To all my Lion Friends and Families, HAPPY NEW YEAR! Have the best year ever! May your New Year be filled with joys, celebrations, accomplishments, energy, motivation and kindness.

The first six months have been a huge learning experience as your District Governor. I have had the pleasure of visiting over half of our Lion clubs in the district. I am amazed at what some of the clubs have been doing and I am also concerned about the viability of some of our clubs. To the Clubs that I have visited, "Thank You" for your hospitality and friendship.

Looking back over the last six months and the goals we established at the District Level, we have a long way to go. I am sure the same situation exists for many of our Lion clubs. So, let's "team up" and put our collective energy into accomplishing our goals. Congratulations goes out to the Berkeley Springs Peace Poster winner, Casey Canoles, of the Warm Springs Middle School. The poster also won in the Multiple District Contest and is at International for their review.

I have received 176 Chevrons which have been or will be delivered to the Zone Chairs and Clubs for presentation. We have been sending and presenting a "welcome package" to all new members (less than one year membership). This packet contains a Welcome Letter along with a New Member Orientation Guide and A Standard Club Structure form. So far, approximately 100 of these packets have been delivered. A hold was placed on completing this mission due to not having enough New Member Orientation Guides. However, I just received a shipment of another hundred guides, so we will be continuing the process. Each new member having an email account receives a copy of the Lions Standard Club Constitution and Bylaws.

Five scholarship applications have been received and awarded to the Leadership Retreat in January.

We are now in the second half of our 2023-2024 Lion's Year. I have been reviewing information regarding our clubs and have some statistical information to present. List of Club Positions that are vacant: 1st Vice President = 4, 2nd Vice President = 20, Membership = 15, LCIF Position = 30, Servicing = 33, and Marketing = 36. We have one club which has a vacancy in both the 1st and 2nd Vice President positions. These positions are there to provide your Club with the best chance of being a very productive club. Each one has a reason for its existence. Take marketing, growing your club is dependent upon club members getting the word out to the public (Marketing/public relations). It is a lot easier to have someone in

charge of a committee that can put emphasis on developing a marketing plan for your club. Service committees coordinate your service projects. Membership Chairs along with membership committees, work on ways to keep members and attract new members. The 1st Vice president is also your Leadership Chairperson.

We emphasize Leadership and Leadership training, yet we leave leadership positions unfilled. We have at the District Level a Global Action Team, consisting of a GST (Global Servicing Team), GLT (Global Leadership Team), and a GMT (Global Membership Team). They are here to interact with the Club's Servicing Team, Leadership Team and Membership Team. You notice the word "TEAM." "WE ARE A TEAM!"

Some good news is that I visited the Romney Lions Club on December 7, with the meeting being held at the WV School for the Deaf and Blind. Also attending was my wife, Lion Judy, and Past District CC's Doug and Sue Long. The meal was prepared by the students at the school. Lion DeeDee Mulledy was presented with a New Member Welcome packet, the New Membership Orientation Guide and Welcome Letter from the District Governor. They also had two other new members that were not in attendance, but will receive the packets, etc. from the President of the Club. A 50 Year Chevron was presented to Lion Brian Bowman for his years of Lion service along with a letter from International President, Patti Hill.

The visit to the Parson Lions Club on December 12th, was an awesome Christmas Dinner with more food than one could consume. The meeting was joyful with prizes being won by club members. A "Leonard Jarrett" award was presented to Club President, Lion Paul Nestor, and a "Melvin Jones Fellowship" was given to Lion Keith Lipscomb.

Remember: Lion members of the District Cabinet and myself are here to support you and provide assistance when needed. We are a "TEAM!" Together, we can accomplish a great deal. scholarship. They review the Lions Youth Camps & Exchange directory on the Lions website and select a country and a camp they wish to attend and then the exchange process begins.

Three scholarship winners were able to remain to the end of the day. Pictured L-R is Elizabeth Williams of Moorefield, Dominick Cabrera of Bruceton Mills and Sofiah Boesenske of Benwood, WV. Also selected winners are Madelyn Brown of Beckley, Danielle Scantlin of Evans, Adelina Zizzi of Morgantown.

The youth exchange program can only operate where host families are available in the participating countries. I need help identifying host families for those students wishing to visit WV. Exchanges are during the summer months and generally last for 4 weeks. When we send our students abroad the receiving countries often send a student or two to WV. Please contact me with the names of those families wishing to encounter an experience of a life time. Where you



ask do you find a good host family? Talk with your families, friends, co-workers, and church families. Lorrie and I have hosted 8 students since 2013 and we continue to stay in touch with them. Just a few weeks ago we had a one-hour call with Meylin from Peru who stayed with us in 2013 & 2014. Don't be afraid to encounter an experience that will forever enhance your life.

Saturday Evening - Past International Director Larry L. Edwards, from Altoona, Pennsylvania, USA was elected to serve as international director of Lions Clubs International at the association's 102nd International Convention, held in Milan, Italy, July 5 through July 9, 2019.

Past Director Edwards retired in 2016 after working 45 years in the banking industry. As a former bank executive, he directed operational requirements for nine large bank mergers as well as developed new commercial banking product lines and their supporting technologies.

Past Director Edwards has held a number of offices within the association including multiple district council chairperson and as part of the multiple district State Convention Election Committee. He is also president of the Blair County Lions Sight Conservation Foundation.

Past Director Edwards is also a Progressive Melvin Jones Fellow. In addition to his Lions activities, Past Director Edwards is director of the Central Pennsylvania National Guard & Veterans Association, former treasurer of the Blair County United Way, and member of the Blair County Chamber of Commerce. Past Director Edwards is also an Eagle Scout and past board member and district chairman for Boy Scouts of America.
