Book takes wing for area woman

'Soaring into Greatness' spurs party at Wellshire

Gail Hamilton has designed a party around her book signing, which will be held from 5-9 p.m. Nov. 18 at the Wellshire Events Center, 3333 S. Colorado Blvd.

"We have to have a party for this very special occasion, since I started working on this book May 1, 2004," the Englewood resident said. "I didn't know what I was doing, so I just started writing. The book now is published and I think that is a reason to have a party and celebrate."

She titled her book, "Soaring into Greatness — A Blind Woman's Vision to Live Her Dreams and Fly." She said worked about two hours a day on the book, writing and rewriting the copy. She said there were 10 drafts of the book before the 11th one got published.

"Like I said, we are going to have a party," the author said. "We will have tables and chairs for visitors and there is a cash bar, so come and join me in celebrating my book."

The book recounts many of the challenges Hamilton has faced. She was born 10 weeks premature. Six months later doctors discovered she had an eye condition that left her blind by age 10. She details life growing up, when she was physically and emotionally abused.

The book also highlights her achievements, including a bachelor's degree in music from William Woods University in Fulton, Mo., and a master's degree in vocal performance from Pittsburg State University in Kansas. She sang the leads in "La Boheme" and "La Traviata" while in graduate school.

Her singing was her talent when she won Ms. Colorado Senior America in 2013 and

was fourth in the National Ms. Senior America competition.

She teaches piano and autoharp and is a workshop facilitator and an inspirational speaker.

A few years ago, she worked along with the crews that built her Habitat for Humanity house in Englewood. When the house was finished, she got special assistance so she could sit on the roof and sing.

"My intent in writing the book was to inspire those who are struggling to find themselves," she said. "I hope to let them know they are not alone in their struggles and that an individual can do anything if they have the heart, focus and determination. A saying I have adopted states, "Action plus attitude equals success."

Hamilton's book is available through Amazon and also soon will be available electronically through Kindle.

Highlands Ranch Lions Twin with Hyderabad-Snehanagar Lions



Centennial Anniversary Service Goals





Hello Lions,

As you know, LCI is quickly approaching it's 100 year centennial anniversary. What an accomplishment! There is not another organization in the world that has provided some many humanitarian services and dollars to the world for all those years. I am the 6C coordinator for our centennial anniversary.

As part of this celebration, LCI has put forth a Centennial Service Challenge, with the goal of serving 100 million people by the end of 2017 - 25 million each in Youth, Vision, Hunger and Environment. 64% of our worldwide clubs are reporting their monthly activities on the LCI website, and we need to triple, yes triple, the number of people served to accomplish our 100 million goal. I want to make sure that 6C is reporting all of the people that we serve - we are coming up short on a bunch of our activities. Let me give you a few examples.

I am a volunteer reader for the Audio Information Network of Colorado, and I go to their studio once a week to record the Craig Daily Press newspaper. There are 300 people with access to my recording - that's 300 people served each week that I have not recorded on my monthly activity sheet that I submit to my club's secretary. Here's what I am going to do for my November activities sheet. Multiply 300 people served for each studio session back to the beginning of my term - July 1st. 5 months times 4 times each month times 300 people served = 6,000.

I visited the Conifer club earlier this week and Secretary Joe Gray had a great idea. Each pair of glasses that we recycle will eventually end up in a needy person's hands. Each pair that we recycle needs to be recorded as a person served. For clubs doing Bingo, multiply the number of Lions volunteering by the number of people playing. 9HealthFair clubs, multiply the number of Lions times the number of people that you collected money from. Cleaning the roadways, multiply the number of cars per day times the days since your last clean up (but be reasonable).

Club secretaries, please let your members know of my request. Also, ask your members to go back to July 1 and calculate the number of people served that they have not given you. And yes, I know that we'll need to make some estimates here. Do the best that you can, that's all that I ask.

For the clubs out there who are not reporting their monthly activities on the LCI, what a great time to get started. It is not difficult at all!

We're coming up on the Holiday Season. I want to wish each of you a very merry Thanksgiving Day! I am spending mine with family and friends at my aunt's place near Evergreen. What a great time to talk to our friends over the Holidays about all of the good stuff that the Lions do, and invite them to a service activity. Let's not be shy!
