The 2017 USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum was held in Portland, Oregon from September 21st thro' the 23rd 2017. The forum followed the tried and true format of a spectacular mix of entertainment, learning, meeting old friends, making new friends and even shopping.

Hello Lions,


When a Lions dies, it is very sad and we miss them terribly. In our grief we need to remember them, what they did for our communities and honor their memory and their work.



Use the C.E.P. club survey to find out what your Lions like or dislike about the club meetings, modify the meeting format to suit, you may be surprised by the results but this gets the club members engaged and feeling part of the decision

What to Post

Remember, social media is all about creating dynamic content that is relevant and engaging. You not only need to think about what content you intend to post but also how this content engages your audience.

Examples of content to post on your club's social media sites:

- Short descriptions of upcoming speakers, social activities, programs, fundraisers, etc. (Follow this up with photos, blurbs, or short video clips of these activities afterward)
- Welcome new members
- Ask questions such as "What was one thing you found interesting about this week's speaker?"
- Share links on articles about your club's activities in other media, such as newspapers, online, etc.
- Follow other sites like Lions Clubs International and organizations your club partners with and share information about these groups (i.e. local food bank your club sponsors needs food donations, or just won an award)

Frenchman Alexis de Tocqueville rode all over the United States in the 1830s and was struck by the influence of religious, fraternal and civic organizations, and secret societies, on American democracy and concluded that **they made communities stronger**, **more interesting, and more engaged.**

But there are some reason for concern. All of these service clubs, once the backbone of community life in America, have been in significant decline over the past 2-3 decades. It is not that our clubs have changed. America has changed. Thus the imperative is for us to reinvent for a new America.



Winter Camp Funding Update

PREPARATIONS FOR WINTER CAMP IN 2018!

A big thank you to the clubs who have donated funds to help build the Winter Camp for the Blind fund balance. Our balance now stands at a little over \$2000, thanks to the contributions of 9 11B-1 Clubs and a large contribution by the Knights of Pythias Lodge 35 in Battle Creek. While we have not reached our goal of \$3000, this represents



the minimum amount we will need to be able to operate the camp, along with Parade of Checks contributions and camper tuition. If you are holding back funds to see if we will actually have camp, please consider sending them on to Walt Treichel.

Most importantly, I know several clubs have looked at their budgets to increase their giving to the **Parade of Checks - Winter Camp fund**. We will continue to encourage clubs to increase their contributions to winter camp on an annual basis, as we need to raise a minimum of roughly \$4500-\$5000 to cover the costs of the camp weekend. We are also pursuing outside grant funding, and support from the other districts in the state, where our campers come from.

The Winter Camp committee appreciates your support for this important project, and hope you will consider an increase for the coming **Parade of Checks** at the Fall Conference.





In 2015 the organization changed its name to EVERSIGHT.

I'm Henrike Grimm, 15 years old and an exchange student from Germany. I will be staying for 10 months with my host parents Susie and Bryan Fish in Michigan Center, Michigan. As part of the exchange program I go to Michigan Center High School for experiencing the American school system. I am very excited to be finally here now!
