5" membership challenge.
