It's also an opportunity to put a lot of faith in an almost trained dog while wearing a blindfold, as Spencer led me around the course, at what seemed a much too fast pace, I suddenly had a much better understanding of the challenges the blind experience every day.


Our speaker was Lion Mark, he told us that after seeing what Leader Dog was doing he changed from a Lion to a Lion, sounds confusing, what he meant is that he was a member of a Lions Club but suddenly he realized what being a Lion was all about and he was hooked, so hooked in fact the he cycled from Portland Oregon to Portland Maine to raise money for Leader Dog. After that he motorcycled to all 48 States to raise more money. The point he was making was that being an active lion is very different from simply being a member of a Lions Club.

Leader Dog gave me a similar experience, but for me the change happened at Winter Camp for the Blind and seeing the joy on the faces of the campers. I really urge all of you to visit our projects, they are always happy to welcome Lions, just call.



Winter Camp Funding Update

THERE WILL BE WINTER CAMP IN 2018!

A big thank you to the clubs who have donated funds to help build the Winter Camp for the Blind fund balance. Our balance now stands at a little over \$2000, thanks to the contributions of 9 11B-1 Clubs and a large contribution by the Knights of Pythias Lodge 35 in Battle Creek. While we have not reached our goal of \$3000, this represents



the minimum amount we will need to be able to operate the camp, along with Parade of Checks contributions and camper tuition. If you are holding back funds to see if we will actually have camp, please consider sending them on to Walt Treichel.

Most importantly, I know several clubs have looked at their budgets to increase their giving to the **Parade of Checks - Winter Camp fund**. We will continue to encourage clubs to increase their contributions to winter camp on an annual basis, as we need to raise a minimum of roughly \$4500-\$5000 to cover the costs of the camp weekend. We are also pursuing outside grant funding, and support from the other districts in the state, where our campers come from.

The Winter Camp committee appreciates your support for this important project, and hope you will consider an increase for the coming **Parade of Checks** at the Fall Conference.






CEREAL CITY LIONS CLUB

BATTLE CREEK CEREAL CITY Lion club members and guests enjoyed the fellowship of the annual family picnic at Willard Beach.






OUR FOUNDATION

We saw a demonstration by a trainer in a wheelchair as a black lab guided him around obstacles and then selected a book from the floor and handed it to him, finally the dog opened a door to let him leave and closed the door behind him.



The highlight of the tour was meeting two of the dog breeders who have the task of hosting the breeding stock in their homes, we also met a puppy raiser and her huge 9 -month-old poodle who will soon be returning to Paws for training and we talked with a client who has MS and is wheel-chair bound and relies on her golden to pick up objects she drops and pick up the phone.

DIABETES

District Chair - Terri Huffman

As the new Diabetes Awareness Coordinator I would like to introduce myself.

I am not a doctor, physician assistant, nurse or diabetes educator...I am a mother of a 25-year-old Type I diabetic who was diagnosed when he was not yet 5 years old. While describing his symptoms at my work lunch table, a friend passing by stopped dead in her shoes and said I needed to get my son to the doctor immediately. Her nephew had the same symptoms when he was diagnosed with diabetes. I scoffed at the idea of Sam being diabetic, but I did take him to the doctor. "He has ketones in his urine" the doctor said. Ketones---What in the world are Ketones? "He needs to go to the hospital for a blood test, his sugar is too high to read her in the office". My world crashed. I had no clue what Diabetes was. I immediately called my mother in law asking if they had diabetes in their family, because I knew my family didn't have a history of it. She began to cry and tell me the extensive family history with diabetes.

At the hospital Sam's sugar read 806, a number I will never forget. We spent a week in the hospital getting him stabilized and learning the life time of care Sam was going to need.

Ketone acidosis, test strips, glucometer, insulin, injections, hypoglycemia, hyperglycemia, A1c, diet, carbohydrates, sugar grams, glucose are just a few of the words that have become part of our everyday vocabulary. Because of on-going research and the advancements in treatment Sam's treatment has gone from 6 shots a day to 0 shots. He now wears an insulin pump that has a glucometer attached. His diabetes management at 25 is no longer this mothers' responsibility, but is my ongoing worry. Is he the perfect diabetic- No. He doesn't watch his diet close enough, drink enough water and he hasn't had medical insurance for 6 months. Through the assistance of Bronson Diabetes Center he has received insulin, medical supplies and treatment. For this, this mother is grateful.

Because of programs and donations available through organizations like the LIONS my son and the future for many others with Type I diabetes looks more promising. I look forward to carrying my message and that of the Lions organization forward for the awareness of the need for on-going research funding, and for funding and awareness of the risks, signs and treatment for all diabetics. Beginning HERE!




ADRIAN BREAKFAST Lions
