A NOTE FROM DG ANNETTE



Eversight plays a very important role in each of our communities when it comes to sight restoration. Last year in Michigan there were 2,082 donors. There were 1,444 cornea tissue transplants with 832 tissues used for research. In District 11-B1, there were 173 donors in 2023 and 125 recipients of cornea tissue transplants. This included transplants in every county in our District!

We know that many clubs support Eversight at the Parade of Checks but there are also other ways you as a Lion or your club can support the mission of Eversight. The one area that I would ask for your support is getting involved in their yearly fundraiser- "GOLF for GOOD".

LIONS OF MICHIGAN FOUNDATION – VSP CERTIFICATES By Dave Hill, PCC, PDG

One of the great benefits of your support of the Lions of Michigan Foundation is the support the Foundation gives back.

I, Dave Hill, recently got an inquiry from a club concerning my last newsletter article. One of the club's primary service projects is to help the local school system. They regularly receive requests to help students obtain prescription glasses and the club has provided payment for the students to obtain them. The club wanted to know how to obtain assistance from the Foundation to provide students with new glasses.

The Lions of Michigan Foundation can provide a VSP certificate good for up to \$150 to obtain new prescription glasses for the uninsured and under-insured. Please note that the certificate covers a comprehensive eye exam, single vision or lined multifocal lenses, and up to \$150 for eyeglass frames.

The club asked three questions. The following is my reply on how to obtain a VSP certificate from the Foundation:

1. Is the application completed by a member of our Lions Club on behalf of the un(der)insured member of the community or is it completed by the un(der)insured person?

Answer - The parent or guardian of a child <u>under eighteen</u> years of age would typically complete the form. If the person who needs the glasses is <u>over eighteen</u> years old, they would complete and sign the form. If the applicant is over eighteen years of age, you must attach a Social Security document or IRS document that shows their income for the last year. The form requires that they state their income, insurance, other personal information and to sign it.

* * *

2. Once the application is completed and submitted to the Foundation, what is the turnaround time for the VSP certificate?

Answer - I have scanned and emailed the completed forms to Chad McCann at the Foundation and the VSP certificate is typically received by the community member in less than a week.

* * *

3. Does the VSP certificate get sent to our Club or to the un(der)insured community member? or to the VSP provider?

Answer - Typically Chad would send the form to the mailing address on the form unless you ask for it to be delivered to another address or picked up in Lansing.

* * *

4. Is it possible for our Club to pay the \$150 on behalf of the un(der)insured community member and then be reimbursed by the Foundation? or is that outside of the process?

Answer - To receive assistance from the Foundation, you must apply and receive approval <u>before</u> the person receives the procedure. I do not believe that the club can receive reimbursement for assistance they have already given without prior approval from the Foundation.

* * *

The VSP certificate is only honored by providers that accept them. You would have to check with the providers in your area to see if they will accept the VSP certificate.

It has been a privilege to be District 11-B1's Foundation Trustee for the last four years, but I will not be running for a third term. During the last four years, the District has received Foundation assistance that has far exceeded

our contributions. The Foundation has been a great supporter of 11-B1 clubs and is very deserving of our support.

Thank you for your support during the last four years. I will continue to be a member of the Foundation Board for the next year as the Immediate Past President and will continue to provide assistance to any club concerning the Foundation. Just call, text, or email me.

Winter Camp for the Blind is on the books for 2024 and all our campers are safely home with fond memories of another weekend with old and new friends. This is the warmest camp I can remember. While there were frosty mornings and chilly evenings the daytimes were cool but pleasant, requiring jackets for the outdoor activities. There was almost no snow, so the camp favorite sleigh ride was replaced by a two-horse drawn wagon ride through the wooded area around the camp. The big attraction for this event is the beautiful horses (Percherons) and the campers love to feel and pet the animals before they take a ride.

We were honored to have Bobby Holley and Tyrone as our entertainers for Friday evening and the youth of the MYCA/MYJC assisted the campers. There were lots of Lions to help, both at the camp and the railway station. I thank everyone for their service in this challenging and fun project.







On Friday evening the campers get to relax after their train journey with dinner and a chance to meet up with old friends. This is the only major outing of the year for many of the campers and they are eager, and excited to get going.

Friday evening is concert night, and we have a keyboard player from the Detroit area that has been a favorite for many years. This is Tyrone at the keyboard. He is blind. The campers love him and sing along. He even wrote a special song for the camp called 'Welcome to Winter Camp' that most of the campers know. Our other 'star' is Bobby Holley, a local entertainer and activist. Bobby is a real ball of fire! You can see how well he interacts with the campers. Some of them get up and dance with him or sing along with him.









