

COVID-19 Vaccine Information

In an interview with Colorado Matters, Gov. Jared Polis said the <u>Pfizer vaccine</u> would be made available first, followed a few weeks later by the <u>Moderna vaccine</u>. Both vaccines require two doses with 21-28 days in between.

- Walgreens and CVS are designated to provide end-to-end management of the COVID-19 vaccination process
- Early doses are very limited, over time, they will expand.
- All doses will be free.
- Every County will have access.
- Direct care public healthcare workers have been the first in line for the vaccine, followed closely by long-term care staff and residents of nursing homes and other highrisk residents of congregate living facilities, those who work in assisted living facilities and with home health agencies, EMS, firefighters, police, and other COVID first responders.
- In Colorado, since the <u>start of a big vaccination push</u> to protect people from the coronavirus, a new poll suggests some are hesitant to get it.
- <u>The poll</u> of 1,008 people, sponsored by <u>Healthier Colorado</u>, found just 60 percent of respondents said they would be willing to take a COVID-19 vaccine. That's below the 70 percent estimated by medical groups needed to reach broad protection through herd immunity. The figures were lower with key demographic groups, including Latino (56 percent), Black (52 percent), Colorado Republicans (42 percent), women (57 percent), and those with a high school education or less (31 percent).

COVID-19 Vaccine Key Messages:

We need your help communicating with your communities and emphasizing these 3 points:

- The first phase will focus on frontline health care workers, first responders, and our most vulnerable populations living in long term care facilities.
- The vaccine is safe and effective. It will be a few months until the general public can get the vaccine (probably by summer).
- Until then, we need everyone's help doing their part: wear a mask, social distance, limit gatherings, and wash your hands. If a hand washing facility is not readily available, please use hand sanitizer.
