Lions Clubs International (LCI) provides a detailed brochure on the duties of the Membership Chair, and the brochure can be found on the website and downloaded with this link www.lionsclubs.org/memberchair.

Club growth occurs not only by the addition of new members through invite, but also through retention of highly satisfied members. Member satisfaction can be achieved through planning and continual feedback from your members. LCI offers many tools that assist the Membership Chair to fulfill their obligation to the club. Some of those tools include the Club Quality Initiative (CEP, and CEP-lite), How are our Ratings (and administrative guide), and Blueprint for a Stronger Club. All of these resources are downloadable from the LCI website. The Club Excellence Process (CEP), by use of needs assessments, allows the club to identify member and community satisfying service projects.

As Membership Chair there are District resources that can provide help and support. Along with you local Membership Committee, the District Global Membership Team (DGMT), consisting of the District Global Membership Coordinator, the District Governor, 1st and 2nd Vice District Governors and the Zone Chairs are available to support you as part of a unified team.

As club elections will be occurring soon those newly elected Membership chairs, and those that will serve another term, the DGMT will be offering

training specifically designed for you. We plan to offer this training in both face-to-face and online formats. It is our hope that you will take advantage and attend these valuable trainings. "We Serve"

Technology is Making a Big Contribution

Technology is making a big contribution to the operations of our District

We all attend meetings for our Club including membership and board meetings. Then, many members represent our Club at Zone meetings and District Cabinet meetings as well. Occasionally, we work with ad hoc groups that you may be communicating with in order to learn about some successful programs they have created. So, enter technology!!

We have started using "GoToMeeting," a conferencing software application, in the Charities Committee. Everyone invited to the meeting can call in or launch the link to the "GoToMeeting" website. The Leader and the other committee members can not only talk to each other but you can see each other or see a presentation. Seeing each other during the meeting enhances the online meeting since you get to see the face of the participants and their reaction to the material being shown or discussed.

Other factors that benefit from the "GoToMeeting" software include the savings of time and money. You eliminate the driving time and reduce time lost due to side conversations talking over each other. Also, there is a Chat Room that can be used simultaneously during the meeting that can be used for questions or side conversations.

To help learn more about "GoToMeeting," a breakout session will be held at the upcoming District Convention on May 13th. 1st VDG John Pruett and Lion Maureen Kinald, Charities Committee Chair, will be presenting this session, so don't let this opportunity slip by you. This is the first step toward a Digital District!!

Each club is entitled to one delegate for each 10 dues paying members and one delegate for a fraction of 5/10 or greater; i.e., 5 to 14 members = 1 delegate. 15 to 24 = 2 delegates 25 to 34 = 3 delegates.



I am extremely pleased with the results so far. Several of the nice donated prizes will be included in a raffle and a silent auction. When this newsletter went to press we had received over \$16,600 in Hole Sponsorships.



In Memory of Lion "Ron" Knott

Ronnie F. "Ron" Knott of New Braunfels, TX, beloved husband, father, grand-and great grandfather, brother and friend passed away in San Marcos, TX, on Tuesday, February 14, 2017, at the age of 74, surrounded by family. He was born in Childress, TX on April 26, 1942, the son of Fordy and Mollie (Lee) Knott.

His parents and a sister, Wanda Elizabeth McBee preceded him in death.

He is survived by his devoted wife of almost 35 years, Joyce Ann "Jan" (Berry) Knott; sister, Florene Ritz (Jim) of Frisco, TX; two brothers, Leeroy Knott (Mary) of Naples, SC and Ernie Dwight Knott (Hazel) of Wagaman, LA; five daughters,

Ron graduated from Quannah High School and attended Texas Tech University in Lubbock, TX.

He actively served in both the local and district Lions Club. A 26 year member of the Local Lions Club, his involvement included his service to TLC Century Club, TLERC Knights of the Blind, Chairman of four local Lions committees, Historian, Lion Tamer, VP, Board Member and President of the San Marcos Lions Club. District involvement included serving as Chair and Co-chair of Region IV, Mid-Winter Conference, District Convention, District Extension, MD2 Membership. Vice District Governor, Governor, State Governors Rep. to the Executive Board, Texas Lions Planned Giving and Endowment Committee, VP TLERC Board, Texas Lions Camp Long Range Planning Committee, and Presenter/Member Texas Lions Regional Leadership Institute.

