He was delighted to induct a large group of new Northwest Leos and 3 (or was it 4?) new Lions into the Pride. He brought up the Hanover Horton Leos in attendance and presented them with his banner and participated in a group photo.

It was a working lunch for me. While most had time to work their way slowly through the crispy chips, juicy pickle, huge cookie and oversized sandwich, I was busy grabbing photos in the hopes of getting a few real good ones. Once the inductions were done, we all got our chance for a photo op with IP Corlew, taken club by club. There were many handshakes and well wishes then – just as quickly as they had arrived – the group was off and running to their next destination.

From the Governor

HOW YOU GET TWENTY NEW MEMBERS

Last Friday I accompanied the IP Corlew and his wife to the Paw Paw Clubhouse for his fifth Lions event in less than twenty-four hours. During the meeting the Lawton Lions received a special award for a membership campaign they held in the spring.

The Lawton Lions have a large and beautiful clubhouse that they frequently rent, provide to local groups, and have bingo games in. The problem they had was that their membership had diminished to twenty-two and not enough to support the operation of the facility and fund raisers. The President, Tim Washburn, decided to have a membership drive, but wanted to let people know how much the Lions had done for the community.

Tim wrote the following news article and had it published in two local newspapers under the title of "*This is What You Will Lose if You Lose the Lions*". They had their membership open house and by the end of the night, the Lawton Lions went from twenty-two members to forty-two members!

I would be happy to draft an article for any club that thinks this would help attract some interest for a membership open house. Just let me know.

This is What You Will Lose if You Lose the Lions

If you value the myriad of services provided by the aging Lawton Lions Club, are you willing to step up in order to keep the club viable? For over 6 decades the Lions Club has, as the only service club in Lawton, provided much needed services to the people of Lawton. Today the Club has 22 members. Of that number only 16 are active in club functions. From a peak of 40 + members during the 90's which saw the building of the community center, there has been a steady attrition due to death, relocation, retirement, and waning interest

Today the Club finds itself at a crossroads. The issue is having enough members to staff the weekly bingo game. The game is the Club's sole fund raiser and generates enough income to fund all of the service projects including the free usage by community groups of the community center. That usage alone costs the Club \$25,000.00 per year. Contrary to popular misconception, the Center operates on a break even basis. There is no profit and there would be a \$25,000.00 deficit if it were not for the club's infusion of \$25,000.00. Because the club has managed its money well, the Lions Community Center is debt and mortgage free.

If the club can't keep bingo going due to a lack of Lions workers, the fallout would impact the community dramatically. If the Club couldn't offer free usage of the center, where would the Prom go? Where would the firemen and the alumni association go for their annual parties? Where would 4H, scouts, church groups, and numerous other nonprofit groups meet? Where would wakes and benefit dinners be held? Where would the honor society hold its Thanksgiving dinner? Where would folks find another refuge in case of a natural disaster that is totally self-sufficient?

Set aside the impact of losing the use of the Lions Community Center services. What about all of the other things the club provides? Who would sponsor and insure the Christmas in the Village and the Summerfest parades? Who would sponsor the local Boy Scout troop (the club built and owns the scout clubhouse)? Who would provide \$3000.00 worth of scholarships each year to Lawton grads? Who would provide aid in purchasing eyeglasses for those in need? Who would provide free eye testing for young people? Who would purchase large print books for the library? Who would provide emergency financial aid to folks who have just lost their home to fire? Who would provide camperships for summer camp for children in need? Who would individuals or organizations apply to for one time aid with projects or personal crisis?

From the Governor

It is very easy to take all of these things and more for granted but they aren't possible without volunteerism, commitment, and the personal sacrifice of people who understand the value of service and the concept of giving back to the community. There are three types of people. Givers, takers, and observers. Be a giver! We don't expect every member to commit to every activity, meeting, or bingo night. We ask only that you honor what you can commit to.

