When I was 15, the tall, handsome mailman in his crisp blue uniform sauntered up to our front porch. "I haven't seen you folks around for a few weeks," he said. Mom explained that we'd been away at the Cleveland Clinic where I'd undergone brain surgery. Mr. Dean admired my chic, frosted hairdo. "Well, you sure don't look like anyone who'd has a big operation, young lady," he said. "Show him your scar, honey!" Mom said to my utter humiliation. I peeled off my new acrylic wig and leaned over to reveal the ear-to-ear incision on my stubbly head. I thought I would die. But after that, Mr. Dean was the warmest, kindest man I'd ever known. One day when Mom was not around, he told me about his own scar, hidden by that polished uniform and the face he wore...It's a funny thing about scars. When I look into the mirror, I'm not ashamed of them anymore. They remind me of wonderful people like Mr. Dean and the countless people who face unspeakable changes in their lives. Scars tell their stories. Of suffering redeemed to become courage, resilience, faith and hope.

As Lions, we have helped and served many people in many ways. These past 2 years have left many individuals (adults young and old, children) scarred from all sorts of dramatic issues, loss of jobs, closing of schools, illness, loss of family members, hunger, to name a few. Our stories are our way of sharing the brilliance of human frailty when interceded by the unlimited, unwavering power of serving others. As Lions we open our hearts and believe the slightest sign of compassion and giving can make a difference in those who are scarred.

Thank you for helping me heal my scars. My year as Governor has been so rewarding. Your hospitality on the visits have been amazing. Your personal stories have shown me that Lionism is alive and well in our District.

We just concluded a very successful MD 29 Convention – the convention for the whole state of West Virginia. I wish more of you could have attended. We need your help to make the districts provide your clubs with even better support.

Some folks, like one of my daughters, a very dedicated dental technician, have no desire to broaden their responsibilities beyond trying to excel at what they do. Others would like to broaden their reach and embrace challenges beyond their club, but often don't know how to do so. Others are a little intimidated by the thought of piling even more onto their current responsibilities. We love, respect, and have a place for all of you in Lions!

We do need more people willing to expand their Lions horizons to embrace other clubs and shoulder additional responsibilities. So what do the districts do for your clubs and where can we use support?

The three districts in WV (L, C, and I) provide training for your club officers and for the zone chairpersons who work with 5 to 8 geographically-aligned clubs. They hold yearly conferences to provide opportunities for all clubs to get together, socialize, receive classes on various topics of interest to Lions, and discuss the state of the district. They provide "experts" in the Lions global causes, in ways to get LCIF grants, ways to receive support from the West Virginia Lions Sight and Conservation Foundation, how to provide service dogs to those who need them, and how to support youth in attending camps, learning how to be good citizen leaders, learning how to read, entering the peace poster contest, and providing recreation and work support to our blind and deaf students. And there are those Lions working behind the scenes to provide these newsletters, maintain the web pages, putting on the conference, and supporting the state convention.

We also provide leadership training for district and club leaders, support for club secretaries and club administrators in entering service activities, and support to clubs recruiting new members, starting branch or specialty clubs, and retaining current members.

I'm not a salesman, I don't twist arms, and I'll tell you the truth — unvarnished! But I would love to hear from you and about your interests. We need the people who want to only support their local communities: that keeps our clubs strong. (they retire, their nests become empty, when their term with the school board ends, when their office in the rotary club ends, when their responsibilities as a deacon in their church slacks off some, and any other reasons they are currently too busy to do more. We'll even provide some material to ponder and get better acquainted with possible next steps.

In September of 2005, on the first day of school, Martha Cothren, History teacher at Robinson High School in Little Rock, did something not to be forgotten. On the first day of school, with the permission of the school superintendent, the principal and the building supervisor, she removed all of the desks in her classroom. When the first period kids entered the room they discovered that there were no desks.

"Ms. Cothren, where are our desks?" She replied, "You can't have a desk until you tell me how you earn the right to sit at a desk." They thought, well maybe it's our grades, "no," she said. "Maybe it's our behavior"; "She told them, "No, it's not even your behavior."

And so, they came and went, the first period, second period, third period. News crews had started gathering at the school to report about this crazy teacher who had taken all the desks out of her room

The final period of the day came and as the puzzled students found seats on the floor of the desk-less classroom. Martha Cothren said, "Throughout the day no one has been able to tell me just what he or she has done to earn the right to sit at the desks that are ordinarily found in this classroom. Now I am going to tell you."

At this point, Martha Cothren went over to the door of her classroom and opened it. Twenty-seven (27) U.S. Veterans, all in uniform, walked into that classroom, each one carrying a school desk. The Vets began placing the school desks in rows, and then would walk over and stand alongside the wall. By the time the last soldier had set the final desk in place those kids started to understand, perhaps for the first time in their lives, just how the right to sit at those desks had been earned.

Martha said, "You didn't earn the right to sit at these desks. These heroes did it for you. They placed the desks here for you. They went halfway around the world, giving up their education and interrupting their careers and families so you could have the freedom you have. Now, it's up to you to sit in them. It is your responsibility to learn to be good students, to be good citizens. They paid the price so that you could have the freedom to get an education. Don't ever forget it."

This is a true story. And this teacher was awarded the Veterans of Foreign Wars Teacher of the year for the State of Arkansas in 2006. She is the daughter of a WWII POW.


Do you think this is worth passing along so others won't forget either, that the freedoms we have in this great country were earned by our U.S. Veterans?...I did.
