A Lion friend of mine suggested that I use that quote since it "fits what Lions are about." He's absolutely correct. Few of us can meet that lofty goal. We prioritize our "means" so that our families come first and we retain our standard of living. By the choices we make, we limit our exposure to those places and people who might need help.

As we expand our view, the needs become overwhelming. There is so much hunger and strife in the world. There is so much devastation from hurricanes and earthquakes and fires. There are so many people suffering and dying from disease. The earth is being ravaged by man. We have a strong temptation to pull in and focus only on the realities of those near to us. Few of us are willing to impoverish ourselves in a vain attempt to help those numerous others who are less fortunate. The needs are so huge compared to the little we have to contribute.

As a Christian, the Bible is my guidebook and Jesus is the example to follow. By talent, education, and my working life, I'm mostly an engineer and partly a scientist; thus, I analyze and parse. As I reflect on Wesley's quote, the Bible, and the life of Jesus, it occurs to me that focusing on the nouns is missing the point. Rather than emphasizing our shortcomings as compared to some unattainable level of perfect outcome, we would be better served by focusing on the phrase: "you can." What, within the bounds of our own priorities, "can" we do?

Archaeology and history both tell us that the Bible only talks of the Middle East. Jesus only lived in the vicinity of where Israel is today. The Bible doesn't describe a perfect world and Jesus didn't solve all of the world's problems!

The lesson to me is that I should live my life, in my own place, in my own time, and try to follow the example of Jesus and the Golden Rule. While we live, there will never be peace on earth. There will never be a lack of poverty. There will never be an end of earthly disasters. We will never be free of diseases. We will never have only men and women of good will on earth.

We should live our lives following Wesley's recommendation, and with our Lions motto in our hearts. Certainly, through LCI and other charities we can help the wider world. Through our own Lions clubs we can help our communities. And through our own efforts we can help other people. While we are unable to perfect the world, like Jesus, we can make service ripples that spread through time and space to help others in ways we can't conceive.

BERKELEY SPRINGS LIONS CLUB EYE GLASSES RECYCLE COLLECTION BOX

Why Get Involved in Eyeglass Recycling?

In just about any dresser drawer, one can find a pair of eyeglasses that are no longer being used. That same pair of eyeglasses can change another person's life. This is why we started the Lions Recycle for Sight program. District 29-I Lions collect used eyeglasses and deliver them to regional eyeglasses recycling in Northern Virginia where volunteers clean, sort by prescription strength and package the glasses. Most of the recycled glasses are distributed to people in need in developing countries where they will have the greatest impact. However, Federal and WV state legal changes are currently underway to allow these recycled glasses to be distributed in WV, under the supervision of a certified eye care provider.

Participation in the Lions Eyeglass Recycling Program can raise your club's visibility and provide your fellow Lions and Leos with a team project that is both easy and rewarding. The donated eyeglasses collected by your club can help improve the quality of life for children and adults living in low and middle-income communities around the world. Many will experience corrected vision for the first time, enabling them to lead productive working lives, support their families, attend school and advance their education.



What is leadership and why is it so important?

There are as many answers to this question as there are the number of Lions who may read this article. Everyone has an opinion about what makes a person a leader and whether it is important. I am going to suggest to you in a moment a couple of definitions that I hold to and several attributes of leaders, but to demonstrate to you the importance of leadership, I ask you the following questions:

- 1. Who inspires you to be involved in your club?
- 2. Who ensures that your club projects and fundraisers are successful?
- 3. Who do you know in your district or club that takes responsibility?
- 4. Who do you know that sets a good example for others?
- 5. Who do you know that has vision and sets a course to accomplish things?

How would anything get accomplished in your club or your district without someone who exhibits all of those behaviors that are enumerated above? In short, could anything get done without someone/ones taking the lead, organizing an event, taking action, and following through? **This is leadership!**

Throughout my years as a Lion, many definitions of leadership have been shared with me, and I have developed one of my own. First, from Simon Sinek:

Leadership is not about being in charge. Leadership is about taking care of those in your charge.

Now, my own:

Leadership is the ability to positively influence others toward the achievement of a common goal or mission through vision, action, character, and commitment.

