From the Governor

We are gifted to have a great teacher as the faculty advisor. There are ten Lion Districts in the Lower Peninsula and Districts B1 and B2 have more Leo's clubs than the other eight. I attribute this to PDG Terry Walters leadership in our district and 2VDG Stan Grabowski's leadership in B2. The Leo's programs have immediate benefits to the sponsoring club, the community and especially the students. They also have a long term effects on our clubs.

I was recently at a club meeting in Jackson. One of the members is from Tibet. He proudly told me he was a Leo in Tibet and that was part of his decision to become a Lion half way across the world in Michigan.

As many of you know, I have been working on starting a Lion's Club at the University of Michigan for almost a year. We are having a recruiting event on January 9 and 10 at the Union Building. I had the article that was in last month's newsletter published in the State publication and asked for referrals of any Lion who had a student at the U of M. Leo Club History

Coach Jim Graver started the Leo ball rolling in 1957 and chances are that ball was a baseball. Graver was the baseball coach of the Abington High School in Pennsylvania, USA and an active member of the Glenside Lions Club. With help from his fellow Lion, William Ernst, the first Leo club was charted on December 5, 1957. They created the Leo acronym – Leadership, Equality, Opportunity – and chose their school colors, maroon and gold to serve as the Leo club colors. Later, Equality was changed to Experience. In October 1967, the board of directors of Lions Clubs International adopted the Leo Club Program as an official program of the association.

The Leo Club Program has continued to grow within the last 50 years. Leos now constitute an international network of over 6,500 clubs in over 140 countries. Community service remains the cornerstone of the program, fostering a lifetime commitment to helping others. Like their Lion counterparts, Leo club members enjoy serving their neighbors and watching positive results unfold.

I will let you know how we do at the recruiting event at the University of Michigan. If we are able to start a club, it is partially due to District 11 B2 starting and supporting a Leo's Club that produced our first University of Michigan Lion.

Ten million Americans are blind or visually impaired.

Each year, 75,000 more Americans will succumb to vision problems, according to the National Federation of the Blind(link is external).



Globally, 160 million people suffer. And Medicare data shows that almost every one of us will have at least one eye disease in our lifetime.

Researchers at the University of Michigan W.K. Kellogg Eye Center see a brighter future.

There, scientists invented a device to detect age-related vision problems before people begin losing their sight. U-M surgeons were the first to implant a bionic eye so that patients could see objects, light and people standing before them.

U-M researchers also led one of the largest studies of an eye condition that causes serious progressive nearsightedness at a young age—work that recently led the U.S. Food and Drug Administration(link is external) to approve a new treatment for the disease.






Earlier this month, a 6.5 magnitude earthquake struck Indonesia. While the quake lasted only 15 seconds, more than 100 buildings collapsed and more than 100 people have perished. 
