Club visits in September were limited with three clubs requesting a change and one club cancelling due to a medical situation. I did manage to be a part of the Fort Ashby Sunday get together featuring an indoor picnic at the Annunciation of our Lord Church, Ft Ashby. My presentation and a Boy Scout celebration event were held. Good food, awesome people, and a good time. I also was able to conduct a meeting and induction at the Lumberport Lions Club. Small in number, but they have inducted 12 members in the last two years. Lumberport was chartered in 1927.

Five members of District 29-I attended the Lions Leadership Forum in Reno, Nevada on September 21-23, 2023. In attendance were Lion Judy Harder (my wife), Past International Director (PID) Lion Steve Glass, Zone Chairperson Brendan Byrne and past District Governor (PDG) Lion Gray Jones & wife, Shelley and myself. The forum Seminars and accommodation for most was at the Siver Legacy casino and hotel. The hotel was 47 stories high and consisted of over 1700 rooms. The Forum consisted of 88 group/ meetings, seminars over three days. Topics ranged from an autopsy of a Deceased Lions Club (Why Lions Clubs Die) to Succession Planning "The Future Starts Today". A total of 10 seminars is all you were able to attend. All seminars were filled with Lions members. Judy and I met our Conference Speaker Internationals Director Marie Cunning and had lunch with her and had a nice visit. One of the District Goals is to create a succession training program. The goal is to Identify 10 Lion members to begin succession training for possible leadership positions in the future. I got to thinking this is not okay. I think it falls far short of what we need. Every club, also the district, will have new people assuming leadership roles each year. Many move into leadership roles with a limited knowledge of the position and the responsibilities of that position. It is not just those coming into the positions, it is also some of those currently in those positions that need training. As I visit clubs and work with my Zone Chairpersons, I am concerned that some individuals who have several years as Officers in Charge don't fully understand their role and responsibility of the positions they have. Training should begin with the

orientation training for new members, continue through the mentoring program, and to club members progressing to Club Officers. Succession training can begin with courses in the International portal (Learn). Example: if a Vice President desires to become the president of his club, they can go into the learn portal select those courses pertaining to club president and take them along with the management courses available. Any Lion can bring up the training available and take the training. There are approximately 40 online courses available. Any training courses taken in the learn portal becomes a part of your training information at the International. Also, local training can be listed in your Lion's portfolio. The Global Leadership chairperson can input your information. We will be working with clubs to get members started on succession training. If you have any questions on accessing the information in the learn portal, contact me or Lion Gray Jones, Global Leadership Chairperson (GLT). Note: Club Presidents, secretaries, treasurer and membership chairpersons, part of your ongoing training is taking the courses designated for your position in the learn portal. Our scheduled seminars for presidents and secretaries will begin in the near future. All presidents and secretaries are expected to attend. There are changes coming and things are just not the same. We need to keep you current. Those not attending will be asked to attend one of the other sessions. If unable to attend, please contact us prior to the time of the course, don't just not show up. I am still looking for enthusiastic Lions wishing to move past the club level for sessions training. If you are that person or know of someone, please let me know. Note: club presidents and secretaries as part of your job responsibilities you are expected to attend Zone meetings.

It won't be long until our District Conference. The conference is on October 20 and 21. Friday Oct 20 is our "Meet and Greet" time with dinner and entertainment. The agenda is not completed as I write this, however; I do know that the we will have a Lions member speaking to us about his trip to Honduras, a member of the Sight Foundation speaking to us, Past International Director (PID) Steve Glass seminar and our International Director (ID) Lion Marie Cunning holding a seminar on Marketing and updating us on International President (IP) Dr. Patti Hill's focus on Mission 1.5, environment and LCIF. Clubs, please send a representative from your club to the conference. The meeting, seminars and all-around good time is well worth the time and expense. Youth Exchange Reflections

While in Germany, I was exposed to many aspects of German life and culture, some of which were really no different than here in the United States, and some aspects that were a shock to me. Most of my exposure was during my ten-day period with my host family, the Fungipanis, and with their son, Gianni. Early June was the time when German seniors were graduating and making their final memories in High School before moving on, and I got to experience most of these events first-hand.

First, I'll quickly summarize the things that were the same. Food, drinks, clothing, cars, movies, and especially music were no different than they are here in America, with American influence able to be seen in every corner of German society. On one occasion, at the party celebrating their graduation, the song YMCA by the Village People was played, and naturally I did the arm movement alongside it. A friend of my host brother said, "oh, you know the dance," and all I could think was, "of course, we invented it!" Music was by far the biggest similarity, as there really were no German songs played at any event or on the radio, the artists were Taylor Swift, Ed Sheeran, Katy Perry, Elton John, and other major American and British singers, that dominated the scene. They even regularly play Country Roads. As for clothing and the like, most Germans wear American brands: American Eagle, A&F, Tommy Hilfiger, Nike, and many more. On most occasions, shopkeepers and clerks would assume I knew and was German simply because there was no telling the difference between our styles of dress. In many aspects of German society, we are nearly identical.

