New Branch - Denver Latino Lions Club

On April 17, the Denver Lions Club formally inducted the charter members of its new Branch Denver Latino Lions Club. Lion Susy Osorio-Kinsky was the major force behind the creation of the Club and acted as emcee for the induction ceremony. Denver Den President Dwight Steen, who speaks Spanish fluently from his days in the Peace Corps in Central America, and I offered the *uramento* for the inductees to agree to.

The Club has already begun planning projects. For Cinco de Mayo, on May 5 in downtown Denver, they'll do Kidsight and adult screenings and distribute reading glasses to those in need from the Latino community. They'll also assist with screenings of Boys and Girls Clubs planned for early May, in anticipation of a joint VSP/Lions project to provide eyeglasses to needy youth from the Clubs on June 1-3. Finally, they're planning a Recycle for Sight campaign at a Rockies game over the summer, with the help of Latino Club President Salvador Hernandez, who is the Spanish voice of the Rockies on cable TV.

It's been 20 years since there was a Latino Club in 6C. The members are incredibly enthusiastic about their new endeavor, and I think that they'll be successful beyond their expectations. They're adding new members rapidly and may be able to be stand-alone within the next 2 months.

Please plan on helping them out as much as possible over the coming months. Who knows - maybe you'll learn a little Spanish in the process?

Eyesight Screening - New America School

On April 18, Lions from 4 different Clubs in 6C - Denver, Cyber, Englewood (including optometrist Lion Dave Newman) and Stapleton (including optician Lion Mayra Baltazar) - collaborated with students at CU Medical School to conduct an eyesight screening campaign at New America School at Lowry. The school's population comprises primarily refugees and immigrants, and the screening was designed to help needy students and their families with eyeglasses as needed. We saw 128 patients, distributed 74 pairs of recycled eyeglasses to those with eyesight problems and referred another 25 to eye doctors for custom lenses.



Gazebo Dedication

On a chilly April 21 morning, I attended the dedication of a gazebo constructed by the Golden Lions to honor WW I veterans. Representing Golden veterans at the ceremony were members of the Golden American Legion - Post 21, Golden VFW - Post 4171 and Colorado School of Mines Veterans Organization. Golden President presided over the ceremony and Golden Lions Roger Wagstaff, John Spice and Ed Dorsey headed the committee that monitored the construction of the gazebo.

On a related note, were you aware that the Lions Club of Boulder constructed a WW I memorial in 1928? The memorial spans CO Route 7. We've learned that the memorial unfortunately is now in disrepair and also in danger of removal due to an impending construction project. We're looking into what steps it might take to preserve it. If any of the Lions in 6C has further knowledge about this and would like to become involved, please let me know.

Congratulations to Broomfield Lions Bobbie and Mark Clapper

Volunteerism leads to community service award for Clappers



When he was 6 years old, Mark Clapper whisked pancake batter and fetched supplies for his dad and other members of the Broomfield Lions Club.

In the early 1980s, he and his wife Bobbie joined the organization and continue to be active with the Lions and a myriad of other organizations.

This year, they will receive the Heart of Broomfield Community Service Award.

Community service is important to their family. It is something passed down from their parents, which they in turn gave to their children and six grandchildren.

Steven Marchi, in his letter nominating them for a Heart of Broomfield award, said the two are known for their dedication, commitment, hard work, kindness and leadership.

"It is a rarity to encounter citizens as motivated and caring as Mark and Bobbie," Marchi said. "To know them is to know Broomfield."

Mark, who worked for the Broomfield Public Works until 2009, remembers the Clappers opening their home to crews during the storm of 1982, when snow drifts reached up to 6 feet, and feeding them chili, tortillas and a cake Bobbie had baked.



"All eating establishments were shut down along with everything else," he said. "We brought all the crews in and fed them."

During storms in the early 2000s, he helped police rescue stranded motorists with his personal snowmobile.

Together, they have delivered food baskets to



families in need and have volunteered as youth coaches: Bobbie in soccer, and Mark in football, basketball and helping Bobbie with soccer.

Their daughter Cami Kohler said her parents also opened their home to the Broomfield High boys and girls basketball teams and hosted pizza parties every week so the teens would have somewhere safe to go on a Friday night.

In the mid 1980s, their father volunteered as Santa Claus at the old Broomfield K-Mart where he enjoyed childrens' excitement and reaction to seeing Santa.

Not only did they volunteer in Broomfield, she said, but also in Fort Morgan where they were involved in the FFA program and the Morgan County 4-H program.

Growing up, the children helped their parents work Bingo games at nursing homes in Boulder and Broomfield and helped with the Lion's pancake breakfast.

"A wonderful quality that our parents have instilled in Doug and I is to always have compassion for the young and old and always make giving a priority," Kohler said in her recommendation letter.