Bingo is one of the most popular events at camp. The event is run by the Bedford Area Lions Club which is an amalgamation of the original Bedford Lions Club and the Bedford Lioness Club. The campers are helped by Lions volunteers and youth from the MYCA/MYJP. Campers who can read braille can use the braille bingo sets. The Bedford Area Lions provide most of the prizes. As you can see, there are at least twice as many prizes as there are players.





New this year was a service project coordinated by Clear Lake Virtual Lion Gina and Manchester Lion Peggy Allen. PCC Peggy Allen brought all of the supplies. Campers did all of the work. The idea for this gained ground after a blanket making session in Manchester that had our blind 2nd VDG Bea Furman showing that sight challenged people can make tie blankets that have been prepared, with the cuts around the edges done ahead of time.


It was a great hit at the camp, with many campers and a few volunteers lending a hand. The finished blankets will be donated to Maggie's Wigs for Kids to be used by the children with cancer to use as travel blankets as they go to their numerous doctors appointments.





Another highlight, and much appreciated service at the camp, is white cane repair and replacement. Hosted by Cereal City Lions Teresa Gest and Mary Wallace. The campers get their canes repaired, retaped, or new tips. If the canes are beyond repair, they receive a new cane,

This service is complimentary from the camp and there is usually a line of campers anxious to get their lifeline canes fixed after a year of wear and tear.



Crafts have been a popular option for campers for many years.



Another camp favorite is the gadgets and devices tables where Western Michigan University students demonstrate new technologies available to the campers to help with their disability.

The picture shows J J Medaugh demonstrating devices that he has developed or modified to assist blind people. JJ's devices are made with consideration for being affordable, which is important to our campers who have limited financial resources due to their restricted, or non-existent, vision.

Thanks for all your work, JJ and students!

Saturday afternoon activities wrap up with a vespers service before heading off to dinner.

This year the camp food was catered and the campers remarked on the improved food quality. This did result in higher costs to run the program, but it seems that it was well worth it. Campers sit at round tables, each of which includes a youth helper from the MYCA/MYJP. Volunteers serve each table family style and make sure that the large serving platters are refilled as required. They serve the individual campers and when everyone is finished, they break down the tables, take all the plates and silverware to the kitchen, wipe down the tables, and then mop the floor.

Saturday evening is a talent show put on by the campers themselves, and boy are many of them talented! We have singers, dancers, and even a comedian and musical instrument players. They are accompanied by Tyrone on the keyboard and enjoy an evening of fun and comradery, which is a great ending to the camp.

The camp King and Queen are crowned, they are elected by their fellow campers.

WHAT IS MICHIGAN YOUTH CHALLENGE ACADEMY?







Our Mission: The Michigan Youth Challenge Academy (MYCA) educates, trains, and mentors' at-risk youth in a quasi-military environment at no cost to participants, giving young people the skills to become productive and responsible citizens. Applying the military model to alternative education, the Academy promotes competency development through academic opportunities, life skills, and vocational preparation.

The Michigan Youth Challenge Academy was established in 1999 and is part of the National Guard Youth Challenge Program (NGYCP), which was established by the National Guard in 1993. NGYCP currently operates 40 programs in 28 states, Puerto Rico, and the District of Columbia. The National Guard Youth Challenge Program is a voluntary 17.5-month (5.5 month residential/12 month post-residential) program that helps at-risk youth earn their high school diploma or GED, in a very disciplined and structured environment using the military model. Challenge works with program participants after graduation to help enroll in college, trade school, start a career or join the military.

Participants can expect to work hard as they complete the eight core components that are the foundation of our program. In the process, young adults will develop accountability, integrity, teamwork, and time management qualities, and build the grit and resilience necessary to successfully navigate adulthood.

MYCA runs two cycles each year, beginning in mid-January and mid-July. Application and selection for each cycle begins several months in advance.

Michigan Job Challenge Program is only open to MI Youth Challenge Program Graduates.

The Michigan Job Challenge Program (MJCP) is an extension program of the Michigan Youth Challenge Academy. The focus of the MJCP program is to teach MYCA graduates workplace essentials, provide skilled trades training (base-level instruction and in some cases, certifications) and aid in job placement. A variety of pathways are typically offered, including (but not guaranteed):

MYCA/MJCP programs require community service, and the cadets often support projects such as Winter Camp and camp clean-up projects. They also serve as honor guards for the District Convention. It's amazing to see these youth transition from risk to engaged and productive citizens.

DISTRICT ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICE PROJECT




