# **Driving Conversations for a Successful Club**

As a scientist, I like to reduce things to common denominators. So, to understand Lions Clubs, I reduce club operations into four main topics. These are separated into 2 categories, which are: active categories; **Service**, which is our product and **Fundraising**, the processes used to fund our product. Along with silent categories; **Administration**, organizing the ability to conduct fundraising for providing service, and **Membership**, obtaining labor to do the same.

Service to the community is the primary product of Lions Clubs. The Lions Clubs were founded in 1917 by business owners to facilitate bonds within the community. Once established as the International Organization of Lions Clubs in 1920, focus was gained in 1925 when Helen Keller spoke at their international convention and asked them to become her "Knights of the Blind". Throughout the passage of time, the motto of "We Serve" remained as each club sought and pursued wide varieties of services to resolve within their communities. Lions Clubs International pursues 8 cornerstones of service which are:

Vision	Hunger
Diabetes	Humanitarian
Youth	Environment
Childhood Cancer	Disaster Relief

Look to use these visions to expand services in your community.

**Fundraising** is successfully executed by understanding the community in which the Lions

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Club serves. Fundraising becomes more palatable when the activity expresses the services the club provides. A potential customer to a sale or donor for a service provided, is far more likely to contribute and continue contributing when they see the services being rendered. In this way, fundraising is inextricably linked to service.

Ideas for fundraising can be found on the LCI website at <u>lionsclubs.org</u> or any simple internet search. A club should look to the skills of the club members that add support to fundraising efforts. Also, look to the community to assess what types of fundraisers are feasible to pursue. Lions need to be aware that as time passes fundraising activities can change and a club needs to always be prepared for the changes. A highly successful fundraiser may diminish as the community changes. Or, the ability for the club to remain effective with the fundraiser declines. It is incumbent upon the club members to continually assess fundraisers for their effectiveness and always be prepared for change.

Administration is the establishment of officerships and is an indication of the strength within the club. Fulfilling the battery of positions with each member occupying a position such that individuals do not "wear too many hats", while also being active in that position is where the club takes root, grows and establishes the premise that "many hands make light work".

# Leader Dog

# In Every Leader Dog Lies the Heart of a Lion

LCIF and Leader Dogs for the Blind go as far back as 1939. Since then, the Lions have been ambassadors and loyal supporters of the mission to help the visually impaired find their independence and freedom while living in a sightless world. It all started on a small farm in Rochester Hills, Michigan. Fifty dollars a month rented a farmhouse for the clients and staff, a barn for the dogs, and a garage. On October 8, 1939, the first class of the official Lions Leader Dog Foundation graduated. The cost to graduate a client/dog team was \$600. Today, that price has skyrocketed to a whopping \$45,744/ team. The training is still in Rochester Hills Michigan.

Today, the Lions Club supports guide dog programs through fundraising, volunteer efforts, and advocacy. Many local Lions Clubs sponsor individual guide dogs, covering the substantial costs of breeding, training, and lifelong care. The club also supports research into new training techniques, such as harnesses that improve communication between dogs and their handlers. In addition to guide dog programs, the Lions Club has also embraced the use of service dogs for other disabilities, expanding their mission to assist more people in need. Lions have stepped forward to support the people WE SERVE as puppy raisers and hosts for our breeding stock dogs.

The Lions club has played a crucial role in creating a world where visually impaired individuals can lead fulfilling lives. As we look to the future, we must remain dedicated to this cause, continuing to innovate and support the guide dog movement globally.

## THE 2024-2025 CONTEST Peace Without Limits

For peace to be anything more than a possibility, we need to make it a priority. This year, we're asking our young students to create a poster that speaks to our world's infinite potential for kindness once we commit to pursuing the idea of peace without limits.

## Peace Poster Contest Deadlines

Students ages 11, 12 or 13 as of November 15<sup>th</sup> are eligible to participate in the International Peace Poster Contest. Entries not meeting the following deadlines will be disqualified.

- January 15: Kits go on sale from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
- October 1: Deadline to purchase kits from the Club Supplies Sales Department at International Headquarters.
- November 15: Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster (per contest sponsored) to the district governor.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a district governor to send one winning district poster to multiple district council chairperson.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a district governor not belonging to a multiple district to send one winning poster to the Brand & Creative Department at International Headquarters.
- **December 1:** Postmark deadline for a club not belonging to a district to send one winning entry to the Brand & Creative Department at International Headquarters.
- **December 15:** Postmark deadline for the multiple district council chairperson to send one winning poster to the Brand & Creative Department at International Headquarters.
- **February 1:** International winners notified on or before this date.

# Youth Exchange Reflections

I understand different ways of life, but the majority of the places I have been to are fairly similar to West Virginia, or are just similar culture from being in the United States. Before my exchange, I had only been outside of the US once when I went to Mexico with my family. I feel that I didn't get the actual authentic

experience for Mexico because my family stayed at a resort and we weren't sightseeing. I did enjoy that trip but that experience was something I could have had in the US. My experience in Italy was completely different. My exchange in Italy fully immersed me in the culture and history of the area. I was able to see so many iconic cities, landmarks, and buildings that I didn't believe I would ever get to see, especially all in one trip. This exchange was truly an amazing opportunity and I am so grateful that I was given the opportunity to attend it.

Besides all of the different iconic cites and landmarks I went to (which I talk about in greater detail in my slideshow presentation) my trip was full of learning about a culture I knew very little of. I speak barely any Italian, and my knowledge of the history was mostly contained to knowing about the Roman Empire. I did some research before attending of course, but I only scratched the surface of what I would learn during my trip.

