We had a great Governor's Advisory Group meeting, also known as a cabinet meeting, AUGUST 20. Thanks to my home club of Idaho Springs for the hard hosting work and the fun program. We had some singing, we had Bob and Cammy from the International Hearing Dogs, Inc., we had some serious discussion. It could have been an all-day meeting, but as promised it was held to about 2- hours and lunch.

A special thanks to all the Lions club who were represented at the meeting. They all put up with Saturday morning I-70 and a complete construction mess.

The 6C Past District Governors' Association heard my call for help in getting leadership lined up for our district and the Multiple District. PDG Cathy Pergola spoke for the group and volunteered to visit clubs and zones to get more people to step forward and become zone chairs and committee chairs. PDG Cathy is our GLT Coordinator an at my request she will host a zone chair training culminating October 1 at the Lincoln Automotive College. Participants will be asked to do some pre-assignments on the LionsClubs.org website and will be asked to attend the training, which, in PDG Cathy's inimitable fashion, will be a delightful, interactive training. The Zone Chair is the lynchpin of local Lions organization. The Zone is the link between the club and the Governor and LCI. Our Zones have become too large and we are seeking to break it down to 4 or 5 clubs. Please consider the training. You do not have to consider this a step to DG. We need leaders with your skills in the trenches Look for emails and more information about the training.

A special thanks to Denver Den, working in collaboration with Inner City Health Center, for eye screening and eyeglasses distribution to some 420 or more folks on the day of the cabinet meeting. The Denver Den represents well the mission that Lions have adopted as Knights of the Blinds and are working hard on the pillar that International President Bob Corlew and Lions Clubs International have asked up to build, that being vision services. In 6C we take our promises seriously. I great Roar to Lions Club of Denver.

We discussed the unpopular idea of a potential consolidation with District 6SE. The idea has been urged by LCI because we have been a Transitional District for more than two years. That means 6C has less than 35 clubs and less than 1,250 members. GMT Coordinator Donna Sly-Redd has started her campaign to fix that problem. Each One, Reach One is a variation of Each One Ask One, a two-year effort by LCI. Our goal is that every member will ask a person to go to a Lions event with them, see what it is all about and become interested in the community service and become a Lion. It is not hard. It is in fact, fun. Try it. Take your spouse, or your neighbor or your co-worker to a Lions event. How much fun did the collaborators at Inner City Health event have?

I also want to commend the Five Points Lions Club for their work with the youth in the community. The annual Community Appreciation event served more than 400 young people by providing them school supplies and also fed countless community members. KidSight Screening was also

offered.

This is all what Lions clubs are about. Thank you. I haven't even finished doing the math yet and I have already seen that Lions of 6C have served more than 1000 people in August and the moth is not over yet. ROAR.

Activities and plans

In July, while Susy and I were in Ecuador visiting her family in Quito, we found time to travel to Santo Domingo to deliver a check for \$2,300 to the Club de Leones de Santo Domingo, which has hosted our eyesight campaign in 2015. We gave the check to Lions Hernan and Myriam Vargas. Hernan is presently the District Governor of District G1 of Ecuador, so we were leaving it in good hands. They would in turn write a check to Foundation Yo Te Amo in Portoviejo, one of the hardest hit of all the cites in Ecuador by the April 2016 earthquake. It is a clinic run by two Denverites, who are friends of Susy's.

Early in August, we went to Western Welcome Week in Littleton, at which event the Littleton Lions Club year after year has provided a barbecue tent for hungry attendees. This year the Club had some new volunteers, six hardy young fellows from the new Littleton High School Leo Club. These guys helped with the set-up early that morning and then returned in the evening to dispense the food. In the words of Lion Phyllis Baker, they "couldn't have done it without the Leos." As a reward for their hard work, the Leos received T-shirts with Lions logos and \$400 towards their treasury.

Still on the subject of new Clubs, Shauna Carter has done a bang-up job at getting the new Denver Stapleton Club on its feet and into second gear (to mix my metaphors). Among other things the Club has conducted a Cuts for Kids fundraiser, participated in the Dragon Boat festival, cooked for the Lions Camp, attended the Nepali Club's Charter Night and also helped out at 5 Points' Community Appreciation Day. Wow!

