I went to the 3<sup>rd</sup> Cabinet meeting Feb 14<sup>th</sup>. The District has gone to the dogs. No it's not what you think. We had the meeting at the International Hearing Dogs Inc. Thanks DG Carl for having it 5 minutes from my house. We had a zone meeting at IHDI earlier in the year. It was good to be back.

I've been busy attending VDG training in Phoenix AZ and preparing for more training in Boise ID in March. We talked about goals for our DG year coming up in July for 2015-2016. We went over the Roles of the GMT and GLT and tweaked, re wrote and re wrote our goals for the district. Thank You PDG Donna Sly Redd( GMT) and PDG Cathy Pergola (GLT) for your help in writing up my goals.

At the Cabinet meeting DG Carl asked me to talk about my goals, so here is a summary. Details to follow in the next two months: They are subject to change as the year goes on. I will continue the no points reporting by club secretaries. Activity and MMR reports are still required of course.

Set up a GMT-D Team and a GLT-D Team to help out PDG Donna Sly Redd and PDG Cathy Pergola. They cannot do their duties alone.

I plan on starting two new clubs. Guiding Lions who have been Trained and/or Certified will be a major part in the formation of these clubs..Lake wood or Boulder needs a club, we need another campus club to bring in younger members, and a Veterans club are possibilities.

Increase communication between GMT-D and GLT-D with a report turned in to me monthly to the GMT MD Coordinators and the DG

Re assess and update my goals quarterly.

Increase Retention by reducing the numbers of members leaving. This will be done by phone calls, and surveys given to members who have left asking them why and how we can keep them

Our percentage of dropped members was 13.7 % or 102. I plan to reduce the percentage to 10 % or down to 74 members leaving. I plan on increasing Membership a net 20 members.

I'm still thinking about club, zone and Individual awards . I like what DG Carl has done and want to keep some of them and tweak others.. One example is having club of the month awards, 1 to 15 member clubs, 16 to 30 member clubs, 31 to 50 member clubs and over 50 member clubs. Zone of the quarter awards based on attendance at meeting, attendance at Zone and Cabinet meetings from their Presidents and Secretaries and of course their club service activities and fund raising projects.

Encourage each club to promote and implement one new service project or fundraiser that includes participation of non lions by the district 6C convention April 2016. Example: Myself and members of the Thornton Lions are meeting at Sonesta Lanes Feb 17<sup>th</sup> with Michael Wright from the Gill Lions of 6NE and the Manger of Sonesta Lanes to organize a Bowling Tournament to benefit blind students. Michael commutes to Thornton everyday to teach in Thornton. We will ask members of bowling leagues at Sonesta if they want to participate. We hope to gain a few new lion members also. I'm going to Longmont to participate in a bowling tournament Feb 21st and observe how it is done Stay tuned for more information.

Recognition awards for all clubs for their service projects and fundraisers.

I'm still looking for Zone A, B and C Zone Chairs. Here is your chance to make your mark. Please let me know if you are interested. A few Committee chairs are open. I will send out an email soon.

We still have work to do the rest of this year. Keep up the great work and let's help DG Carl Gentzel finish his year in style!

#### **Colorado Lions KidSight Program**

#### District 6C - February 2015

#### We Have a Big Problem!

We don't have enough volunteers! The need is especially critical in Aurora, Denver, and in Adams County. For example, there are nine schools in Denver where we do not have volunteers to screen. I have listed the areas where the need is critical but we need more volunteers all across the district. Screening is easy and I can provide training to anyone who needs it. Please contact Holly for information on screening locations and dates.

#### **KidSight Screening**

We recently passed the 35,000 mark in numbers of children screened in the state. 35,021 have been screened and 3,980 children have been referred. The referral rate is 11.4 percent.

District 6C 21,515 children 2,724 referred 12.5%

#### **New Plusoptix Screeners and Training**

We have been fundraising since the beginning of the year to purchase additional Plusoptix screeners to locate throughout Colorado. To date we have raised about \$42,000 and I have just submitted a grant to Lions Club International Foundation to match that funding. If the grant is approved we should be able to purchase 12 or more screeners for use in the fall. I will be scheduling a number of training sessions across the state so that you are familiar with how to operate the equipment when the next year of screening begins. I should have a training schedule set up by the time I attend the district conventions and will put the training information in all district newsletters. KidSight Board members will also have information regarding trainings. It will be important for everyone to know how to use the new equipment. It is easy to use and is much quicker and more accurate as well!

#### **Grants and Funds Received**

KidSight Colorado participated again in Colorado Gives Day which was December 9, 2014. Our goal was \$6,500. Although we did not meet our goal we raised \$4,350. Thank you to all who donated to KidSight on Colorado Gives Day. In January we also received a \$22,000 grant from The Denver Foundation. The funds are not restricted which allows us to use them for general KidSight operations.

