It turned out reasonably.

I have been asked to serve as chair of a couple of committees, subject to Council and Cabinet approval, and have agreed to be of service. I look forward to that service. It is a little more focused and manageable. But back to the original premise of "what did I learn?" I learned that Lions, by and large, are proud but they are not boldly so. If you look at a Lions meeting, everyone is wearing some insignia on shirts and jackets and bags and the like but not so much in the general public. Our costume is almost a secret ritual for many, when it should be a proud demonstration of part of our identity. I try to remember to wear my Lions pin every day, no matter my dress. Join me. A polo shirt with a Lions logo or a T-shirt with a KidSight crest or a ball cap showing Lions membership is a great way to start tat elevator speech. We don't hesitate to wear a Bronco emblazoned T-shirt.

Speaking of elevator speeches, I still preach about elevator speeches. I have learned more and more about evaluating my potential audience and I have a dozen elevator speeches at my disposal for a spontaneous informational snippet about Lions. A couple with children, especially one with glasses, will invariably start me on a 30 second KidSight promo. Health Fair, developmental disability, disaster relief, service dogs, and literacy all trigger a Lions Clubs message. I carry business cards with Lions Club logos on them. Not just my DG (soon to be PDG) cards, are at my disposal, pretty much all the time, but so are my Laughing Jack Rabbit business card and my Awareness Center card, each bearing a Lions logo. Most snail mail I send has a Lions return address sticker with logo. I am a LION. A proud Lion.

As the year ends, make a couple little promises to yourself. Be a proud Lion. It is not necessary to be obsessed. Be a Lion. Work on one or two club or district projects with passion and leave yourself lots of room for family, work, and fun. It is not necessary that you do it all. Support your club and district leaders and, better yet, become a leader, even is a committee chair with no higher aspirations. Remember to say "please" and "thank you". Keep in mind that you might not agree with your fellow Lions or Lion leaders, but that should not make you mortal enemies. Lions is no place for politics or religious debate.

Thanks to all the people who supported me as District Governor and I hope that you will continue to support me in my committee assignments, but more importantly, support your new DG and cabinet. There is a lot to be done and it takes a team of selfless Lions to do it.

# **The Latest Screening Results**

Since July 1, 2016 we have screened more than 53,450 children statewide and referred more than 5,900. The rate of referral is 11.2 percent. In 6C 32,139 children were screened and 3,934 referred for a rate of referral of 12.2 percent. After June 30 I will publish final numbers of children screened for the year.




