As Lions, we support several charities through our 100% Donations. One I'd like to mention today is the Leader Dog Program. Established in 1938 in a town near Detroit, Rochester Hills. Today, we support not only the seeing eye dog, but Diabetic, hearing impaired and others. Lion Greg Teggemann has program information if you would like to sponsor a member

Often we talk about supporting the LCIF with a Melvin Jones Fellowship. There are other ways, including the Centennial Silver Dollar. For about \$53, a proof finish coin will be sent to your destination. LCIF hopes to raise up to 4 million dollars, so consider these coins before the supply vanishes. Another way to support the LCIF is donating to the Lions Measles Initiative. The LMI working with the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation deliver, for about \$1.50 per shot for the Measle, Mump and Rubella vaccines. With just eight months remaining to fulfill our \$7 million pledge to GAVI, the Vaccine Alliance.

Lion Larkin joined the San Marcos Lions Club in 1993. He rose to the rank of 1st VP by 1998. He had a job transfer and had to leave for a period of time. He returned to the club and became the President in 2012-13. He then accepted the position of Membership Chair. With job changes within the ranks, Lion Larkin was again elected to be the President in 2015-16. He returned to the office of Membership Chair and was instrumental in increasing the membership. During the 2016-17 year, he accepted the position as Zone Chair, IV-B.

Lion Larkin has recruited many members and served on many committees.

Lion Larkin has also been an advisor for the Medical Explorers Post 4077 since its start in 1991. Larkin has been essential to the EMT training effort within the Post and is a valuable instructor within the CPR/First Aid certification effort. He has played an essential role in moving the Post toward approval as a Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) that has already played an important role in backing up EMS in Hays County.

Alden discovered archery at camp and pursued the sport after he came home. He takes lessons and even competes, shooting from his wheelchair in contests with children his age who stand to shoot. He is ranked 9th in the state in

his age group, and that's all 15-year-olds!

His mom Trisha told us the long-lasting changes in Alden's attitude and enhanced scholastic performance. He has confidence and goals. Trisha was grateful for the break his week at camp gave both of them.

WIMBERLEY LIONS - SPOT VISION SCREENING TEAM

The Wimberley Lions Club program for the evening was presented by Lions Bill Higdon and Harold Tannahill of the Lions' Spot Vision Screening team. They are starting their 5th year of the Spot vision Program and the response from the community has been great. In 4 years, they have gone from 3 trained screeners to 16; from 23 referrals in 2014 to 154 in 2016; and 168 children screened in 2013 to 2,020 in 2016!

They have held vision screenings at various locations over the past 4 years including Scudder Primary and Jacobs Well Elementary, as well as the Back to School Fiesta and EmilyAnn Theatre and Gardens Butterfly Festival. The Spot Vision Screener is a handheld, portable device used to detect vision issues on patients from age 6 months through adult. Unless vision problems are detected early and corrected, they are at risk of becoming permanent by age 7. Spot detects the potential indication of common vision problems such as myopia (nearsightedness), hyperopia (farsightedness), astigmatism (blurred vision), anisometropia (unequal refractive power), strabismus (eye misalignment), and anisocoria (unequal pupil size.

If you are interested in learning how to become a vision screener, talk to Lion Bill or Lion Harold... they will get you started!

He was a Lion... and a Lion of a man!

Dennis William Kraft, 64, a longtime resident of New Braunfels, passed away unexpectedly on Monday, March 13th at his home. Born December 19th, 1952 in Fort Sam Houston, he was the son of the late Roman Kraft and Edna Hubertus Kraft. Surviving family members include his three sisters, Hope Mayer, Carol Kraft and Joyce Friesenhahn and respective families. His formative years were spent on the family homestead and farm in the Cibolo area working the land with his kinfolk. From early on, Dennis suffered a congenital eye disease which progressively worsened as he aged, thus curtailing his independent physical mobility. Fortunately, Dennis qualified as a recipient for a guide dog, enabling him to enjoy a less restrictive lifestyle. His beloved Guide Dogs Barnaby, Bear and Scout gave him much freedom and companionship through the years. He was an active member of the local Low Vision Club. Embracing his faith, Dennis was a devout member of the Oakwood Baptist Church in New Braunfels and was integral to his Sunday Bible School Group. He enjoyed many hobbies including gardening, woodworking and fishing...and taking a meal at the local IHOP.

To a great extent, Dennis was defined by his dedication to Lionism. He joined the New Braunfels Noon Lions Club in July of 1988, transferring to the NB Breakfast Lions Club in

An avid supporter of the Texas Lions Camp, Dennis was a life member of the camp, a 28 year member of Century Club, and a level 12 (almost level 13) Jack Wiech Fellow. He also had Century Club memberships for all 3 of his past service dogs. Barnaby was a 12 year member, Bear was also a 12 year mem-

ber and Scout his last service dog was an 11 year member. He has an endowment brick, and gold leaf located at TLC. He gave personally over \$5,000 and engaged his community and those who knew him to give to TLC through his annual camp walk. In the past 10 years through his efforts, others donated over \$10,000 to TLC.

I had the privilege of knowing Dennis both as a Lion and as a friend. I shall miss his presence at our meetings and the bond of friendship that we shared.

H.B. No. 3157

A BILL TO BE ENTITLED AN ACT

Relating to requirements for screenings in public or private schools to detect vision disorders of students.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: SECTION 1. Section 36.004, health and Safety Code, is amended by adding Subsection (b-1) to read as follows:

(b-1) The rules must allow an individual who attends a public or private school to be screened using photo screening to detect vision disorders.

SECTION 2. As soon as practicable after the effective date of this act, the executive commissioner of the Health and Human Services Commission shall adopt the rules necessary to implement the changes in law made by this Act.

SECTION 3. This Act takes effect September 1, 2017.







The Balcones Quarry from which the limestone is mined is the largest single quarry in the U.S. Ten thousand tons of limestone are mined every day from a 225-foot deep deposit and delivered to customers as far away as Houston. The limestone will be crushed for aggregate or calcified in huge kilns on its way to becoming cement.

The 2400-acre quarry is Wildlife Habitat Certified and has numerous awards for its stewardship. Even the water used is recycled at the rate of 90%, which in drought country is huge. Somewhat of a surprise is the number of old tires consumed in the kiln at the rate of one every 7 seconds. It is a testament to the Cemex operation that smoke has never been an issue.

Business Meeting – March, 16: Third Veep Mark Reynolds' guest speaker had to cancel for personal reasons so this meeting was shortened by that much. Even so, we adjourned only 3 minutes early.

Program: Rusty Brockman, Vice President of Economic Development for the Chamber of Commerce, spoke about the greater New Braunfels Economic Development Council (EDC), aka the 4B Board. The EDC is a non-profit umbrella organization that serves as the public/private partnership involving the City via their economic sales tax corporation, the Economic Development Foundation, Comal County, NBU, and the Chamber.

Rusty provided the Club with the latest in demographics and economic benchmarks for the city. He noted that since 2010 the EDC initiated 17 projects involving quality of life (39%), infrastructure (34%), incentives (21%), and professional services (8%). The projects generate approximately \$5.80 to the City foe every \$1 spent. Through 2015 the projects helped create an average of 1,414 jobs annually. That helped hold the 2016 unemployment rate to just at 3%, lower than the nation, state, region, and metro area rates.
