Obituary:

Betty Rose (Morehouse/Osburn) Robins of Glenmore Village in Battle Creek, Michigan passed away surrounded by her family at the Glen Arbor Hospice in Battle Creek on Wednesday, September 21, 2022.

Betty was born in Detroit on February 5, 1928, to Rose and Ray Morehouse. She moved to Battle Creek as an infant, attending Battle Creek Central and graduating from Kellogg Community College with a degree in English Arts. She was employed at the Federal Center in DLA, then moved to a job at Kellogg's, where she retired.

She was an active member of the Westlake Presbyterian Church, recently transferring to First Presbyterian Church. Beginning at the Lakeview Hospital Auxiliary and Community Hospital, she graduated to volunteering at Bronson Battle Creek Hospital, amassing more than 15,000 hours of service. She also volunteered at the Salvation Army soup kitchen and Emergency Food Pantry, joined the Arboretum Society, Red Hat Society, and DAR.

As the first woman inducted into the Battle Creek Host Lions Club, she served as President for two terms, and as Zone and Region III Chairman, supervising several other clubs. She remained active to her death, helping to collect thousands of glasses for donation every year.

Betty was an avid reader and also enjoyed gardening, knitting, and travel. She was a season ticket holder for 45 years at the Barn Theater and had recently gone to Toronto to see the Swan Lake ballet.

She was preceded in death by her husband of 42 years, Lakeview Lion Lloyd G. Robins, and daughter, Janet Osburn. She is survived by a son, David (Beverly) Osburn of Sherwood, a daughter, Elizabeth (Joe) Robins of McKinney, Texas, stepson Raymond (Gail) Robins of Holt, Michigan, ten grandchildren, 19 greatgrandchildren and one great-grandson.



District 11-B1 Parade of Checks - Understanding the Needs of our Supported Projects October 22, 2022

Every year the needs for individual projects and committees change based on their current balance, expected expenses, and anticipated needs.

Lions Clubs International Foundation – This is where funds come from for emergency grants, and for specific grants to fund local projects beyond the scope of the District, such as the \$10,000 grant for emergency services for Dexter Tornado victims. Historically the US receives more funds than are donated from within the US.

Lions of Michigan Service Foundation – This is where we get our Lions Mints, but more so, they provide grants for cataract surgery, hearing aids, and eye surgery beyond the scope of the club level. They also provide emergency grants for home fires and flooding. Every year they provide many grants, only limited by the donations received.

District Projects (Undesignated) – Funds designated to specific projects can only be used for that project. A project that does not receive adequate donations or has unexpected costs arise can request support from this undesignated fund.

Michigan Youth Challenge Academy – The MYCA cadets have been instrumental in supporting a number of district events as the honor guard and invaluable support at the Winter Camp for the Blind. A donation to them ensures the continued educational and vocational success for these at risk individuals.

Winter Camp – Every year camp costs continue to increase and although the adult participants pay a registration fee, we try to keep the fee reasonable. Campers come from all over southern and mid-Michigan. Travel expenses, housing, and food comprise the bulk of the expenses. With COVID risks in recent years, camp has been virtual (on Zoom) but not without expenses (ie. mailings, craft supplies). We are gearing up for in-person camp this year so generous donations are appreciated!

Children's Services – This fund is the basis of funding for several special projects involving children The committee is expanding the service opportunities for visually impaired and autistic children and opening doors for shared commitment to supporting our needy children. (NOTE sent to Roberta Sexton)

Diabetes – The diabetes committee has been very active in bringing diabetes awareness to people within our district and is involved in sending young adults to Camp Midichi for diabetic youth, which for some is a life changing experience.

Hearing & Speech (Deaf and Hard of Hearing Picnic) – The Lions of Michigan Foundation offers an Affordable Hearing Aid program through which we as a district assist in obtaining hearing aids for very low income applicants. If an applicant cannot afford the cost of both the aids and the fitting fee costs, or a Lions Club is not able to sponsor (pay for) one of those fees/costs, a request for payment is made for funds from the Hearing & Speech account.

The picnic is held the second Saturday in September of each fiscal year. The picnic provides an opportunity for district club members to volunteer their time and talent during this picnic which is provided free to our deaf and hard of hearing friends and their families.

While food is donated by area stores and prizes are normally donated by Deaf and Hard of Hearing Picnic committee members and several clubs in the district, the cost of the deaf interpreters, invitations and paper goods are paid with monies from the **Hearing & Speech** account.

KidSight (District Expenses) – The Lions of Michigan Foundation provides central management for the administration of KidSight throughout the state. They provide permissions and follow-up with those children who are referred for further evaluation. They provide insurance on the equipment, administrative supplies, and reimbursement of expenses. Accumulated funds will be used to upgrade and maintain equipment or supplies in the future.

Leos of the District – This supports the Leos so they can participate in district activities and Leo functions beyond their own clubs' limited resources. We encourage their attendance at the Banner Exchange, Fall Conference, and District Convention. Funds can also be used to start new clubs and support existing clubs within our district.

Peace Poster – The district provides awards for the top Peace Poster winners and has some administrative expenses. It is a great way for clubs to connect with local schools and encourage artful representations of peace.

Reading Action Program - The Reading Action Program is celebrated in March each year and allows Lions to provide additional funds to schools, day care centers, and individuals to put books into the hands of young readers. It is a great way to promote literacy and benefits from your financial support.