As for the differences, it is nearly impossible to put into words. There are some fundamental aspects of how Germans act, think, and work that are inherently different from us, and are not really something that could be understood unless you experienced it firsthand. Something that stuck out to me, although pretty saddening in my opinion, was the utter lack of respect people not of Christian faiths experienced, particularly those of the Islamic faith. At the school I shadowed at, I was told a story about one of the students who was caught slipping off to a janitor's closet to pray thrice a day in accordance with her faith, and when she was caught, the school refused to accommodate her, and simply put her in a Christian Education class and called it a day. This was not a private school either, this was a publicly funded, government school, and all I could think was how such a thing would never be tolerated here, and how everyone, regardless of faith or background, would receive the same rights to practice everywhere. From what I saw, this was not an isolated case either, and while a sad note

to bring up in the essay, I do believe it is important to mention, as the goal of the Lions Club International is to foster understanding and respect between cultures, and some of what I witnessed in Germany was the exact antithesis of that goal. On a less serious note as that, some more minor things I noticed was Germans typically kept to themselves more, nodding to someone as you pass them on the street, or waving to a stranger are not commonplace, and doing so would often net you strange looks. On the other hand, Germans were much friendlier when it came to crossing the street or biking, with them not hesitating to stop their cars and yield the right of way to any pedestrians at any time, compared to the wait you would often get here in America. Germans are also strangely strict about their laws, not in the sense of serious crimes, but acts such as jaywalking are frowned upon, and even if the road is completely clear for miles, you are still expected to wait for the light to signal you to cross the road. In summary, the differences in American and German society, for the most part, are small quirks that I noticed with my time there, but the biggest differences, like the disregard for other culture's customs, are by far the most glaring issues. I owe most of my thanks to my host brother Gianni for explaining these cultural differences to me, as he has spent some time in America himself and could educate me well on the topic.

I'll end my essay with a quick run through of all I did during my times abroad. With my host family, most of our time was spent at parties and celebrations for graduation, where the local area (The Sauerland) had some pretty unique customs. First, the rival schools, Plettenberg (the town I stayed in,) and the neighboring town of Attendorn engaged in tree plantings, where the teams from each side raced to see who could plant all of their trees first. Another was a party where groups of people bought cheap beater cars that would not pass another inspection to spray paint and decorate to a theme of their choosing, before driving them around town in a parade. Around this time, a celebration known as Schutzenfest was going on, which was just a parade followed by target shooting, where the most accurate would be crowned King. I also went to school for a couple days while over there, which I enjoyed, but ultimately came to the conclusion that I am grateful I went through the American school system. The next stage was the actual camp, and here I met many people from around the world, a couple of whom I have been actively keeping in touch with, and have tentative plans to see again in a few months. The countries represented at this camp were: America, Israel, Mexico, Ireland, Hungary, Italy, Turkey, Georgia, Canada, and Moldova. We all got the opportunity to present our nations and make food for the group, and many of us found ourselves to have more in common with each other than we initially thought. As a group we did many team-building exercises, and by the end of the camp, we all worked fairly well together and had a solid rapport. As a camp, we traveled around cities like Dusseldorf and Gelsenkirchen as we learned more about German society and overall just toured various parts of western Germany. The farewell party was ultimately the

highlight, even if pretty depressing, as we all had one last party together as a camp and with our host families, and said our goodbyes as we funneled out to the airport one at a time.

In retrospect, I learned a lot about German society and culture during my time with the exchange, far more than what can be achieved simply by reading or watching videos. Even still, roughly two weeks since returning home, I find myself comparing and contrasting life in Germany to here back home. Of course, not all of this was positive, I had mentioned the glaring disrespect for foreign cultures that was seemingly institutionalized in German society, something that was especially abhorrent to someone coming from a relatively diverse town of many immigrants from many different cultures and faiths. On the other hand though, the wide variety of young people I met at the camp, all of whom had some form of common ground with each other, and who did genuinely respect each other's differences, inspired a hope that, in time, these divides would heal. Ultimately, I believe that my generation will be the ones to finally bridge these gaps, and that the Lions Youth Exchange will help greatly in those endeavors. I am thankful for the scholarship for providing me with the opportunity to take part, and I hope to participate in another exchange, and I hope that the program continues to grow, and that more people take part in it.