Leadership is something that can be more easily observed than defined. Let's examine some qualities of highlyeffective leaders:

- They have vision. (They begin each challenge with the end in mind.)
- They have integrity and they inspire trust.
- They are planners. (They put first things first.)
- They are keen listeners. (They seek first to understand,)
- They are life-long learners. (They constantly sharpen the saw.)
- They take action. (They are proactive, not reactive.)
- They build consensus. (They think win-win.)

Finally, I leave you with this thought: Who came first, Melvin Jones or Lions Clubs International?

We Are Lions

The Romney Lions Club one of the oldest service organizations (founded in 1930) recently held their annual picnic at Hampshire Park where they installed club officers for the coming year (first picture below) and inducted four new members: Wanda Rogers, Amy Delaplain, Christy Kauffman, and Margaret Carlin (second picture below). The newly elected District Governor Lion Sue Long was the featured guest and led in the ceremonies.

Romney Lions donate over \$2,000.00 annually to assist qualified recipients in obtaining eye exams and purchasing eyeglasses. They also collect over 400 pairs of used eyeglasses each year to be sent to the regional collection center to be distributed to the needy or to be recycled.

Other community projects include distribution of American flags to all Hampshire County first graders each year; assisting the WV State School for the Deaf and the Blind with a student work program; assist with a women's shelter, provide education and camps for children with diabetes; and many others.

Peace Poster Contest Deadlines

Students ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15 are eligible to participate in the International Peace Poster Contest. Entries not meeting the following deadlines will be disqualified.

- **January 15:** Kits go on sale from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
- October 1: Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
- **November 15:** Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a district governor to send one winning district poster to multiple district council chairperson.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a district governor not belonging to a multiple district to send one winning poster to the Brand and Marketing Strategy Department at International Headquarters.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a club not belonging to a district to send one winning entry to the Brand and Marketing Strategy Department at International Headquarters.
- **December 15:** Postmark deadline for the multiple district council chairperson to send one winning poster to the Brand and Marketing Strategy Department at International Headquarters.
- **February 1:** International winners notified on or before this date.

Robert's Rules of Order: Protocol's Often Forgotten Son By Steve Glass, MD 29 Protocol Chairperson

Generally, when we think of protocol in the Lions environment, we think in terms of who is supposed to sit at the head table, or in what order do we introduce guests, or what are we going to wear? There is an equally or perhaps even more important aspect of protocol that impacts our membership more dramatically; and that is how do we properly conduct our meetings, whether they be a banquet event or a regular club meeting. Having a basic understanding of how to effectively conduct a meeting is so very important to keeping our members interested and involved.

Past International Director Sunil Kumar R (2012-2014) in his book *Meeting Specialist* states in its Preface: "Meetings make organizations. When meetings are held in an orderly manner and offer opportunities to debate, there is tremendous learning for all. Meetings must encourage participation by members and help decision making. Members must take home the benefit from meetings." All too often in our clubs one of the top three reasons cited for members leaving is long, boring, and unproductive meetings.

What can we do as leaders to spruce up our meetings, enhance the learning experience, and empower our members? Here are some practical tips from Robert's Rules of Order, Revised:

- 1. Stick to the proposed agenda. Do not allow discussion on topics that are not on the approved agenda. Do not let any one member dominate the floor or the discussion.
- 2. The Chairperson or the presiding officer (usually the club president during a club meeting) calls the meeting to order promptly at the designated hour and recognizes those who wish to speak on a motion or matter before the group. It is solely within the presiding officer's power to recognize who speaks and in what order and to limit debate when it is too lengthy or not relevant.
- 3. The chairperson is also charged with preserving order during a meeting. This means that the chairperson can rule a member out of order if the member is unruly, disruptive, and clearly is dominating the discussion.
- 4. When the chairperson is satisfied that those adequate discussions have taken place on a motion, he/she can call for a vote. He/she is mandated to call for a vote when requested by a member for "call for previous question."
- 5. Any matter coming before the club for action can only be done through putting a motion before the group. i. e. "I move that we donate \$500.00 to LCIF." That motion then needs a second by another member, then discussion is permitted before voting.
- 6. Lastly, always remember that the actions and history of an organization can only be captured through the minutes of the organization. Minutes tell the world and posterity what actions the organization took and when they took the action. Therefore, members should insist on having accurate minutes of each meeting where motions were made and action taken.
