

# Normber 2016 Membership Growth, Leadership Development and Effective Communications Lead to Impactful Service



Hello Lions of District 6C. Thanks for all that you do for Lions and your community.

We delayed the publication of the November newsletter so that we could accommodate the cabinet meeting on Saturday, October 29. Thanks to the Chatfield Lions Club for hosting the meeting. Apparently, there were a lot of scheduling conflicts as many of our clubs were not represented.

We did conclude our discussion on the matter of district 6C being "in transition" in that we do not have, and have not had for some time, 1,250 members. A proposal has been studied for several years to possibly consolidate two or more districts of multiple district 6. While there have been some harsh words and thoughts about the concept, civility has prevailed. It appears that most leaders and members agree that v there would be no advantage to combine 6C and 6SE, as such a move would not resolve the transition issue. Membership and leadership are still the issues that must be resolved. To that end, I urge you all to bring new people into the family of LIONS. The group had a discussion about LEOs, both school based and community based, about club branches and about service projects as attraction to membership.

The elephant in the room continues to be the cost of membership. Several members reminded the group that the cost of living continues to rise and we seem to have less discretionary personal money. Depending on club dues, the cost of membership at the state and district and international level is less that \$10 a month. That is a couple packs of cigarettes or a couple cocktails or a couple lottery tickets. Or better yet, find sponsors for new members. Many businesses would return to the idea of sponsoring a member in the world's largest voluntary service organization for the PR image alone. In fact that is how many nonprofits get board members. That volunteerism is what makes America great and asking some of the successful local businesses.

Another thought about holding membership costs down, especially for those under age 30, is the Omega Leo, which does not have an annual dues cost. While Leos do not enjoy all the benefits of Lions, it does provide an opportunity for young people between ages 12 and 30. The Leo club does have an annual administrative cost of \$100. Leos become Lions.

For all the work that Long Range Planning and Consolidation Committees and merger Committees have put into the study of this concept, our heartfelt thanks. The consensus of 6C at the cabinet meeting was to not submit a consolidation motion to the convention and to not support such a motion.

The cabinet also addressed the matter of Zones and Regions considering we have a dearth of zone chairs and only one zone has had a zone meeting. We will consolidate into two Regions and schedule a meeting or meetings wherein steps can be taken to accomplish the needs of zone. The membership expressed an interest in having

zones and regions focus more on interaction between and among clubs, sharing ideas and skills while using cabinet meetings for administrative policy setting. In the coming weeks, we will put meat on those bones and see if we can meet the interests and needs of the district.

Again, thank you for all that you do for your community.

The Club has already held a Cuts fir Kids days, providing haircuts and donating school supplies for local kids, and it has helped out at Denver Five Points' Community Appreciation Day and at a Denver Den eye screening event at Inner City Health Center. MD-6 Council Meeting. Colorado State Lions held its Council meeting in Breckinridge on October 21-22. We learned that the MD's Policy Manual is in serious need of updating, a task that the DGs have taken on. We learned also that the 2017 State convention is shaping up to be a blockbuster. There'll be no separate District conventions, so attendance is expected to be quite strong at the State. And the Convention Committee is introducing a couple of new ideas that will go a long way toward making this one worthy of its characterization as a Centennial event. Finally, we learned that District 6C and 6SE are considering a consolidation. The action would make available a larger pool of leaders and also free up some of the meager budget that each District has for expenses that are common. It would, however, mean more travel time for visitations from leadership. Straw votes are to be taken at upcoming 6C and 6SE Cabinet meetings.

**Centennial Projects.** The Denver Den has formed a Centennial Committee to initiate projects and events related to LCI's Centennial. The Club is a founding Club, having itself been chartered in 1917. It's planned a grand celebration dinner for October 2017. It's formed a working subcommittee to invigorate the fundraising for its Foundation and has decided to step up its public relations. Part of its PR will be the highlighting of population that Lions serve, and an instance of this will be a so-called **Blind Cafe Experience** on

I have a stack of forms in my office so I know that our KidSight Colorado volunteers have been busy! In the state we have screened 15,658 children and referred 1,822 (11.6 percent referral rate). In 6C, 7,908 children have been screened with 303 referred (13.2 percent referral rate). As you can see from the rates of referral the children of Colorado need and deserve a great vision screening program like KidSight Colorado. Thanks to the many volunteers all across Colorado who make this program possible!

## Colorado Lions Student Speech Contest



2016-2017 STUDENT SPEECH CONTEST

TOPIC:
"WHAT IS YOUR PASSION AND
HOW WILL IT CONTRIBUTE TO A
CHANGIING WORLD

#### Purpose

- Provide an opportunity for Public Speaking on a subject of interest to contestants and American people.
- Provide a vehicle for youth and members of Lions Clubs to interact in the community.
- Stimulate self-expression and independent thinking.

#### Sponsorship

Lions Clubs agree to extend to the participating students their fullest cooperation. Individual Clubs agree to provide for the requirements and welfare of any student whom they may be sponsoring when the student appears in a Club, District and State Competition. This may include transportation and meals. District competitions will all be different to determine the State

#### Entrants

- Open to ANY student of high school age.
- Entrants must submit a written manuscript of their speech to the sponsoring Lions Club prior to the first competition; the same speech MUST BE USED for all competitions.
- Notes and manuscripts may be used.



#### Time Limitations

Contestant's speech should last no less than five (5) minutes and no longer than seven (7) minutes.

#### Awards

- First place winners in each Lions district will receive a cash award, and each runner-up will receive a cash award. Contact your DG for the amount in your District.
- First place winners from each district will progress to a state contest. The winner of this contest will receive a \$500 cash award, second place will receive \$400, third and fourth place will receive \$250.
- Second place will advance if first place cannot continue.

#### Judging

- Three judges will score the competition.
- Lions shall not be a judge above the club level when their Club's winner is a participant



## Colorado Lions Student Speech Contest



NOW is the time that clubs should be contacting High Schools or other High Schools Groups with the information.

**CONTESTS:** Each District with have a different Contest because of not having District

CONVENTIONS: Each District will need to let their contestants know when and where they will be holding their Contests. The winner of the District Contest will be their representative at the State Convention being held at the Double Tree Hotel, Greenwood Village on May 20' 2017.

AWARDS: I hope you will remember the effort these students put into their speech and be generous with your Awards. The State Awards are listed in the Brochure.

MEALS: Remember the District or Club is responsible for the Contestants and 1 or 2 guests at the State Convention.

Please Note the disqualifications defined on this page and make sure they are made clear to the students.



#### Disqualification

Failure to comply with the General Instructions are grounds for disqualification. Additional grounds include:

- Use or display of props
- Uniforms or any other form of identification including Lions emblems to obtain an unfair advantage.
- Inclusion of partisan politics or sectarian religion in the speech.
- Publication of the speech in local media, etc. prior to the contest
- Same speech is NOT used throughout the competition


