One of the great Christmas carols is "Joy to the World". As we change over from the Holy Days (both Christmas and Hannukah were on December 25th this year, and Kwanzaa was from December 26th through December 31st) to the New Year, it seems meaningful to reflect on the word "Joy." In 2015, Desmond Tutu and the Dalai Lama provided advice on how to find inner joy. They outlined eight pillars of joy, with four each associated with the mind and the heart. The October 3, 2016 issue of **TIME** magazine has the full article. Boiled down, the pillars all point to not spending much time or energy thinking about yourself.

To me, perspective sounds like walking in another's shoes. Humility is keeping your ego out of your own way. Humor provides us with the ability to see absurdities in even the worst of circumstances. There's a reason so many people in hazardous jobs indulge in graveyard humor! Acceptance is like the first part of the Serenity Prayer: "God, grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change, courage to change the things I can, and wisdom to know the difference."

Forgiveness is the heart's side of acceptance of the weaknesses we all have and letting go of the hurts from them. That includes forgiving ourselves. I've spoken before about how gratitude shapes our perspective and allows us to appreciate what we have (rather than rail against that which we do not have.) Compassion leads us to action to alleviate the sufferings of others. (Sure sounds like a predecessor of Service, doesn't it?) Generosity is happiness in giving of our time, money, food or kindness to people in need.

Joy is not just happiness. It's what happens when service is in action.

So, for this New Year, 2023, I am wishing us all JOY! Deep joy in the service of others!

As you may note, this is a little longer newsletter than others. This is a tribute to the many acts of service you Lions performed during December (and about which I got articles, pictures, or facebook posts.) I'm sure there were many more about which I was uninformed.

But let me tell you that I am honored and proud to be a Lion in District 29-I. You are doing great work in your communities and I am bursting with pride. No pun intended!

HAPPY NEW YEAR Welcome to 2023 – The start of a new year and hopefully a prosperous

year for all of us. I have been blessed with the opportunity to visit several clubs since becoming the First Vice District Governor. This and having been a Zone Chairperson for 3 years allowed me to see Lion's clubs in action. Your service activities are varied and wonderful. When I was Zone Chairperson I asked the clubs to make a list of their various activities taking place or had taken place that year. This information was compiled into a Zone Newsletter. A great way for the Zone to become familiar with what other Clubs are involved in.

Club Health Assessment - Each month the International sends to the District Governor a list called CLUB<u>HEALTH</u> <u>ASSESSMENT</u>- It is a breakdown of what is taking place within the club. Information is taken from club reports. The report consists of four sections: Membership, Reports, Finance and LCIF. It starts out with your charter date, number of members, number of new members, number of members lost, percentage change, total membership 12 months ago, number of years of service for dropped members. REPORTS-Number of months since last membership report, President rotation years, Officer positions that are not filled. SERVICING- months since last service activity reported. Finance – account balances and LCIF - Donations for current year. Your Zone Chairperson also receives a copy of this report.

Why do we not have 100% compliance with reporting activities? If your club is one of those having difficulty inputting information into MYLCI or MYLION, is it due to insufficient technological knowledge, lack of training or just don't get around to it. If so, we can help you. We can train you, work with you, provide assistance to you. Inputting information is as easy as adding a new member into MYLCI. Total input time for a service activity is around 5 minutes.

Doing a visit to a club, members were asked if they received the monthly newsletter or had they seen the newsletter. They informed me they had not. I Check the club's member info. and noted well over 50% had no information relating to an email address. Last week I was asked by Lion friend who had remarried to check her club info. Her new name was there, however, the new phone number, internet email address and home address had not been changed. We need to ensure that MYLCI information is correct.

The easiest way to provide the monthly newsletter to most of our members is through their email accounts. A copy of the newsletter is forwarded by email to all clubs by the District Governor. Clubs can create a group email account which will allow members with an email account to receive copies of newsletters with just a click of the send key or through individual email. Clubs should see to it that those members without email accounts can view a copy of the newsletters.

New Year resolution to our Clubs: Let's resolve to fix the problems noted above.
