

Camper Health and Safety

Campers who arrive by bus or train. are transported by bus from the station to the camp. Special accommodations are made for those with Leader Dogs, however, the camp has limited wheelchair accessiblity.

Activities

Friday activities begin with dinner at 6:00pm. After dinner there is music and entertainment, or campers can just sit by the warm fireplace and socialize. A light evening snack is served at 9:00pm.

Saturday begins with breakfast at 8:00am served by local Lions volunteers and the Michigan Job Challenge Associates.

All meals are prepared by BCPS staff.





Morning activities include Bingo hosted by the Bedford Area Lions. There is always a ton of prizes donated by area Lions Clubs so nobody goes away empty handed.

Arts & Crafts projects are presented and guided free of charge by volunteers.

We invite area vendors to show and demonstrate technology available for the visually impaired. A team of grad students from Western Michigan University demonstrate the use of assistive devices and new technologies.

Saturday afternoon the fun continues. Campers can remain indoors and continue Bingo, Arts and Crafts, have canes repaired,

or sit by the warm fire. The adventurous can ride 4 wheelers or a wagon ride, take a guided nature hike, or just enjoy the crisp winter air.

Outdoor events are weather dependent.
