His respected work in the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency that shed light on the health effects of toxins in the air has benefited people across this country and globally. He was always interested in nature and our environment, and loved reading about history. His work with others in our neighborhood to save the nearby historic bridge over the Huron River won him an award from the State of Michigan for the preservation of Michigan history.

Most of all, he was a joy to all. Caring, insightful, funny, hardworking; the word we keep hearing when talking about Rich with friends, coworkers, and others is "kind." People loved to work with him, and his family felt his loving kindness each day. He is dearly missed.

PARADE OF CHECKS 2023

Please take note of the procedure for this year. This year we will have each club write ONE CHECK to cover their entire donation and Cabinet Treasurer Barry Allen will tabulate the donations and send ONE check to each of the Projects\Foundations\Funds on behalf of district clubs.

The parade of checks will proceed as normal, with each club bringing their donation check (just one check) up to the front to be announced and collected. We will not have a dozen baskets for individual project checks.

Everyone is encouraged to read the Parade of Checks distribution reasoning (below). Some categories do not need funding while others need more funding. The current balance of each is listed on the distribution form. This funding information is provided to assist clubs in making informed decisions.

DISTRIBUTION REASONING

Every year the budgets for individual projects and committees change based on their current balance, expenses, and anticipated needs. Read each category carefully to determine your donations. Further information on projects and foundations is available in the Roster Book or online.

FOUNDATIONS:

Lions Clubs International Foundation – This is where funds come from for emergency grants, and for specific grants to fund local projects beyond the scope of the District, such as the new SPOT camera systems and KidSight trailers, and the \$10,000 grant for emergency services for Dexter Tornado victims. Historically the US receives more funds than are donated from within the US. **Provide a sizeable donation**.

Lions of Michigan Service Foundation – This is where we get our Lions Mints, but more so, they provide grants for cataract surgery and hearing aids, and eye surgery beyond the scope of the club level. They also provide emergency grants for home fires and flooding. Every year they are limited in the number of grants presented, based on the donations received. Our District has received lots of support from their Foundation. **Provide a sizeable donation**.

STATE/MULTIPLE DISTRICT 11/JOINT PROJECTS:

All funds donated to these projects is a pass-through so your funds will go directly to that project.

Bear Lake Camp – The camp aspires to provide a preeminent summer outdoor recreational/educational experience for children of special needs, visually impaired, and other conditions. **They always need funding**.

Leader Dogs for the Blind – The premier facility for training Leader Dogs and Mobility, providing Leader Dogs at no cost to blind/visually impaired individuals. **They always need funding**.

Michigan All-State Band – Musicians from around the state gather to participate in the Lions Clubs International Convention parade. Normally students provide their own funding, these funds are to support the staff which must accompany them. Some funding is desired.

Michigan Braille Transcribing – This organization is now self-funded but needs Lions support to maintain their non-profit status. Some **minimal funding is desired**.

Radio Reading Services – Provides special radios with scripted reading of newspapers and articles for the blind at no cost to them. They are part of the PBS station in Lansing and **require some funding.**

Eversight Michigan – Originally the Michigan Eye Bank, they provide corneal transplants to patients in need. Much of their funding comes from the Lions of Michigan, a **sizable donation** is requested.

Paws with a Cause – provides service animals which provide various services for clients with disabilities which enhances their independence and quality of life. **A sizable donation is requested.**

Penrickton Center for Blind Children – provides day care and weekly live in care for children with visual impairment and another disability at NO COST to the parents. A major portion of their income is from Lions. **A sizable donation is requested.**

DISTRICT PROJECTS:

District Projects (Undesignated) – Invariably, there are times we do not receive adequate funds to fulfill the needs in every project or committee for the Lions year. This fund helps to shift funds to emerging needs, since we are limited on how we use funds designated for individual projects. This also opens the door to new district projects not originally funded and supporting the District Governor's projects. Due to a recent redistribution of funds, this fund **does NOT need further funding.**

Michigan Youth Academy – The MYCA cadets have been instrumental in supporting a number of district events as the honor guard, and invaluable support at the Winter Camp for the Blind. A donation to them ensures their continued success and is money well spent on rehabilitating these at risk individuals. We use the funds to pay for their meals when they assist at Winter Camp, and various District functions like the Convention. A moderate funding is requested.

Winter Camp – Every year camp costs continue to increase and although the adult participants pay a registration fee, we try to keep the fee reasonable because of their limited income. Campers come from all over southern Michigan and other districts, so expenses incurred should be picked up by the clubs on a shared basis. The continued success of the camp is directly dependent upon the donations from the district Lions Clubs. Although this year they have a healthy balance due to COVID and having a virtual camp which resulted in carryover funds, this is one of our more expensive district projects and always needs to seek financial assistance. A moderate funding is requested.

DISTRICT COMMITTEES

Children's Services – This fund has seen renewed activity as it has been the basis of funding for several special projects involving children which fall outside some of the other project guidelines. The committee is expanding the service opportunities for visually impaired and autistic children and opening doors for shared commitment to supporting our needy children. Moderate funding is requested.

Diabetes – The diabetes committee has been very active in bringing diabetes awareness to people within our district, and participated in the Defense Against Diabetes state-wide initiative. They have a balance of over \$6,000 with no expenditures last year, and no proposals on projects for this year. **Provide minimal funding at this time.**

Hearing & Speech – These funds assist in obtaining hearing aids for needy persons through the Affordable Hearing Aid Program if an individual or Lions Club do not have the money to support the program. Having funds in this account will ensure eligible recipients will be able to participate without worrying if their family or Lions Club can pay the fitting fees. We've transferred funds into this account to support their cause. **Moderate funding is requested**.

