one motto, WE SERVE. If you have never been to a national convention of Lions now is the time to begin thinking about attending June 26–30, 2015, Honolulu, Hawaii.

We held our first cabinet meeting with 28 Lions present on July 19th at the Summersville Memorial U. M. Church. A video of our International President's theme, *Strengthen the Pride*, was shown illustrating his platform for success as follows: through Service, Membership Development, Strengthening Your Club, Leadership, Creativity, Giving, and through Courage and Conviction. This will be a Pioneer/Hillbilly Dress-up occasion. We will offer prizes of West Virginia "moonshine" to the most original couple and most handsome couple. These baskets will be weighed and judged, and then donated to the Summers County food pantry.

We will begin Saturday morning with a cabinet meeting, and then continue with training and learning opportunities for Lions and

Protocol

The Merriam-Webster Dictionary defines protocol as a code of diplomatic or military etiquette. In Lions parlance we define protocol as a code of correct etiquette or manners and method to maintain decorum and tradition. It is the acceptable procedure and order in all club meetings, so that when expanded for special occasions, guest speakers and visitors will be treated with proper respect and courtesy.

Protocol and courtesy go hand in hand. Courtesy, being a favor performed with politeness, is always in order. Guests always appreciate it, and new members who are made welcome, will feel comfortable and part of the club at once. Because we are part of the world's largest and most active serve clubs organization, we should be concerned about protocol and observe it at all times.

The first and most obvious way that the person conducting a club, district, or multiple district meeting can effectively observe protocol is to use a well-planned agenda. Another practice that the presiding officer can utilize is to limit debate on discussion items to a reasonable number speaking in favor of or against a motion. There is no rule that says discussion and debate must continue endlessly.



Here are some practical Do's and Don't's in Lions protocol:

DO have a speaker's stand with sufficient lighting.

DO try to have a public address system in working order.

DO introduce and welcome all guests.

DO plan the seating arrangements of the head table prior to the start of the meeting.

DO use place cards or name plates at the head table or reserved tables.

DO schedule a time table for your program and try your best to stick to it.

DO have an American flag at the right end of the head table if possible.

DON'T use the speaker's time with your introduction. A one to two minute introduction is sufficient.

DON'T try to review or paraphrase the speaker's talk after she/he has finished. Thank them and make a remark about one point to show that you were listening.

Remember, good protocol is a reflection on you and your club or district. It is a direct reflection upon your leadership. It might well be why a member becomes an involved member of your club or leaves for other opportunities.

501(c)(3) of the U.S. Internal Revenue Code, so donations to the LCIF are tax deductible, as allowed under the IRS code.



State Fair Vision Screening

August 8–12 saw a long-standing WV State Fair tradition carried forward by District 29N Lions. The West Virginia Lions Sight Conversation Foundation (WVLSCF) vision screening truck, staffed by 29N Lions, has been present at the Fair for many years and 2014 was no exception. WVLSCF provides funding to support this endeavor and Union Lions Club members Sue Via and Randy Hagerman handle much of the organization required. Preliminary results are in:

Fifty-seven Lions from seven clubs worked a total of 330 Lion-hours over five days at the Fair. During that time, 906 individuals were screened,

685 adults and 221 youths age 10 and under. Of these, 81 adults and 32 youths were referred to their eye-care professionals for further examination based on screening results.

Despite cool and rainy weather that probably reduced the Fair attendance, the week was a real success, and is a great example of the important community services Lions provide year-in and year-out, doing the work to *Strengthen the Pride*.

Clubs whose members worked at the Fair vision screening were: Crab Orchard-Macarthur, Durbin, Hinton, Lewisburg, Marlinton, Union, and White Sulphur Springs. We hope to have a more complete report on the State Fair and vision screening for the next newsletter issue.
