Lions Clubs International Foundation, the grant-making arm of Lions Clubs International, brings help, hope and healing to the world. This is the part of Lions that has the power to do what smaller groups cannot do. LCIF enables Lions to tackle global problems such as blindness and hearing loss and respond to major catastrophes such as earthquakes and floods. But LCIF also helps Lions serve their local communities by partnering with them to build schools, health clinics and vocational training centers for the disabled. LCIF helps people to lead healthier and more productive lives. It combats needless blindness through cataract surgeries, building and equipping eye hospitals and clinics, and raising awareness of eye disease. SightFirst grants target preventable and reversible blindness worldwide but particularly in developing countries. Other grant projects include Habitat for Humanity, Affordable Hearing Aid, Special Olympics and many more. The Melvin Jones Awards is an award presented when a person or club donation reaches \$1000 within 5 years. District 26-3 has district LCIF raffle for every \$1000 collected. This gives smaller clubs an opportunity to receive a Melvin Jones Award. (District 26-3 has chairman)

- (3) Log on using the appropriate user name and password
- (4) Once logged on click on "My Lions Club" just below the Lion emblem
- (5) Choose and click on "Officers"
- (6) Then select term by clicking on "Next Year" (that is if the information is being entered prior to June 30, 2014).
- (7) Then under each named officer to the right click on "Add Officer"
- (8) At the next screen click on "select member"
- (9) From the list, click on the member elected for the respective office and then click on "save"
- (10) Then once that officer is shown as confirmed click on "Go Back to Officers" or "Go to Home Page"
- (11) Do the same for each club office.

Building a Virtual Lions Club, Why and How

I've been a <u>Lions Clubs</u> member since 2010, and in February last year the general secretary of MD104 (*Norway*) asked me to look into the concept of "Cyber Clubs".

Our Cyber Club website.

What I found was that even though Lions International has written much about it, it's not really a concept, more listings of different tools you can use to build online communities.

So I gave up at first. But after the summer I started thinking about it again, and I decided to try and build a concept myself.

After talking to friends, both IRL and on social media, I found that selling Lions was more or less hopeless. Most people don't know what we do, and they loose interest when you try to explain.

So I decided that I needed to sell a cause. The cause I selected was bullying, especially **cyberbullying**. Why? Because bullying is a big problem that Lions Quest can solve, and cyberbullying is the natural evolution of bullying with the introduction of social media.

This was very easy to "sell", and after recruiting my first five members, the rest was a walk in the park. After three months we had recruited 25 charter members and could start the club.

How did I recruit?

I mostly recruited members online through social media like Facebook and Twitter. I wrote a lot of <u>blog posts</u> about my idea and shared it.

A few members are my personal friends, some transferred from other clubs, and I recruited three people from a big network-meeting (*over 100 attendees*) where I held a presentation of the concept, but mostly the members where recruited through the use of social media combined with my blog.

I also spent about €35 on Facebook promotions.

Our goal is to end bullying.

That is of course impossible, but we need hairy goals! How? We have three main activities:

Build a website devoted to bullying and cyberbullying. The website is meant to be a resource for kids, youth, parents,

teachers, pretty much everyone. We will tell stories, share what Lions do against bullying, and what other great humanitarian organizations do.

Have a yearly youth-camp called "Camp #DigMob". This camp will be devoted to discussing bullying, having speakers talking about their experiences. Instructors from Lions Quest will (hopefully) be an important part of the camp.

Try to work together with other humanitarian organizations that also work against cyberbullying, find common ground and how we can help each other towards the goal of ending bullying.

How to the cyberclub work?

The website is based on WordPress.

We have a digital club house, based on bbPress.

Board meetings is done through Google Hangout.

Club decisions are made by having a poll in the digital club house.

No physical club meetings, but two yearly get together happenings.



How do we get funding?

The club was just chartered a few weeks ago, so we don't have any experience with this yet, but here are a few ideas we're working on:

Betternow.org - online micro-fundraising.

Getting companies as sponsors/advertisers.

Getting private supporters called "friends of Lions".

Training sessions in the use of social media to other Lions Clubs.

What's next?

As I said, we've just been chartered, so we need to find out what work-capacity our members have, what the want to contribute with, and what we need of funding.

In January 2015 we are planning to have an evening seminar about cyberbullying to test the interest of our Camp #DigMob idea.

And we already have two new members on their way in to the club :-)

Health Programs that Focus on Hearing, Diabetes and More

Lions are known as "knights of the blind," focusing on programs and services for the blind and visually impaired — and aim to eliminate preventable and reversible blindness. But we also participate in other community health programs and projects.

Lions support local and large-scale global health programs to control and prevent <u>diabetes</u> and diabetic retinopathy, the leading cause of vision loss in adults of working age in industrialized countries.


Lions also focus on <u>hearing</u>, with <u>screenings</u>, <u>recreational</u> <u>camps for the deaf</u> and <u>hearing aid recycling programs</u> for children and adults.

And around the world, many Lions <u>service projects</u> have an impact on health. For example, Lions in the United Kingdom funded the first fully equipped ambulance for newborns in Bosnia and Herzegovina. And Lions in the Cayman Islands have worked to increase awareness and early detection of breast cancer.
