In another one of his talks he told us Lions Clubs International was focusing on documenting the hundreds of millions of hours of service performed by Lions Clubs from all over the world.


He told us our motto "We Serve" is more important than ever as is your club entering, into MyLCI, your service hours to help with the documentation.

LET'S SHOW THAT WE REALLY ARE 'KNIGHTS OF THE BLIND'

Is there an event that you look forward to each year, like spending Christmas with distant grandchildren or that Winter Cruise to warmer climes? Now imagine that after a year of anticipation you cannot take that trip, something outside of your control wipes away the one event you really look forward too.

Our friends who look forward to 'Winter Camp for the Blind', one of the few events they anticipate all year long, one event that gives them some independence, re-connecting with old friends and a little excitement in their somewhat restrictive lives may be faced with losing their yearlong anticipated trip as the project reaches a crossroads.

For many of the 44 years the camp has been funded by Lions Clubs, mostly through donations to the Parade of Checks at the Fall Conference. Each year fees from the campers, club donations and a dwindling buffer fund have combined to finance this District project. The buffer fund was exhausted last year and funds from the clubs has been falling. For the first time we anticipate there may be insufficient financing to run the 2018 camp.

Our committee is seeking additional help from foundations and local corporations but the only way to guarantee sufficient funding is for each club to increase its donations to the Winter Camp for the Blind. We are respectfully requesting each club to give extra consideration to supporting this vital District project and to avoid disappointing our campers.

Closed clubs and dropped membership is one of the reasons the District has less funding for major projects, I know that most of you get tired of the constant reminder to grow clubs and retain members but the importance of this comes home when we get to the point of not being able to fund a critical project, especially one of the District's signature projects. More members means more service, that's why we are Lions.

To those lions who have experienced Winter Camp as volunteers and seen the joy and laughter we bring to a very underprivileged sector of our society I ask you to pass along the message to our clubs and fellow lions. WE SERVE and we have to find a way to prevent our campers from being disappointed after waiting a year for the one event they anticipate with excitement, an event that means so much to them. I thank you for understanding.





Facts About Diabetic Eye Disease Points to Remember:

Diabetic eye disease comprises a group of eye conditions that affect people with diabetes. These conditions include diabetic retinopathy, diabetic macular edema (DME), cataract, and glaucoma. All forms of diabetic eye disease have the potential to cause severe vision loss and blindness. Diabetic retinopathy involves changes to retinal blood vessels that can cause them to bleed or leak fluid, distorting vision.

Diabetic retinopathy is the most common cause of vision loss among people with diabetes and a leading cause of blindness among working-age adults. DME is a consequence of diabetic retinopathy that causes swelling in the area of the retina called the macula.

Controlling diabetes—by taking medications as prescribed, staying physically active, and maintaining a healthy diet—can prevent or delay vision loss. Because diabetic retinopathy often goes unnoticed until vision loss occurs, people with diabetes should get a comprehensive dilated eye exam at least once a year. Early detection, timely treatment, and appropriate follow-up care of diabetic eye disease can protect against vision loss. Diabetic retinopathy can be treated with several therapies, used alone or in combination.



What is diabetic eye disease?

Diabetic eye disease is a group of eye conditions that can affect people with diabetes.

Diabetic retinopathy affects blood vessels in the light sensitive tissue called the retina that lines the back of the eye. It is the most common cause of vision loss among people with diabetes and the leading cause of vision

impairment and blindness among working-age adults. Diabetic macular edema (DME). A consequence of diabetic retinopathy, DME is swelling in an area of the retina called the macula. Diabetic eye disease also includes cataract and glaucoma: Cataract is a clouding of the eye's lens. Adults with diabetes are 2-5 times more likely than those without diabetes to develop cataract. Cataract also tends to develop at an earlier age in people with diabetes.

Glaucoma is a group of diseases that damage the eye's optic nerve—the bundle of nerve fibers that connects the eye to the brain. Some types of glaucoma are associated with elevated pressure inside the eye. In adults, diabetes nearly doubles the risk of glaucoma. All forms of diabetic eye disease have the potential to cause severe vision loss and blindness. Diabetic eye disease can affect many parts of the eye, including the retina, macula, lens and the optic nerve.



HAVANA (Reuters) - Yubis Zapata had to stop playing baseball when he lost his eyesight during military ser-



vice due to an explosion, so for him, it is a miracle to be able to play once more, in Cuba's growing league for the blind. Baseball has long been a national passion. The Communist-run country quickly adopted this version after it was developed in the 1990s in Italy, but it has only really caught on in recent years, spreading to all corners of the Caribbean island.

Players like Zapata are ambitious. Their dream is for blind baseball to be included in the 2020 Paralympics, and to bring home the trophy for Cuba. "When you lose your vision, these first years are difficult," said Zapata, 41, at a training session in Havana where players wore white uniforms. "When you get this kind of opportunity, it's fabulous. Your world didn't end, it continues. The players, who are blind or visually impaired and wear colorful blindfolds while playing, say baseball has helped them refine their sense of orientation by sound.

The ball has bells inside so that fielders can hear where it lands and scramble for it. First base is a beeping mat, and players clap paddles at second and third base to orient runners. There is no pitcher; the batter tosses the ball in the air and hits it.

Fly balls are not allowed. "This is different from conventional baseball - you have to be more concentrated," said Carlos Fuentes, 32, a physical therapist who lost his sight in recent years. "This sport in a way has served me as rehabilitation, for spatial orientation."

The game was brought to Cuba by Italian coaches, who also provided the specialized equipment. Enthusiasts say it is more truthful to the original sport than its American parallel, beep baseball Havana coach Roberto Carmona says the game is played throughout Europe, Asia, in Cuba and Panama. But for it to be included in the Paralympics, there need to be two teams per continent, which he is confident can happen by 2020. Five Cuban provinces play the game, he said. There is no age or gender limit and even sighted people can play as long as they wear a blindfold.
