


March 2016 Fun Dedication Service

It is about time that we talk about the 6C historic traveling gavel, as I have come to call it. Many of you have seen it, or at least have seen photographs of it. To be sure, it is impressive. It stands over 32-inches tall end-to-end. The head is a good 10-inches across and has a 7-inch diameter. The gavel represents some handy woodwork, something a carpenter could be proud of having made. PDG ole Jack Beckfield entrusted the hammer to me when I told him I wanted to bring attention to the visitations that Lion leaders make. Not only the district governor, but other cabinet members and zone chairs and committee chairs, make visits. I was looking for drama.

"I have just the thing for you, then," he said as he grabbed his cane and hurried out to his shed. Soon he returned with this impressive piece of craftsmanship. "I've had this out here for some time now," he said ,almost as if he was going to launch into one of his tales. But ole Jack was uncharacteristically quiet. "You will have fun with it," he said, quickly changing the subject. He politely skirted my questions, with both a sadness and a twinkle in his eye. I have had the gavel about two weeks at this writing and have studied it. This is what I have seen. It is magically light. It is, at the same time, simple and ornate. It is carved with dates and Lions club names. I appears to have been born sometime in the late 1950's and gone in to hiding possibly as late as the 1990's. It traveled and traveled with spirit.

The earliest date carved on it is November 17, 1959 and then December 10, 1959, inscribed by Littleton Lions and Douglas County respectively. The most recent date is barely legible but it appears to be Littleton in March, 1999, but that carving warrants a forensic examination. The runners-up are Pleasant View and Westwood, both in 1971. These dates all represent when the gavel was "lifted" or "stolen" or "pilfered" by a Lions Club. There is a lot of history here in this wooden hammer, for many of the clubs are just memories. Sheridan. Red Rocks, Northglenn. Westminster. And it looks as though Littleton Lions are a pack of thieves, because they had this at least four times.

In this history, there is much to be learned. Being a Lion can be fun, as evidenced by the good-hearted activities centered around the gavel and other things that have been lifted over the years. The gavel has been with me to a cabinet meeting, to an Idaho Springs Lions Club meeting and to the Lions Club of Denver. At each place an increasing amount of interest has been shown. At the oldest Lions club in 6C a lot of buzzing was taking place. After all the Denver Den is a Centennial club and they, like the gavel, have seen a lot. I look forward to going to Littleton with it because they apparently have quite a history. Walking down the 16th Street Mall in Denver with the Lions historic traveling gavel last Tuesday was quite an experience. I am glad I have been practicing my elevator speech because a lot of total strangers wanted to take the gavel's picture, with me of course, and they wanted to know about Lions in 50 words or less. I generally have a pocket full of Lions business cards in my jacket and often have some Lions fliers. That and my excitement helped spread the word about Lions.

What did I learn this month? Lions Clubs come and go. We know that. The institution of Lions continues because there is always new membership that just has to be asked. The best kept secret is that new clubs are in the forming stages. Leo Clubs, campus clubs and traditional clubs are all in the works, and that is because a few dynamic, excited Lions, like Janice Davis of the Cyber Club, have worked hard at getting people interested. They gave their elevator speech enough times

First order of business at the initial meeting following the charter will be to elect officers - President, VP, Secretary and Treasurer. In addition, high priority will be placed on finding student members to chair an IT/Social Media and a Public Relations committee. Most of the members are sophomores, with an additional 1 or 2 freshmen and juniors. That's good, because it will help continuity over the next couple of years, and we won't have to be too concerned immediately about making sure there are new members to take the place of those graduating.

Plusoptix Screener Training and Certification



LCIF - Lions Club International Foundation Chair Report

I am proud to report that from 7/1/15 thru 1/31/16 that District 6C has donated \$4,625 to LCIF. This nearly doubles the amount collected in the same period during the last Lion's year; and represents 30% of all donations from MD6. Worldwide, donations total \$22 Million so far this Lions year.

LCIF and I wholeheartedly thank those individuals or Clubs representing 13 different Clubs in District 6C for their donations.

It is not too late for the remaining 17 Clubs (or individuals from those Clubs) to make a donation in this Lions year which ends on 6/30/2016.

What are my goals for District 6C? There are three:

100% Club participation - - to qualify as a District with 100% participation, the club or a member of the Club must donate at least \$20. So far, 13 or 43% of our clubs have donated to LCIF, just 17 to go!

A total of \$10,000 in donations for the current Lions Year. (Last Lions Year, our district donated \$8,550 from our District 6C.

Raise awareness of LCIF's many projects and service throughout the world and in Colorado.

How can you as an individual or your Club help 6C reach these goals?

You can encourage your club, your family, and your friends and business associates to donate.

You can donate on-line at www.lcif.org.

You can mail a donation to LCIF at 300 W. 22nd St., OakBrook, IL 60523 USA.

You can hand in your donation to me and I can send it to LCIF for you and if your donation is \$20 or more, I can see that you receive a recognition pin.

You can schedule me to speak at your next club meeting & let me convince your members or club to give.

Lastly, you can attend the 6C Convention on April 1 – 2, 2016! If you check out the LCIF table and make a donation, your name will be entered into a drawing to win a special Lions gift. That gift will be revealed during the Convention!

LCIF is a phenomenal charity which has provided matching grants and disaster relief to Colorado over the past several years in amounts that far exceed what we have given. It is time for us to give back so others can be served!
