

### MLERF SIGNATURE PROJECTS ~ PENNIES FOR SIGHT, JOURNEY FOR SIGHT AND MEMORIAL or IN HONOR

**CONTRIBUTIONS** ~ How does your Club motivate members to contribute to these important projects?

- ~ The **Pennies for Sight Program** was created as another vehicle for Lion's clubs to generate funds for MLERF, literally one penny at a time. Lions clubs distribute penny canisters containing the MLERF logo at local businesses or other venues. Program motto: "Your change changes people's lives". Any Lions club that donates \$100.00 receives a Banner Patch. Once a club has received the banner patch, in any year in which they make another \$100.00 donation, they receive a rocker patch for that year. We have new canisters and labels for old canisters.
- ~ The **Journey to Sight Program** began after the 1982 Lions Clubs International Convention. It was an idea created by Lions Clubs International designed to enable Lions Clubs and Districts to raise funds for sight related activities and increase Club and District visibility and reputation in their communities. Massachusetts Lions Eye Research Fund, Inc. adopted "Journey to Sight" shortly after the 1982 International Convention and later changed the name to Journey for Sight. The first Journey for Sight Weekend was held in May of 1983. The initial idea was for all Clubs to hold a Journey for Sight project on the same weekend of May each year. The purpose of this project was to generate additional funds for MLERF over and above a Lions Club's usual annual donation. Today, Journey For Sight projects occur all year long throughout the five Lions Districts (Y-A-N-K-S).
- ~ Memorial and In Honor of Contributions ~ Envelopes are available for Clubs to give a memorial donation or in honor of an active member or organization. All donations are tax deductible as MLERF is a 501 © 3 organization. A donation to honor our first responders would mean so much to our communities.



- Raise awareness about childhood cancer by holding an educational talk with a healthcare professional at your club or district meeting.
- Collaborate with a local childhood cancer hospital staff to learn about the needs of their patients and families.
   Brainstorm ways your club can address key challenges and gaps.

### ACT BEGINNER

- Identity nearby childhood cancer centers and provide craft materials, puzzles and games to children receiving therapy or treatment.
- Prepare healthy meals for families with children undergoing treatment.
- Post monthly articles about childhood cancer on your club or district website and social media accounts.
- Provide cancer support related books and magazines to your local school or library.
- Write cards full of well-wishes and share them with a local cancer center.
- Give gift cards to identified families in need or a nearby childhood cancer center. Cards could cover expenses like gasoline, parking, food, etc.
- Make or buy new hats, caps, head scarves and blankets to donate to childhood cancer centers.

### ACT INTERMEDIATE

- Help coordinate travel arrangements to and from treatments for a family of a child with cancer.
- Provide tutoring services to children with cancer, as well as their siblings.
- Sponsor a child to attend a childhood cancer camp or activity.
- Through photography, document a family's journey for them as their child undergoes treatment.
- Raise awareness for childhood cancer through radio public service announcements, social media campaigns or a public screening of a film about childhood cancer.
- Provide children's entertainment at a local hospital or treatment center for children with cancer.
- Organize a weekend retreat for families with children in remission.

### ACT ADVANCED

- Form a support group for those affected by childhood cancer, such as patients, caregivers and survivors.
- · Organize a childhood cancer camp.
- Develop a healthy meal program to ensure that children with cancer are well nourished during treatment and while in remission.
- Familiarize yourself with the bone marrow transplant registry. If one is not established in your country, determine what would be needed to create one.
- Provide funding support for essential medicines and supportive services. Crucial medical needs could include chemotherapy supplies, nutritional supplements, medical equipment, essential staff, etc.
- Learn more about temporary housing options for families whose children are patients of cancer treatment centers. Volunteer at established housing facilities or develop a new one.

Macula (MACK-yoo-luh) is the small, sensitive area of the retina that gives central vision. It contains the fovea.

Lens (Lenz) is the clear part of the eye behind the iris that helps to focus light on the retina. It allows the eye to focus on both far and near objects.

Eyelid (I-lid) is the skin-covered structure that protects the front of the eye. It limits the amount of light that enters the eye and spreads tears over the cornea.

Iris (I-ris) is the colored part of the eye. It regulates the amount of light entering the eye.

Pupil (PYOO-puhl) is the opening at the center of the iris. The iris adjusts the size of the pupil and controls the amount of light that can enter the eye.

Cornea (KOR-nee-uh) is the clear outer part of the focusing system. It is located at the front of the eye.

Sclera (SKLEH-ruh) is the tough, white, outer coat of the eye,


# Vitreous humor

(VIT-ree-us HU-mur) is the clear gel filling the inside of the eye.

Fovea (FOH-vee-uh) is the center of the macula. It gives the sharpest vision.

Optic nerve (OP-tic nurv) is the bundle of more than 1 million nerve fibers that carries visual messages from the retina to the brain.

Retina (RE-tin-uh) is the lightsensitive tissue lining the back of the eyeball. It sends electrical impulses to the brain.

### FEEDING HUNGRY NEIGHBORS



When Lions see their community members struggling, they feel compelled to make a real difference. In Lowville, N.Y., Lions volunteer at a food pantry that serves up to 300 families each month. In this

remote area, many people live below the poverty line. And many do not have transportation to the nearest grocery

store, 20 miles away. For these reasons, the town food pantry is a vital part of the community.

The lifeline of the pantry was a passenger van, which was breaking frequently, resulting in costly repairs. Lions need The pantry can now serve as many as 450 families each month.

it to travel back and forth to a food bank 90 minutes away, pick up donations, and make deliveries.

Just as the van broke down for the final time, Lions received a nearly US\$20,700 Matching grant from Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). With the funds, Lions purchased a cargo van and trailer and now can continue being a dependable part of their community.

Locals are thankful the pantry received this gift. "They help me out a lot when I need it," said one pantry patron. With the larger cargo space, the pantry can now serve as many as 450 families each month.
