#### **CHAPTER 6 - THINKING LIKE A LION**

Throughout my visits this year I have been given many stories of AHA moments of fellow Lions. Last month I wrote about a little girl, who at five, knew she wanted to help people. However, sometimes it takes some children time to realize their calling when they get a little older. I have two stories I would like to share about young teens and their experience which had a profound influence on them.

To set the stage, have you ever seen the TV programs "Little House on the Prairie," or "When Calls the Heart?" Both of these shows are in towns where there are very small schools in which the students are taught in 1 to 3 rooms. They usually have one teacher who instructs all grade levels. These next 2 stories will express how two individuals experience families in need and how these experiences changed their lives.

"My ah ha moment was when was 12, I accompanied my mother, a teacher, on home visits for the head start program. We visited many families but I will always remember this one family in particular-so very clean (everything was scrubbed and polished), but the children we so skinny and had dark circled under their eyes, no shoes and raggedy ill-fitting clothes and not a toy or pet in sight. They literally had next to nothing, but were so proud of what they had and took care of it. This family moved a few years later, but till this day I will remember the cold house, hungry children and nervous mom-afraid we would judge her. I remember the love in her eyes for her children and their lack of everything, I took for granted."

"When I was 13, my teacher assigned to me a 1<sup>st</sup> grader. Each day I washed and put clean clothes on her. The assignment was for the whole year. At the end of the year, I asked the teacher why this was a daily event. The teacher asked, 'how would I like to sleep with 6 other brothers and sisters in the same bed with-the younger ones that were not potty trained?' I have always been grateful for this lesson."

We, as Lions, encounter families in need in one form or another. Even though these stories happened long ago, these situations exist today. Our children know these families. Engage in conversation with your child or grandchildren. Maybe they can be the sounding block for helping those in need and have them help with serving the public.

And now you may have made those New Year's Resolutions! What a glorious optimism to face the New Year filled with the desire to become better or improve your circumstances.

By now, it's clear to my dear Lions readers that I admire those who have made service to others a primary thread in their lives. I try to make that slogan a driving force in my own life, but now, I want to add another one: "Thank someone daily for their service." I'm not talking about thanking your spouse for something nice they've done for you (you ought to be doing that already!) nor am I talking about thanking your wait staff for serving you well (see above about your spouse!)

I'm talking about reaching out to others who are in the background, who are usually "invisible" to us. I'm reminded of two stories I used as Scoutmaster's Minutes with my troop. The first is the story of William J. "Bill" Crawford who was a janitor at the US Air Force Academy, and was finally recognized by a cadet as the presumed deceased Medal of Honor winner for his actions in Italy during World War II. The second, which seems apocryphal ("a story or statement of doubtful authenticity, although widely circulated as being true"), centers around a college professor's pop quiz asking: *"What is the name of the woman who cleans your classroom?"* The bottom line of both of these stories is that the real work gets done by those on the bottom rungs of the career ladder, and their contributions are rarely acknowledged.

My hope for each of you is that you can go into this new year with gratitude for all you have, with appreciation for all of those who serve, and the desire and willingness to recognize and acknowledge their service. We Serve (and acknowledge others who do too!)

### **Holiday Spices and Diabetes**

The Christmas celebration starts on December 25 and lasts for twelve days till the day of Epiphany, (the day that honors the Magi visiting the toddler Jesus), which ends this year on January 6, 2022. Thoughts of this season bring to mind one spice that is central to the smells and thoughts of Christmas and New Years: CINNAMON. In this article I will talk about the effect cinnamon has on diabetes.

The warm smell of cinnamon makes me want to go to the fridge and scoop out some of my Mom's homemade, no sugar added, apple butter and put it on cottage cheese. While the smell of this spice brings nostalgic memories flooding back to many people's minds, it has special properties that assist in managing blood sugars. Cinnamon is derived from the inner bark of the branches of cinnamon *cassia cinnamon* trees. Research suggests that consuming the spice can help improve blood glucose levels and increase insulin sensitivity. Results from a clinical study published in *Diabetes Care Journal* suggest that cinnamon bark improves blood glucose and cholesterol levels in Type Two Diabetics, and may reduce the risk factors associated with diabetes and cardiovascular disease for non-diabetics. So try to add this spice every chance you get to lower your risk of Type Two Diabetes and cardiovascular disease.