If these services and the concept of service is important to you contact Dan Pratley, Lions Club Secretary (624 1529), or join us at the Community Center on March 22nd for an informational meeting. We meet the second Monday of each month and work bingo every Thursday of the year. Our meetings are open to the public.



Year-Round Training Provided by the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum



Lions University is offered by the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum.

As a Lions Club leader, you understand that building strong communities through volunteer service is our objective. The Lions University program is about making sure that you have the skills and resources to meet this objective.

Through three educational program levels, Lions Leaders will enhance their knowledge and skills to better serve their community.

To complete each program, Lions must complete 10 required courses, at least 5 elective classes, and complete specific leadership experiences. To complete a course, the Lion takes part in an hour long training session. These sessions are offered online on this website, through periodic webinars that are posted on this website, and through live sessions led in Districts and Multiple Districts.

Once the training session is completed, the Lion takes a simple online test to confirm their learning. Upon completion, the Lion is awarded a certificate of course completion. Lions are welcome to complete the courses that interest them in any of the programs, and in any order they wish. Credit is given toward the program that the class is under.

Bachelor's Program: This program allows Lions to develop the skills necessary to lead a vital Lions Club. Courses are directed to the skills needed to be great club leader. Click here to learn more about this program.

Master's Program: This program focuses on giving support to clubs through district leaders. This program is aimed at District Level leaders: District Governors, Vice District Governors, Zone Chairs, District Committee Chairs, Certified Guiding Lions, and other leaders that are ready to foster quality clubs in their District. Doctorate Program: This program focuses on skills needed to be a training facilitator for adult volunteers. In affect, Lions who have completed the Doctorate Program are prepared to be great trainers of other Lions. Click here to learn more about this program.

There are three programs, the first called Bachelor is for lions at club level, the second is Masters for lions interested in working with their Districts and the last is the Doctorate for those who aspire to teaching other lions.

Go to the web site www.lionsuniversity.org and check it out, if you don't have a computer get with a fellow lion who does, start by looking at the Bachelors program and pick one class that you are interested in, most of the classes are recorded so you can take them when you want, just about one hour each, so everyone has time to try one class. I will warn you though that they are educational and fun, they are also addictive, and after one it's hard to stop. Before you know it you will complete the whole program and be in line for your Bachelor degree.

These classes will expand your knowledge of lions, let you understand all the 'jobs' available in the club, Let you preview district 'jobs' and see if you would like to try something new. Club Presidents, this is a great project for your Lions, and a great RETENTION tool, you should encourage your Lions to give it a try.

Penrickton Center for Blind Children was

established in the City of Taylor, Michigan in 1952 by three families (*Pen*man, *Rick*er and Wiggin*ton*) as a day nursery for blind pre-schoolers because no such program existed. Originally meeting in their homes, then a local church; Penrickton Center's permanent home was established through a land grant from the City of Taylor and through private donations. The original brick building was built and donated by individuals and service clubs.



Through the years, Penrickton Center has constantly changed to meet the needs of visually impaired children in the Metropolitan Detroit area. In the late 1950's, Penrickton Center added a 5-day residential program to better serve children in the community. In the early 1960's we initiated a program to serve blind children with one additional handicap because no such program existed to meet these special needs.

Currently, we specialize in treating blind children ages one through twelve with a least one additional handicap such as deafness, cerebral palsy, brain damage, developmental delay and seizures.

<u>There is no charge</u> to families for our services provided to their children! Penrickton Center for Blind Children relies *solely* on private donations for all programs and services. Following is a breakdown of how Penrickton Center is funded:

- 1/3 of our support is from caring individuals
- 1/3 from service clubs and organizations
- 1/3 from groups such as churches, schools, foundations, corporate donations

Penrickton Center does not receive any State, Federal, Insurance or United Way funding!

All donations to Penrickton Center are tax deductible. Penrickton Center for Blind Children is registered with the Internal Revenue Service as a private, non-profit — IRS 501 (c)[3] charity.

Penrickton Center for Blind Children is licensed with the Michigan Department of Human Services as a Child Caring Facility **and** a Day Care Center.






