From the Governor

WELCOME UNIVERSITY OF MICHIGAN LIONS!

Five minutes ago I emailed eighty-seven pages of forms to Lions Club International to obtain a charter for sixty-seven new Lions at the University of Michigan.

We had the workshop at Eversight's conference room with Paul Baker, the LCI membership consultant from Canada, on Sunday, January 8, at Eversight's conference room. On Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday we recruited our new Lions. We had our first membership meeting on Tuesday, January 17. It was pizza and election time. Christine Wagner was elected the first President of the U of M Lions. Christine was a LEO in District B2 and was a Charter Member of the Michigan State University Lions. She transferred to the U of M this year and contacted me in early December in response to the article I had published and my correspondence with the MSU Lions. The U of M Club is gifted to have her as President.

Election night was very special. They are diverse group from all over the world and their attitude and energy is inspiring. We had multiple candidates for all offices except Lion Tamer, but I think that he was such a good candidate that no one wanted to challenge him. Each candidate was given two minutes to speak. One candidate said that her grandfather had been a Lion for forty-four years and she was so proud to be able to tell me she is one now. Multiple candidates were Leo's, one had attended Bear Lake Camp and expressed her deep gratitude to the Lions, one had started a Not-For-Profit service agency in Oklahoma while in high school and one had started a tutoring agency in his home country. When our sole candidate for Lion Tamer spoke he said that he was a percussionist and would take good care of the bell.

We should get the Charter by the third week of March. We will be letting everybody know when and where it is so that you can make reservations. Many of the new Lions are excited to be able to invite their families. I guarantee that if you are able to attend, you will leave with a renewed sense of pride to be a Lion.

Putting together the resources and gaining the knowledge to start the club was a labor of love. I tracked down Lions from five different countries (luckily none of them got restraining orders on me), got assistance from Eversight, Leaderdog and puppies, the U of M Union staff, other Districts, and Lions Clubs International. When we got there on January 9, we had District volunteers fully staffing the tables. Special thanks go out to Deb Dayton, an A2 Lion and member of the Leaderdog Board, Alex Teska and Diane Kern of Eversight, Lula Gardfrey of A1, Ray Robins (MSU Guiding Lion). and PDG Paul Baker of Ontario. In our District, special thanks to Dick Saxton, Mike Scott, Cathy Koning, Barry Allen, Nancy Hill, Katie Hill, Rich Westbury, and Luanne Bullington for staffing the table and recruiting. The past president of MSU, Courtney March, and current MSU President Kayley Langlands have provided valuable advice and counsel as well as PID Esther LaMothe and PID Gary Anderson.

We just finished our seventh month of increased membership in the District. Thank you to all the club's who have offered the privilege to new members to become Lions. KEEP UP THE GREAT WORK! I am here to serve you, so let me know what I can do. It was quite time consuming to get to all the clubs (one to go) and put together the U of M initiative and I am hoping to have more time to help clubs that would like me to.

In Leadership, I am happy to report that we will have two new zone chairs next year that are interested in becoming DG. Mike Scott will be running for 2nd VDG and Roger Spriggs for 1st VDG and Luanne for DG. With the addition of the two new Zone Chairs, we have candidates for the next five years. My objective was to provide future leaders for the District and I believe we have been very successful. As we used to say in the Army Infantry, thank you all for "leaning forward in foxhole" and stepping up into leader-

ship positions!

What was it like in 1917, 100 years ago

The average life expectancy for men was 47 years. Fuel for cars was sold in drug stores only.

Only 14 percent of the homes had a bathtub.

Only 8 percent of the homes had a telephone.

The maximum speed limit in most cities was 10 mph. The tallest structure in the world was the Eiffel Tower.

The average US wage in 1910 was 22 cents per hour. The average US worker made between \$200 and \$400 per vear.

A competent accountant could expect to earn \$2,000 per year.

A dentist \$2,500 per year.

A veterinarian between \$1,500 and \$4,000 per year. And, a mechanical engineer about \$5,000 per year. More than 95 % of all births took place at home. Ninety percent of all Doctors had NO COLLEGE ED-UCATION! Instead, they attended so-called medical schools, many of which were condemned in the press AND the government as "substandard."

Sugar cost four cents a pound.

