A Planning Tool for Organizing Your First Children's Vision Screening under the Michigan Lions KidSight Initiative

According to educational experts, 80% of learning is visual. If children can't see well, they will have more difficulty learning.

Project SEE CLEARLY '21 is a national vision screening and correction campaign to help clear the national backlog of the 25 MILLION children – aged 6 mos and through early grade school—who have gone for nearly 2 years without a basic vision screening due to pandemic interruption. This volunteer initiative is brought to you by the Lions KidSight USA- a nation-wide program that brings Lions clubs across the country together to ensure our children receive eye screenings and follow-up care when needed.

1-in-3 young children have poor but correctable vision - often just needing eyeglasses.

- We're national we've created a coordinated national coalition of active and experienced Lions vision screeners.

Take These 3 Steps To Conduct KidSight Vision Screenings in YOUR town:

1

Send an info pack to either all public elementaries, or any early child care centers, to get their permission to host a vision screening.

2

Identify 3-6 people to be certified as a children's vision screener.

3

Secure a screening instrument from your Lions District KidSight Team.





FIRST 30 DAYS

SEND permission approval letter packet to schools and/or early child centers and nursery schools. Identify 3 or more club members willing to become a Certified Vision Screener as well as commit to one half day, or ideally a few half days, to conduct the vision screenings.

SECOND 30 DAYS

FOLLOW-UP with the area's schools and/or early child care centers to set a day and time for the screening; provide any assistance needed in securing parental/guardian permission (assuming the facility does not already have a 'global permission' in place).

SECURE a screening device from your Lions Disrict KidSight Team.

CREATE an "Upcoming Service Project" posting in MyLion for the vision screening initiative, which will help generate excitement plus help with coordination.

FINAL 30 DAY STRETCH

ASSIGN a responsible person or party to ensure that all KidSight screening data for your event was collected and forwarded to your Lions District KidSight Coordinator(s) or the Lions of Michigan Foundation office.

ENSURE that referral information was provided to each family with a child requiring follow-up eye care with an optometrist or ophthalmologist. Families without insurance or who need help with obtaining follow-up eye care for their child or children should be referred to the Lions of Michigan Foundation office - www.lmsf.net - info@lmsf.net - 517-887-6640.

PLAN to Celebrate your Success for organizing and conducting an event to identify and help children suffering from vision loss in your community.

Rinse, repeat again...till every child is given the chance to **SEE CLEARLY**.

WHAT IS "CANDY DAYS"?

A Candy Day is an all-out 1-day street promotion held in the Fall of the year. The concept is simple and easy to execute. Lion Club members stand in areas of high traffic, much like during White Cane Week, and give away rolls of Lion Mints in exchange for donations. Most clubs that participate in Candy Days earn an average profit of \$1 per roll on the mints they distribute during Candy Days. Clubs that have countertop sales usually notice increased sales after a Candy Day.

Plan for Success!

Prior Planning will increase a club's potential for a successful Candy Days fundraiser.

- Determine sales locations and assign work schedules for your members. It is suggested that members work in teams of two for two hours.
- 2. Have county/city leaders pass a Candy Days Resolution.
- 3. Check local solicitation laws and obtain permits as necessary.
- 4. Do local advertising at least one week prior to your sale and indicate what your proceeds will be used for use the radio, newspaper, and public broadcasting network to advertise your sale.
- Make collection containers.
 A container that you can see through with a starter dollar works effectively.

- 6. On the day of the event, proudly wear your Lions apparel and some type of apron to hold the candy and any information to be distributed. Nail aprons work well.
- * Proper wrap-up procedures will insure future success.
- Count and deposit all money collected and make a complete report to the club at the next scheduled meeting.
- 2. Thank each member who helped and the local merchants that provided space for the solicitation.
- 3. Thank the community for their support in a follow-up article in the local paper.





Why report service

How do clubs and districts individually benefit from reporting service?

- » Reporting service helps transfer knowledge and best practices to your club's future leaders. Club officers can review past service activity reports, learn from the successes of the club's previous activities and better plan for their future activities.
- » Reporting service is a matter of local pride. Reporting puts your club on the map as leaders in your local community, and it's an important way to share success with other clubs in your district and around the world.
- » A high percentage of clubs reporting service is a sign of a healthy district.
- » Reporting service allows you to become eligible for service awards.

How do clubs and districts collectively benefit from reporting service?

- Reporting shines a light on how and where local clubs are making a difference.
 This elevates the profile of Lions Clubs International as a global service club organization.
- » Service reports provide tangible evidence of our global engagement and impact to prospective partners of Lions Clubs International. These relationships strengthen the organization and yield benefits at the local level.
- » People want to participate in real, visible change. Service reporting allows clubs to continually engage communities, tell stories more effectively and ultimately grow their member base.

How does reporting service benefit the people we serve?

- » Service data helps everyone understand the needs of communities around the world and how our Lions and Leos are serving those needs.
- » Because service activities are scalable, one small service project can become the next global initiative of the organization. But Lions Clubs International is not aware of such projects unless they are reported.
- » Service data enables Lions Clubs International to identify best practices that can be shared globally.
- » Measurement leads to insight. Setting higher goals each year mobilizes the organization toward growth.
- » Service reports show how Lions and Leos around the world are using funds from Lions Clubs International Foundation grants to serve their communities. This visibility encourages Lions and Leos to think creatively about their own projects and apply for LCIF grants themselves.

Additional benefits

- » Reporting is the final step in completing a service project. If it's not reported, it's not done!
- » Reporting service is a lot like voting. You may think your report doesn't make a big difference, but the only way we'll be successful is if everyone does their small part.
- » Reporting is considered service in itself. The time clubs and districts spend reporting their service are considered volunteer hours, and can be reported in MyLion.
