A Lions Club member may really need to bend your ear! Develop a "mentoring system" pairing more	I.	Conduct get to know you activities, "mixers or ice breakers", at the beginning of club meetings. Establish a "Welcoming Committee" to take new members under their wing. This would include introducing them to others, helping orient them to the club, project work, requirements, etc.

She is the 2017 Miss Downriver Outstanding Teen and a majorette for Hanover-Horton High School. She is a junior instructor with the Twirl-M's


Sophie talked about the time she spent in Peru and the dignitaries she met. She was featured in a local magazine and gave a very professional presentation about her experiences.

- 51 Knitted Hats plus a large box of beautiful handmade felt hats
- 4 huge boxes of assorted hats, scarves and mittens.
- 2 beautiful winter coats.
- 2 clubs donated cash which we used for supplies to make more blankets Large quantity of backpacks and school supplies.

Lots more miscellaneous items that were dropped off in bags and boxes.

These items are already on the REZ, beating the severe winter weather, it is hard for us to understand just how much difference this simple gift makes to those who struggle in the inhospitable winter weather and bitter cold on the plains.

The following are being readied for the next shipment: -

- 11 sheet sets, 16 throws, 1 bed blanket
- 34 blankets are completed
- 81 blankets are being made as you read this.