In a nutshell, here are a couple of my focuses for next year:

- 1. For the Centennial, I'll continue to work on a special Committee that our Club itself has organized to celebrate this year. So far, the Centennial Committee has chosen the following as possible projects:
 - 1. a special day downtown to collect eyeglasses from businesses and individuals and highlight this signature LCI project;
 - 2. a celebration, gala dinner on Saturday, October 14, 2017. There'll be a guest speaker from the community and likely one or two Lions dignitaries;
 - 3. fundraising, organized by a joint subcommittee to include trustees from the Denver Lions Club's Foundation;
 - 4. a special video, to include mention of other 6C and State Clubs, which highlights Lions' achievements over the 100 years and looks forward to the next 100;
 - 4. two more eye-screening events at the Inner City Health Center, like the one we conducted on August 20, at which we distributed 260 pairs of eyeglasses and handed out vouchers to cover 20 more pairs. I'd like to encourage more District participation at these next two events more than just from the Denver Den;
- 2 New Club development, at CU's RMLEI and among the Latino community.

I'm looking forward to a great year in District 6C!

Aira, Lions & You



Aira and Lions and you!

Do you want to serve? ... Do you want to make a difference in the visually impaired and blind community? ... Do you want to be a part of a leading-edge technology that is already empowering blind and visually impaired people to further experience their world like never before? If you have answered yes to any of these questions, then I have the perfect opportunity for you to serve as a lion. On August 4, 2016, the Englewood Lions Club of which I am president had Suman Kanugantihe (CEO) from Aira speak to us via web regarding a new start-up company he has for folks who are visually impaired or blind. Being blind, I had the opportunity to meet Suman while I attended the No Barriers Symposium in Copper Mountain, Colorado, in late June. Suman displayed and had me try out and experience his new product. Basically, the person who is blind wears a pair of glasses that has a camera hooked to the frame. The person who is blind connects to a live person (agent) via an app on the phone. Then, if the blind person wants to go shopping, walk through an airport, read a menu, etc. the agent on the other end of the ear phones can tell them the needed information. It is like having a person with sight right in your pocket.

After I tested the glasses with the sighted agent on the other end narrating and negotiating/navigating me through the town's square, I was ecstatic and felt like I could see again! I was told of all the shops as I passed by them with Vinnie, my Seeing Eye dog, and, as a bonus using a guide dog, the agent could assist me with directions without Vinnie becoming dependent on her verbal cues. ... This wouldn't replace a cane or dog, is merely a tool that would enrich and enhance the lives of visually impaired and blind around the world.

I was so excited to "see again" that I emailed Suman Kanugantihe the following morning and asked if he thought Aira could enroll the assistance of lions clubs around the world to provide the needed sighted agents to make the technology work. He agreed to a meeting with our club and now the partnership of the lions and Aira has begun.

To my great honor, I have been selected as one of the first 200 people who will have the chance to explore and experience this leading-edge technology. I can't wait to see what my neighborhood looks like, to travel places in the city I've never been, to go shopping by myself, and to sit down at a restaurant and order food from the menu. Not to mention how this technology would make it easier to meet and greet other lions at a convention, to find my way around the hotel, or even travel through an airport. The applications are endless—from mobility and travel, to overcoming isolation and social barriers, to enhancing and increasing the 90% unemployment rate in the visually impaired and blind community.

This technology is amazing; however, it is useless unless there is an agent on the other end of the ear phones. This is where you come in. Won't you help make a difference and sign up today to become an Aira agent?

"As an Aira Agent, you will assist blind and low-vision users with daily activities, such as navigating on the street or reading menus, using a real-time interactive dashboard to process live streaming data. Aira is focused on developing transformative remote assistive technology and services that bring greater mobility, independence and self-confidence to blind and visually impaired individuals by connecting them, in an Uber style, to a network of certified Agents. Aira's high-tech approach uses a real-time interactive cloud-based dashboard, built to create for the blind an augmented reality context with live data streams from cameras, GPS, and other sensor systems from wearable platforms such as Google Glass and Pivothead. This allows Aira's remote Agents to render live personalized assistance to users in a myriad of daily activities – ranging from navigating busy city streets and catching a bus, to ordering meals from menus at restaurants and literally traveling the globe."

The below website link states that Aira is only excepting agents in the state of California, this is not the case. After speaking with Suman, he is willing to accept lions from Colorado. He is also willing to work with lions regarding volunteering and/or working as an agent as few as three hours a week, not 20 as stated. What is important now is that we need to start the process of getting lions as agents trained first, and then we can work out the remaining details later.