#### **KidSight Annual Meeting**

The Colorado Lions KidSight Program will hold its annual meeting at the State Convention in Aspen at the end of May. All Lions are welcome to attend.

#### Lions ALERT Report – 6C February 2015

#### **The Lions Alert Program**

The mission of the Lions ALERT program is:

To provide Lions with a standardized structure and network to deliver needed services to people in emergency situations. Lions can prepare themselves to serve as an important resource to aid in addressing needs during a crisis and the consequent phases of an emergency or disaster.

There are three levels of emergency:

A Level One emergency affects a few people and a local response is needed. A hourse fire or localized flood may be an example. A single club may be able to provide assistance.

A Level Two emergency affects a larger geographical area. A tornado, hurricane or mudslide may be a Level Two example. A coordinated district reponse may be necessary. Governments and other relief agencies may also become involved.

A Level Three emergency affects hundreds or thousands of people. One or several multiple districts can provide aid for victims of a catastrophic event such as an earthquake. Relief agencies would be first responders and Lions would work along these agencies.

We have been fortunate in District 6C so far this year as no emergencies have been identified. However, you can prepare yourself and your family in the event of a natural, man-made or health-care emergency. The personal safety checklist provided by Lions Clubs International is a good place to start. You can keep this checklist with your emergency supplies for handy reference.

Should an emergency develop I will be working with the district cabinet to make sure we provide aid and assistance to the affected communities.

#### International Hearing Dogs

HENDERSON —Chase sat on the floor next to the demonstration bed where his trainer, Andrea Paul, was lying. Paul pretended to sleep. In a moment, a fire alarm went off in the room and the 3-year-old white terrier mix jumped up onto her chest and began licking her face.

Paul and Chase were inside the demonstration room at <u>International Hearing Dog Inc.</u>, a 35-year-old nonprofit in Henderson that finds dogs from local animal shelters and <u>trains them to be hearing dogs</u> for people who are deaf and hard-of-hearing by identifying noises like alarms.

"We recently had a client who came home and she started cooking one day, but then she didn't feel well so she laid down on the couch and fell asleep," said Valerie Foss-Brugger, executive director of the organization. "The stove caught fire, and the smoke alarm started going off. And the dog got her up and out of the house."

International Hearing Dogs was formed in Minnesota in the early 70s, and moved to its permanent Colorado home at 5901 E. 89th Ave. in 1976. Foss-Brugger, whose mother was one of the original founders, said the organization is one of the first of its kind in the world.

Since it began, the small collection of trainers and volunteers has taught 1,200 rescue dogs that were handpicked from local shelters how to recognize certain noises that happen inside the home (like ringing phones and doorbells), and then alert their owner by jumping up on them when those noises sound.

The program customizes each service dog to a selected applicant. Trainers and employees will work to understand everything about a client's home life and habits and try to normalize the dog to those quirks during their training.

"What we want to do here is simulate everything in the person's daily life here before the dogs gets into a home," said Ryan Thibodeau, the organization's director of marketing and development. "That way the dog's 100-percent trained, and then it's all about us training the person to work with the dog. So, if they take the bus a lot, our trainers will take their (future) dog out on buses and go shopping." All Americans with Disabilities Act certified dogs that come out of the program are shelter dogs. Foss-Brugger has a longstanding relationship with the Adams County Animal Shelter in Brighton, where the majority of the dogs come from.



#### International Hearng Dogs



"It's been a great partnership," said Eva McMickle-DeTolve, director of the Adams County Animal Shelter. "Anytime we can find a great home for any one of our adopted animals, it's a huge suceess. And when that animal can also help a person, it's just wonderful."

The organization will train and place the dog with a person who has at least a 65-percent decibel hearing loss in both ears at no cost to them, but the recipients have to provide for the dog after placement. Clients also can't live in a home with any other dogs or a home with too many other people who can hear.

"The hearing people will react to the sounds, and then the dog stops working," Foss-Brugger said.
"The dog has to work 100 percent."

The dogs also have to meet certain standards. Typically, Foss-Brugger looks for smaller dogs with high energy. The dogs are about 6 months old when they begin their six- to eight-month training.

International Hearing Dogs has placed an animal with a client in all 50 states. The Henderson complex sits on several acres of land and has indoor and outdoor kennel space for 42 dogs as well as versatile training areas, a large demonstration room, and even small, adjacent houses that are used for multi-room training. All of the employees know (or are learning) sign language.

It costs about \$8,000 to train and place a hearing dog. Costs include feeding, supplies, boarding and plane



tickets to send a trainer to an out-of-state client's home to assist in the dog's acclimation when it's ready to be placed. The nonprofit subsists solely on grants and donations and is always in need of both.