The pages of LION Magazine during the early years of Lions in the 1920s were filled with stories such as "The Purpose of Lions," "The Meaning of Lionism" and "The Value of Lions." A businessman's club dedicated to service was still a novel concept, and it was as if Lions had to convince themselves that they were on the right track. The uncertainty led Lions to question whether Lions Clubs would even survive. "During my lifetime I have seen organizations formed with the highest ideals flourish for a time, then drop into comparative unimportance. Will that be the



ideals flourish for a time, then drop into comparative unimportance. Will that be the fate of Lionism? I hope not," wrote District Governor A. Baker of Cheyenne, Wyoming, in January 1922.

But Lions stayed the course. They stuck with service. Fellowship was part of membership. But service was paramount. "Activities Make the Club" was the headline for a column in 1927 by International President Irving Camp of Johnstown, Pennsylvania. "Show me a club that simply meets and eats, and I will show you a club that has failed to respond to the call of service as invited in the very principles of our great, unself-ish organization," he wrote.

Rapidly approaching our Centennial in 2017, we now know that our forebears were right. Service is what makes a Lion. It's what we do. It's who we are. That has never been more evident than over the past couple of years. We set a goal to serve 100 million people by June 30, 2018. The four campaigns have been Engaging Youth, Sharing the Vision, Relieving the Hunger and Protecting the Environment.

We wondered whether we'd reach the goal because clubs typically had reported to Lions Clubs International serving 8 million people annually (but we knew the true figure was higher). **I'm elated to tell you that in early September we reached our goal of serving 100 million people.** Take pride in being part of an association that lives up to its amazing ideals.

Like Lions of yesteryear, we put service first. But unlike them, we are confident we will be here for a long, long time! Thank you for all you do as a Lion, and I hope to see you at the 100th International Convention in Chicago June 30-July 4, 2017.



HOUSE BILL No. 4030 January 12, 2017, Introduced by Rep. Byrd and referred to the Committee on Tax Policy

(K) FOR THE 2017 TAX YEAR AND EACH TAX YEAR AFTER THE 2017 TAX 7 YEAR, THE LIONS OF MICHIGAN FOUNDATION FUND CREATED IN SECTION 5 OF 8 THE LIONS OF MICHIGAN FOUNDATION FUND ACT. 9 (2) Subject to the limitations provided under this subsection, 10 the department shall establish and utilize a separate contributions 11 schedule that incorporates each contribution designation authorized 12 under this section that remains in effect and available for each 13 tax year and shall revise the state individual income tax return 14 form to include a separate line for the total contribution 15 designations made under the separate contributions schedule. The 16 contribution designations authorized under sections 437, 438, and 17 440 shall be incorporated into the contributions schedule for the 18 2010 tax year and shall remain on the schedule until the 19 contribution designation expires by law or is otherwise no longer 20 available as determined by the department pursuant to subsection

What does this mean? For filing your 2017 state income tax, you may have the option of checking a block to donate to the Lions of Michigan Foundation.



"One in six persons in our area experiences hunger. It is a serious problem, and we are committed to feeding those people and advocating for the cause of the needy," reported Patty Parker, who is Executive Director of the South Central Michigan Food Bank. She was addressing the January 23 meeting of the **Albion Lions**Club. Parker noted that the Food Bank, which is located in Battle Creek, collects food and fresh produce to

be distributed among 285 agencies in an eight-county area including Calhoun County. The two best-known agencies in Albion are AIM and New Hope. Throughout the area served by the Food Bank, 31% of the recipients are children. Many of them are served by an after-school, weekend program that provides "packs" of food from cereal to full meals like ravioli or spaghetti, canned fruit, vegetables, side dishes, juice, and snacks.



The South Central Michigan Food Bank is not a food pantry itself, but it collects and distributes food and grocery products from its warehouse at 5154 Wayne Road in Battle Creek. Last year alone, the Food Bank distribut-



ed 8,695,578 pounds of food including fresh produce,

canned and frozen produce, dairy products, protein, bakery goods, hot and cold cereal, complete meals, and other grocery items. Food companies, food drives, local farms, and store rescue items provide the inventory. One of the newest initiatives is a partnership with the chefs and staff of the Firekeepers Casino Hotel. They provide recipes and teachable moments for food recipients to learn about produce and products that they may not have experienced before.






The Future of Peace




