WHITE CANE SAFETY DAY and WORLD SIGHT DAY

White Cane Safety Day (Oct 15) and World Sight Day (Oct 13) are similar events. Some might ask why we have both. While I do not know all the details, I can say that White Cane Safety Day was established by an act of U.S. Congress in 1964. World Sight Day was established by Lions Clubs International (LCI) during Campaign SightFirst in 2000.

Campaign SightFirst worked to preserve and prevent blindness whenever possible by education and encouraging eye examinations. World Sight Day is now promoted by the International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness (IAPB).

A healthy eye contains a clear, smooth dome called a cornea. The cornea is a clear window that allows light rays to pass through and focus sharply on the back of the eye, the retina.



We must be careful and have proper eye exams as we age.

We must also be careful of the quality of contact lenses we use. Of particular concern are novelty lenses sold on the Internet for Halloween.

White Cane Safety Day gives Lions an opportunity to increase awareness of white cane traffic safety laws. Throughout the world, the long white cane is used by people who are blind or visually impaired as a tool for safe, reliable navigation and to communicate to sighted individuals that a person has low vision. Sufficient training with an Orientation and Mobility specialist can aid in successful cane use, technique, and safety.

Suggested Activities for Lions

Mobilize your club to partner with local blindness experts, schools and organizations for the blind to plan your International White Cane Safety Day awareness activity.

Arrange for a person who is blind to demonstrate the use of the white cane and its benefits, and share his or her accomplishments and aspirations with the community or your club.

Invite a representative from a local school for the blind or a low vision clinic to speak about white cane, orientation and mobility, and white cane laws in your community.

Work with your local government officials to create a White Cane Safety Day Proclamation for your event.

Work with local news media to convey your community's white cane laws to the public.

Be sure to report your white cane awareness project or event using the Service Activity Report in MyLCI.
