From the desk of the District Governor Elect

EVEN GOOD LIONS ARE NOT IMMORTAL



This month we were shocked by the passing of our District Treasurer. For the more recently minted lions, Walt had been an almost permanent fixture. Some of us can barely remember the District without him. The greatest compliment I can give to Walt is to call him an old-fashioned Lion as he had high principals and was dedicated to our organization. Walt loved and was loved by Lions and LEO's

It is difficult to think about the District without Walt, that he will no longer be at our meetings, but his passing bought a stark reality to me. I only joined Lions about nine years ago at the request of a church friend. My club is Battle Creek Cereal City Lions Club. At the time it had 27 members and it was predominantly a male club and the Lions, like me, were no spring chickens. I suddenly thought, most of those Lions are still club members. They still run projects and fundraisers but they are able to do so with the help of younger new members and a wonderful influx of lady Lions.

A few members of my club passed over the years, mostly we grew more mature together never really noticing that time was passing too quickly. I suddenly thought, boy, since I became a Lion all those wonderful friends are nine years older and I hadn't seen it happening.

My club was fortunate to have inducted new members, but many clubs have struggled to bring in new members. Belonging to a tight knit group it is easy to overlook, as I overlooked, that your club is getting older and to become complacent, subconsciously not wanting to face the fact that the club is changing because it happens so slowly.

It is generally considered that a club can bring in new members that are ten years younger than the average member, so the older your club becomes the more limited its ability is to recruit younger members.

My message to you is not to become complacent, your club is changing even though you may not notice it. Be aware that doing nothing is not an option. We need to at least maintain the average age of your club by finding new members that are younger and then get them to find friends and colleagues that are slightly younger than them. Do not let your club age.

Most of us miss the opportunity to have our spouses and families join us in Lionism, but this is a great

starting point to begin building your membership. Spouses are very familiar with our organization and LCI has a reduced fee structure to enable spouses and children to become Lions at reduced cost. Having families involved in your club provides more opportunities for service and will enhance the lions experience and reduce the average age of your club.

If you notice it or not, your club is changing. You can do nothing, and it will continue to change out of your control, or you can make it change the way you want it to. I wish you well.

What is succession planning? It's a strategy for identifying and developing future leaders — at all levels.

BE PROACTIVE WITH SUCCESSION PLANNING

It is the responsibility of every leader to have a replacement prepared. It can take time to find and train a promising candidate for a leadership role. As such, don't linger. Even if you don't think you'll need a replacement shortly, prepping someone to assume an important role creates a vital safety net.

KEEP AN OPEN MIND

While the obvious successor may be the individual with the most time in, don't disregard other promising persons. Look for people who best display the skills necessary to thrive in higher positions, regardless of their current title. Consider your current pool of members for these possible opportunities. When someone uses outstanding presentation skills or goes above and beyond on a service project, make a note of it. Keep track of these achievements in a top-performer file, so you have something to reference the next time a leadership position opens. If you honestly believe that "hoarding knowledge" is the key to holding your position, I have some bad news for you. You are, in fact, the person who needs to replaced most of all.

PROVIDE TRAINING TO FUTURE LEADERS

As you identify potential leaders, offer mentoring relationships and training, which will help them develop new skills and refine existing ones. Remember that a good leader needs strong interpersonal skills including standout verbal and written communication abilities, as well as tact and diplomacy. Once you've identified individuals as successors for key roles in your group, be sure to balance the skill sets needed as well as their personality within the club. Succession planning done right sets the growth course. It mends gaps and develops future leaders. True planning for the future of our association means addressing this matter today.

Tekonsha Lions - June 10th is Music in the Park (free concert) and the Tekonsha Lions serve ice cream and strawberries. No they do not deliver.



Lions Experience Vision Impaired Simulations

A team of specialist teachers of the visually impaired students from the Battle Creek School District and Calhoun County Intermediate School District hosted Cereal City Lions Club members at Ann J. Kellogg School. Led by Cereal City **Lion Teresa Gest** with three of her colleagues, each gave Lion members a visual simulation experience. Members were divided into groups and had short sessions in each of the following areas:

1. Braille Station with Dana Clark:

Provided an opportunity to use the Perkins Brailler to write in braille. Introduction to understanding how braille is produced and a brief overview of how the code is designed.

2. Vision Simulation with Becky Jackson:

Provided the opportunity to experience a variety of eye conditions, acuity loss, and field loss with special lens and glasses.

3. Eating Blindfolded with Patty Burnham:

Experienced eating under blindfold. Discussing flavor, color, texture, table manners, and orientation to personal table space.

4. Orientation & Mobility -Cane Travel with Teresa Gest: Exposure to navigation with blindfold and cane through an educational setting.

Thank you to Teresa and her colleagues for presenting this excellent program."











This is an exciting opportunity to lead 11-B1 and Lions Clubs International into our new century of service as our first childhood Cancer District chairper-


son and be at the forefront of leading the District in this developing program.



UPDATE FOR OUR LIONESS FROM LCI

The LCI 'Join Together' program ends in June 2018 and I have been trying to get accurate information for our Lioness Clubs about what happens next, so here is the latest information from LCI.

To help more women, the 'Join Together' program has been extended until June 2021, in addition LCI is offering more incentives to Lioness Clubs that are considering transitioning to become Lions Clubs. There is no longer a minimum number of members required and the charter fee has been eliminated.

Currently Lioness Clubs are considered to be projects of their associated Lions Clubs, the extension of the 'Join Together' program offers Lioness the opportunity to be independent clubs with your own \$2M insurance policy, transfer of all your years of membership, eligibility for Presidential awards and the ability to serve at all levels of the organization.

I know this is a controversial subject so please don't shoot the messenger. District 11-B1 is proud of our Lioness Clubs and supports the exceptional work they do for their communities and associated Lions Clubs. This statement from LCI puts many of the negative rumors to rest and provides additional time for the Lioness to consider their options.




