

Chelsea Area Service Groups Support St. Louis Center with Golf Cart

When Rotarian Paul Schissler of Chelsea takes on service project, he takes it on in a big way. As a member of the Chelsea Rotary Club, he thought it would be a great idea to help fellow Rotarian Fr. Joseph Rinaldo, SdC., by obtaining a golf cart to help him get around St. Louis Center's sprawling campus five miles west of Chelsea in Sylvan Twp. What made this project unique however, was that he thought it would be fun to involve the other service clubs in the community to combine their forces for good. That made this a shared project between the Rotary Club, Knights of Columbus, Lions Club, and Kiwanis Club.

To complete the project, Schissler negotiated the price of a surplus golf cart at Reddeman Farms, and then added modifications to it. According to Schissler, these included, "a rear seat kit, heavy duty rear suspension kit, and a folding windshield kit." He performed all of the conversion work himself, and each organization kicked in 25% of the \$1264 project. The logos for each of the clubs were added for their contributions, and the golf cart was formally presented to St. Louis Center on Thursday October 8, 2015.

St. Louis Center is a residential care home for children and adults with intellectual and developmental disabilities, and has been run by the Servants of Charity congregation of the Catholic Church since 1960. As we all know, club contributions count towards the Melvin Jones Fellowship, but individuals may also contribute towards a MJF by donating \$1000, with a minimum amount of \$100 per payment, over a 5 year period.

Don't have \$1000 to spare? Well you can become a contributing member through the Contributing Member program. For as little as \$20 you can get a LCIF sustaining member bronze pin. There are also silver pins for \$50 and Gold for \$100.

District Coordinators each have a supply of the bronze pins and have the applications available for the others as well. Although these do not count towards a MJF, they do count towards a clubs contribution for the year. These pins are printed with the date on them, so each year's pins are different.

Dear District Governors and Council Chairs,

On behalf of Lions Clubs International, I kindly ask for your help in generating grassroots support for an important bill that is being considered by the U.S. Congress. In 1997, U.S. President Bill Clinton signed into law the Volunteer Protection Act of 1997 ("Act") which provides immunity to individual volunteers of service club or volunteer organizations in the U.S. However, the Act does not provide immunity to the organization itself.

Unfortunately, negligence claims filed against service club or volunteer organizations often result in judgments requiring nonprofit organizations such as Lions clubs to pay large sums of money in punitive damages. Lions Clubs International believes the Act is incomplete and exposes nonprofit organizations to increased financial risk, thereby threatening the viability of volunteerism in the U.S.

Recognizing the need to protect service club and volunteer organizations in the U.S., Lions Clubs International engaged Congressman Steve Chabot of Ohio as well as U.S. Senator Mark Kirk of Illinois and developed a bill to correct this issue and amend the '97 Act. Volunteer Organization Protection Act of 2015 ("VOPA") was subsequently introduced into Congress this year!

I'm asking you to encourage Lions from your district(s) to contact and urge their respective Member of Congress and U.S. Senator to co-sponsor H.R.2290 (U.S. House bill) and S.1684 (U.S. Senate bill).

This bill does not raise the standard of liability for organizations, but it protects organizations such as Lions clubs from being held vicariously liable when the organization was not involved with an incident causing harm. This piece of legislation will support the mission of Lions clubs by releasing financial resources previously allocated to support costly liability insurance. The result is increased viability and growth for local nonprofit organizations such as Lions clubs.

Please visit LCI's online advocacy page for additional resources concerning the VOPA, including a Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) document and, also, form letters that can be sent to Members of the U.S. House of Representatives in support of H.R.2290 and U.S. Senators in support of S.1684 through their respective websites (online contact forms) or fax numbers. Lions are also encouraged to call their local Congressional office and ask their legislators to sign on to the bill!

I hope you find this information useful and I wish you, as well as Lions in your district(s), the best in bringing this matter to the attention of our lawmakers in Washington D.C. There are presently 32 co-sponsors on the House bill (HR.2290) and one co-sponsor on the Senate bill (S.1684), and we intend to build on those numbers to ensure timely passage of the legislation in this Congress.



EDITOR'S CORNER

Cell Phone Pics vs. Digital Camera Pics...and the Winner Is...!

Many times I get a contributing Lion sending me pictures for the newsletter that they took on their cell phone (or tablet). Please keep in mind that – upon closer inspection – these pictures are often out of focus or fuzzy, grainy, etc., from lack of sufficient lighting. If you have no choice but to take a photo with your phone, please try to shoot no less than 3 (I recommend 5) exposures of each pose or subject – because at least 2 of the 3 will probably not measure up.

For group photos: if your phone lets you pick the spot to focus in on (I love that feature), pick a different spot each time, like a different person's face or different center of mass. Phone cameras can have a mind of their own sometimes and what you focused on isn't what ends up being in focus!

I recommend using a standard digital camera with at least 3.3 Megapixels (MP) but 10MP-12MP will usually get you better results. Even so, it is always best to review the photo you just took (and zoom in when reviewing!) to ensure you got a good, clear shot before letting your subjects wander off.

When submitting your photos, please send them to me full size. Don't let your e-mail software or camera/phone compress them if you can avoid it. I can handle BIG downloads!

Thanks for all the great (and not-so-great) photos you send in! If there's one thing I've learned from this job is a photo isn't always worth a thousand words...sometimes it's only worth 7: "You need to get a better camera!"

REMEMBER: What you are going to do (upcoming events) are just as important as what you did! The Newsletter is a great way to get your events publicized! Be sure to put them on page 2 of your M&A! (toss in the who, what, when and where - ok?)

By using such a survey we hope it gives the clubs insight into the expectations of their new members, maybe give the club a few new ideas and show the new member the club cares about what they think and just maybe give us enough of an edge to keep that member so they don't get disillusioned in 6 months because their interests are not being met.

Remember bringing in a new member is only half the battle, keeping them and the ones we already have is our only sure way to grow!

- 8. Must attend the Lions of Michigan Forum to accept scholarship during a ceremonial presentation. (Actual check(s) will be issued to the school/university/equipment manufacturer upon submission of documentation. Two weeks notice required).