Both of my host parents (Franco Gruden and Monica Zuccheli) were very knowledgeable and enthusiastic about the history of their city, Padua. I knew very little of the Venetian Republic and then I found myself seeing landmarks while learning about their history. I plan to potentially become a history teacher that specializes in European History, so it's safe to say I was in my element.

Besides seeing the sights, learning about the culture was a wonderful experience. There are quite a few differences from our culture, most noticeably with food. Food is more of an art form, it's a craft. Which, yes many do consider that here but it's not a blatant cultural thing in the US. The food is sourced in much healthier ways than in the US. The food was amazing, the only thing I didn't like is that the portions were fairly small, which is something I didn't think I would ever say because I have a smaller appetite when eating at home. While there are differences, I think what I noticed more is how many things were similar over there. People enjoy sitting and watching TV with their families, they like dancing to music, they love making connections. It sounds a little bit stupid to say this because it seems self-explanatory. You don't necessarily need to go to Italy to see that people are people everywhere, but I feel like we get so caught up in the stereotypes, assumptions, and differences, that we "other" different cultures because we don't understand their way of life. What this trip has taught me is that despite the cultural and historical differences between my life and people from other countries, at the end of the day we are all striving to find happiness and fulfillment in our lives. To reference what I said earlier, that seems selfexplanatory, but you don't really feel it until you immerse yourself in other cultures, at least that was my experience. Legacy members should look to fulfill Administration until new members decide for themselves where they would want to put their administrative efforts. As club Administration is the foundation for Service, Fundraising and Membership, it may be that the distribution of tasks among officers is the most important topic a club considers while meeting.

Membership, is the cornerstone of the club and conversations about obtaining labor for the club should always be undertaken, observed and shared with like-minded members of the community. Lions are often passionate about their service and should welcome conversations with individuals in the community that generates interest and invite them to join a meeting to see if they would wish to participate. Prepare an "elevator talk" of about 30 seconds that focusing on a single service (or maybe 2), then a mention of regular meetings can start a When asked to do small request, conversation. mention that it was performed by a Lion. Occasionally, this will open an opportunity for the "elevator talk". Being attentive to membership grows the club through service and fundraising while requiring more administration to balance the efforts.

# <u>The Role of the MD Global</u> <u>Leadership Team Coordinator</u>

What's it all about? What's his role? What are his plans? When you carefully review the duties of this position as articulated by Lions International (Rev.7/1/2023), you will find fifteen bulleted items under the section on Actions for Success. I personally find this language pretty daunting in its scope so I have decided to boil it all down for you into six main functions that I feel are important enough to focus on this year and that will ensure a positive net membership growth for our multiple district, which will allow us to meet the goal of Mission 1.5 and allow us to Make Your Mark! Those functions are as follows:

**Training** (who? when? and at what level? - From club officers through to current district governors

**Communication** (what and with whom/) – Most importantly, with club leaders, zone chairpersons, and newer Lions. It goes without saying that district leadership and Global Action Team members must be in the information loop.

**Reporting** (what and to whom?) - Learning opportunities, what's in the Lions Learning Center, and reporting successes in Learn

**Identifying** (Who) – Lions with leadership potential who demonstrate an aptitude and desire for leadership positions

**Promoting** (What?) – leadership opportunities, training events, online learning tools, and LI sponsored seminars and institutes.

**Maintaining** (what and where) – calendar of events. leadership development tools and resources, and informational articles of interest and use for Lions at all levels, which will be maintained on our multiple district and district web sites.

I wanted to use this first article to introduce myself as your multiple district global leadership team coordinator, give you some idea of my expectations of the role, share my goals for the year with you and invite your input.

I have three simple goals for this year: 2024-2025:

- 1. Improve communication across Multiple District 29 among all stakeholders at all levels regarding the challenges that we have in leadership development.
- 2. Enhance the promotion of leadership development training events, both for in-person

and facilitator led events, that would enhance West Virginia Lions leadership skills and provide them encouragement.

3. Increase the number of Lions within the multiple district who are willing to take on higher leadership roles as part of a sound succession plan for each district.

Over the next five months I will offer an article on each of the following five critical areas of membership function:

Membership Recruitment	Orientation

#### JOANNE OGDEN INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR


Joanne Ogden from Emo, Ontario, Canada, was elected to serve a two-year term as an international director of Lions Clubs International at the association's 105th international convention in Boston, Massachusetts, USA, July 7 through July 11, 2023. Director Ogden has more than 40 years of experience as a registered nurse. She currently works as part of the Senior Management Team for Riverside Healthcare Facilities. Her role there is that of quality assurance auditor and Ontario Health Team executive lead. Previously, she was the health program supervisor for the Naicatchewenin First Nation, responsible for community health and home care nursing. Prior to that, she worked in intensive care for 18 years.

From a young age, she was taught the importance of doing her best for her family, neighbors and community. Although she did not originally intend to become a Lion, she chose to join the Emo and District Lions Club in 2010 to assist her community in chartering a new club. Since then, she has made an even bigger difference in the lives of her neighbors and community. In 2020, she transferred to the Northwestern Ontario Cyber Lions Club where she continues to serve to this day.

She has held a number of offices within the association including Guiding Lion and multiple district GMT coordinator. She has served as multiple district 5M's director for KidSight as well the Lions Foundation of Manitoba and as Northwestern Ontario. Additionally, she was a district strategy planner for the NAMI pilot. 