Ron served as Director and President of the Board of the San Marcos Area Food Bank and volunteered his time to Meals-on-Wheels. He was a member of the Men's Fellowship First Methodist Church, San Marcos Healthy Communities Committee, San Marcos Summer Fest Committee, Pecos Chamber of Commerce, where he won the award for Outstanding Director for Leadership and Community Service, and a two year member of the West of the Pecos Board of Directors. Other awards earned included Melvin Jones Fellow, Dis-

trict Governor, International President, two Extension Awards for two clubs, Senior Grand Master Membership Key, Jack Weich Fellow and the Harry Reasonover Award.

Summer camp is fast approaching, and Lions Clubs from across the state are traveling to Kerrville to help spruce up Texas Lions Camp. As I've been speaking to clubs around the District, I've been impressed with how individual clubs support the camp through their dues, 100 percent participation, memorials and honorariums as well as endowment contributions and Jack Wiech Fellowships. However, the camp raises only about \$1 million of its \$2.7 million budget from club dues and charities. That's why development and individual support are so important. Since the Internal Revenue Service has classified the camp as a charitable 501(c)3 organization, contributions are tax deductible.

Most of us Lions know someone connected with a large business which may make charitable contributions. Some of us also know people who are connected to philanthropic organizations/foundations. If you have a contact, talk to him or her about Texas Lions Camp and the amazing work that goes on in Kerrville each summer. If your contact is interested, then communicate with the camp's Director of Development, Milton Dare, at mdare@lionscamp.com or 830/896-8500. You can introduce Milton to your contact, and he can learn more about how the company or foundation might be interested in working with Texas Lions Camp. He can prepare and submit a proposal for funding, if appropriate.

Individuals also can support the camp for as little as \$10 per month. Century Club membership provides much-needed funds for operations, and a Bronze Century Club membership is only \$100 a year or \$10 a month. The Silver level is \$250/year or \$21 per month. A Gold Century Club membership is \$500 or \$42 per month, and the Diamond Level is \$1,000 per year, or \$84 per month. The Ambassador Club is \$5,000 per year, or \$420 per month. Most of us can afford \$10 a month to help the camp continue to serve 1,500 special needs children each summer. Of course, if circumstances change, you can discontinue your monthly donation at any time.





NEW BRAUNFELS (NOON) LIONS CLUB

Business Meeting – 2 February: Trendy Sharp of the Child's Advocate Center of Comal County (CAC) delivered an unvarnished look at the magnitude of the child- and/or sexabuse problem we have in our quaint little Hill Country enclave. In 2016 alone there were 1458 cases of child abuse in Comal County. On average, one in four girls and one in six boys will be sexually molested before the age of 16. [That number seems really high for our community, but I was scribbling fast trying to keep up — it may be a national average, not a Comal County statistic—Ed.]



Trendy stressed that we are obligated by law to re-port suspected child abuse or neglect. If a child is in immediate danger, it's a 911 call. Otherwise, the hotline number is 800-252-5400.

There are multiple opportunities for volunteerism in these areas, and Trendy says she wakes up every morning knowing she will make a difference in some child's life. It may even be the first time the child's story is believed. Heart rending.

Business Meeting – 16 February: Third VP Mark Reynolds introduces Becky Voges and Tara Gray who give an impassioned program on the local programs of the American Cancer Society. Program – February 21: The program for February 21st was a presentation by Dr. Tom Fitch, CTMC, on Chest Pain and Stroke Prevention. Dr. Fitch recently survived a stroke and shared his story with us. When he started feeling, in his words 'weird', he and his wife did the "FAST" test and he seemed to have passed. The FAST test is F= face uneven?; A= one arm weaker?; S= speech slurred?; T= time to call EMS right away!. Dr. Fitch had a couple of other symptoms though in that his balance was off and vision blurred. So, he recommends the BE FAST test, adding the B= balance off, and the E= eyes blurry.

Do not hesitate to call EMS if you experience any of the BE FAST symptoms. Time is of the essence when a stroke occurs, and medication is needed within 4 hours.