Sight Conservation – The Sight Conservation committee promotes the preservation of sight and prevention of blindness. Funds are kept in reserve to augment purchasing glasses for the needy when and if a club cannot afford the expense. In recent years, funds have helped provide white canes and white cane repairs at Winter Camp for the Blind. The account has a healthy balance and doesn't require additional funds.

Childhood Cancer – The Childhood Cancer committee depends on District 11-B1 Clubs to help with items or monetary donations to provide lap blankets, encouraging cards, backpacks full of goodies, and other supplies for children dealing with cancer.

Youth Exchange – Donations to this project can be used to provide supplemental funding for the students to ensure they are able to participate in the Youth Exchange. Individual YE participants will send letters to all the Lions Clubs requesting funding for their specific exchange trip, but differences in projected costs and variations in donations can leave some students in need of additional funding. This fund has a healthy balance so a minimal donation is requested.

Youth Outreach, Drug Awareness & Quest – Lions Quest is a comprehensive and universal, evidence-based social and emotional learning program. SEL is a process through which children and adults acquire and effectively apply the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish positive relationships, and make responsible decisions. LCIF supports the research and development of quality social and emotional learning tools and resources as part of its global humanitarian effort to promote a safe, healthy approach to life, free from the harm of tobacco, alcohol and other drug use. Clubs of District 11-B1 have been fortunate to receive LCIF grants in recent years to further the program.

Administrative

When a Lion Dies – This is actually an ADMINISTRATIVE program, so funds should come out of that account. This program provides remembrances and ceremony to honor the deceased and at the district convention. There are administrative costs to provide this service but the account has a healthy balance.

PEACE POSTER

The deadline to purchase Peace Poster kits from LCI has past for this year but District Peace Poster Coordinator Lion Shawne Lige has ordered a few kits for the district, in the case that you may need one and haven't yet purchased one.

PARADE OF CHECKS INFORMATION from IPCC Dave Hill

Dear Fellow Lions,

We are getting close to the Parade of Checks, and I wanted to ask that you give special financial consideration to three Lion Parade of Checks organizations.

LEADER DOGS FOR THE BLIND – During COVID Leader Dog was limited on providing Leader Dogs and Orientation and Mobility Training (white cane training), however, the Rochester Leader Dog campus is fully open and operational now. From July 1, 2021, to June 30, 2022, Leader Dog was able to provide 116 fully trained dogs to clients at no cost. Each dog costs approximately \$50,000 to train and provide. Leader Dog typically breeds 400 puppies for the program and typically approximately 200 dogs successfully complete the training and are placed with clients who are in the most need. Leader Dog plans on returning to providing 200 clients with dogs in this coming year. In the 2021-2022 fiscal year, 90 clients received OMT (white cane training) and 14 blind teenagers attended the Summer Experience Camp which included training with the handheld GPS unit that Leader Dog is working with. In the 2022-2023 year, we hope to increase the amount of dogs, white cane training and teenage summer experience clients to pre-covid levels, so please help in the Parade of Checks contributions.

LIONS OF MICHIGAN FOUNDATION – The Foundation works with local Lions Clubs to help underserved populations and financially struggling individuals who require assistance with eye care, hearing aids or an unexpected life event. The Foundation's services are offered statewide with a focus on helping Michigan residents succeed academically, develop normally, maintain independence and prosper in life. Some of the programs that the Foundation provides are Kidsight, Sight Restoration, Emergency Disaster Relief, Glaucoma Fund and Military Family and Veterans Relief Fund.

BEAR LAKE CAMP FOR THE BLIND AND HEARING IMPAIRED – Lions Bear Lake Camp's Mission is to develop leadership skills, build confidence, and to provide a premier outdoor educational and recreational experience year-round to all persons, regardless of ability. Bear Lake Camp is located outside of LePere, Michigan, and since its opening in 2000 has served more than 10,000 campers and visitors. The Camp primarily provides blind/visually impaired and deaf/hard of hearing youth summer camp experiences.

I would be more than happy to provide a presentation regarding any or all of these organizations at your meetings. If you have any questions, you can contact me at my email or phone. Once again, thank you for giving special consideration to these organizations and most of all, thank you for being a Lion.

PARADE OF CHECKS INFORMATION from WINTER CAMP

Winter Camp thanks you and still needs your support! Winter Campers come from many districts in Michigan to the Battle Creek Schools Outdoor Education Center (OEC) for fun, food, fellowship and most importantly a break from being at home. Due to Covid-19, we were forced to go virtual for the second year in 2022. While the cost was less, we did have costs for postage, crafts, and gift cards. We are very grateful to several districts, clubs, and individuals that supported our 2021 and 2022 Virtual Winter Camps through the purchase of gift cards that we used as raffle prizes. Winter Camp funds covered the remaining expenses. For in-person camp, the cost per camper averages around \$150, with \$45 paid by the campers themselves.

In previous years, our budget for the weekend at the Outdoor Education Center has been around \$7500, most of it for food. The OEC has recently contracted their food service to a third-party vendor, which will increase our food cost in the coming year by around 30%. The impact on our budget will be in the range of \$10-\$15 per camper. We don't want to increase the cost to our campers so we will need your help to cover the cost of camp this year. If you can help our project, through paying tuition for campers, providing transportation, donating to the operation of the camp, or sponsoring an item on our "wish list" below, we would greatly appreciate it. The Lions of Michigan Foundation has a fund specifically designated for Winter Camp for the Blind and Visually Impaired for a tax-deductible donation. If you would like to contribute, simply write a check to the LoMF and write "Winter Camp Fund" in the memo line.