KidSight (District Expenses) – The Lions of Michigan Foundation took over the administrative control of KidSight throughout the state to provide permissions and follow-up with those children who refer for further evaluation. Additionally they now provide insurance on the equipment, administrative supplies, and reimbursement of expenses. Only **residual funds** are needed at the District level to purchase replacement supplies, even though the Foundation will reimburse.

Leos of the District – Due to COVID and the lack of meetings and activities, ALL of our LEO clubs disbanded. We have reduced their funding to a \$2000 balance to assist in restarting some of the clubs, but at this time, **NO FUNDING** is required.

Peace Poster – The district provides awards for the top Peace Poster winners and has some administrative expenses as awards to students who place in the competition in conducting this program. This year the District has decided to buy the Peace Poster kits so every club can participate if desired. Winners are provided cash awards. This is a low cost program, but **some funding is necessary.**

Reading Action Program - This program was started as a one year event but became so popular it was extended several more years by LCI. The district is on board with this program and needs funds to support the various aspects. The Reading Action Program allows Lions to provide additional assistance to individuals with visual impairments, particularly by focusing on Braille literacy and access to assistive technology as well as encouraging our youth and adults to read and promote literacy. Annually, they run out of funds, so some money was transferred to their account to support their needs. This program **needs moderate funding.**

Sight Conservation – The Sight Conservation committee promotes the preservation of sight and prevention of blindness. Funds are kept in reserve to augment purchasing glasses for the needy when and if a smaller club cannot afford the expense. The account has a healthy balance so a program is being formed to reimburse the clubs for their support of eyeglasses for their participants. **Some moderate funding is required**.

Youth Exchange – Donations to this project can be used to balance the funding for the students to ensure they are able to participate in the Youth Exchange. Individual YE participants will send letters to all the Lions Clubs requesting funding specific funding, but differences in projected costs, and donations leave some students with enough money to cover their trip, and others lacking. Due to COVID, this program came to a screeching halt and has not gotten off the starting blocks yet. Until we get more students and families involved, this program does not currently need funding.

Youth Outreach, Drug Awareness & Quest – This program has a sizable balance which is currently not being used to the fullest. In an expansion of the intent of these programs, funds are now being considered for other youth activities which promote healthy lifestyles and decisions. The account **does not need additional funds** at this time.



YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAM (YCE)

Is the YCE Program Right for Me?

Are you ready to embark on a life-changing adventure that will open your mind and heart? Are you curious about other cultures and ways of life? Do you want to develop your skills in a second language? Would you like to cultivate new friendships with individuals that have different backgrounds, beliefs, and customs than you? The Youth Camps and Exchange (YCE) Program may be the opportunity you are seeking.

Benefits of Participation

As a YCE you will:

- Live with a family in another country Meet people your age from around the world
- Learn about what it means to be a Lion or Leo in another country
- Deepen your understanding of yourself and the world around you
- Learn how to foster peace and understanding among peoples of the world

What to Expect

As a Youth Camp and Exchange you can expect to be immersed in a unique cultural experience with Lions and Leo club members supporting your YCE journey. Your host family will treat you as a member of the family, awaiting your engagement in typical daily routines and family meals. You will participate in social activities, possibly service projects and visit cultural places of interest. You are expected to familiarize yourself with the customs, expectations, and basic language of the host country prior to your visit and have a desire to learn more. You can learn more about the roles and expectations of a Youth Exchange by checking out the Youth Camp and Exchange Handbook!

Participant Eligibility

The suggested age range for Youth Camp and Exchange is 15-22. Please note age range can vary by specific Youth Camp and Exchange program.

Youth Camp and Exchange must:

- Be sponsored by a Lions club
- Be ready to represent your community, country and the sponsoring Lions club
- Welcome the opportunity to explore the customs of another culture
- Provide proof of insurance (health, medical, travel) and a liability release agreement
- Take initiative to learn the language of the host country (i.e. basic greetings and phrases)

What are the Costs?

Local program costs vary from country to country. Financial arrangements for transportation may be paid by the Sponsor Lions Club, by the Exchange Youth, the Exchange Youth's family or a combination of these sources. Host Lions clubs cover the costs of room and board with a host family. Exchange Youth are typically responsible for:

- Round-trip airfare
- Camp Fees
- Health, medical and travel insurance
- Travel documents (such as passports and visas)
- Spending money

Mr. Weir was a fixture to most of us who attended Michigan School for the Blind. He was the dean of students when I came, a role he later returned to when Mr. Zarka left. I can't speak for others but I can say for me, I never had any issues with him, even as an adult.

I remember showing up at one of the alumni breakfasts, when he came. He treated me like it had been yesterday when I saw him last, when in actuality, it had been close to thirty years. At that time, Mom was still alive. He asked after her health and how the rest of my family was doing.

What a lot of us at MSB did not know was his involvement with Lions, and the countless hours he spent in humanitarian aid. He went on several missions to deliver glasses. I remember one of the guys growing at our church telling us about some of those trips, as he took them with him. But, the thing I remember hearing him say about those trips, when I was at his district's convention in 2001, was that he did it because it was important to serve.

He also went on to develop with lots of help the Lions Leadership Institute that is held at Higgins Lake. I've attended two sessions of that, and I learned a lot.

Mr. Weir, I am so honored to have the award that bears your name. But, like you, I did not win it because of any great thing I've accomplished. Like you, I've stepped up and served. Thank you for being a hero of mine, without even knowing it!"
