


### **MESSAGE FROM DISTRICT GOVERNOR: CLEVER MUGADZA**

When I became a Lion many years back I still remember the sterling work that the lions of Harare were giving to the citizens of the city and beyond which is what prompted me to accept the invitation to join the lions club of Harare West. It was only then that I began to realize that lionism was bigger and greater than I had originally imagined.

I got to know that Harare as big as it was had other clubs like the lions clubs of Mabelreign, Hatfield, Nora Valley, Gwebi just to mention a few and all of them were doing their best in providing service of various kinds to their communities. I also got to know that this service was not only happening with clubs in Zimbabwe but that the lions district included clubs in Malawi, Mozambique and Botswana as well the fact that this was an international organization which I later learnt was the biggest service organization in the world.

The most enduring and indelible experience of how lions change lives is when my club embarked on an eye camp in the Wedza district of Mashonaland East in Zimbabwe where with the assistance of specialist eye surgeons in both the private and public health sector we jointly held an eye camp for about 200 less privileged senior citizens of that district. The access to that area by road was difficult especially since most of the doctors were based in Harare and had to commute to and from Harare every day. The government of Zimbabwe acknowledging the importance of this service to the communities actually provided a helicopter from the Airforce of Zimbabwe to ferry the



doctors to and from Harare to this district hospital in the heart of Mashonaland East every day for the duration of the eye camp.

It so happened that on the second day of the camp when the dressings that are put after the operations were removed I was standing next to an old lady who had been blind for a number of years due to eye cataracts that when these were opened and she could now see she hurriedly and without warning hugged me after she had been advised by the nurses that these lions in blue blazers are the ones that had made it possible for her to have the operations done free of charge. Without any prompting from the lions fraternity, the biggest national newspaper carried this story as the headlines and


there was a picture of me in my blue blazer and this old lady on the front page. (This by the way is not the important part but the tears of joy streaming down the old lady's face). I can still vividly see the tears running down her old cheeks. That, fellow lions made me realise what an important decision I had made in becoming a lion and I can never forget that for the rest of my life.

I can but just dream how much more we could all collectively do if we focus coming together to serve our communities hence the "Service Through Integration" theme as "We Follow Our Dream"



## **REPORT ON THE EXHIBITION OPENING HELD ON 26TH OCTOBER 2013**

The Exhibition day dawned sunny and fine! All was prepared for the Exhibition opening. The forty – four posters from seven Government Schools and seventeen posters from three Private Schools were on display. The guest speakers for the occasion were Rev.Paul Bayethe Damasane, Principal Director Sport, Arts and Culture and Mr. Israel Ndlovu, Education Officer Arts and Culture. His Worship the Mayor of Bulawayo, Councillor Martin K. Moyo also attended the function.

The Master of Ceremonies and organiser of the Contest, Lion Ruth van Rensburg invited Mr. Vote Thebe, Regional Director, National Gallery of Zimbabwe in Bulawayo to welcome all the Guests and children to the Exhibition opening. The next speaker was the President of the Lions Club of Matopos, Lion Maureen Barrett who spoke on 'The History of the Peace Poster Art Contest and Lions Clubs.' She enlightened the audience on the Peace Poster contest which started in 1988 in America and said that approximately 400,000 children from 75 countries participate in the contest annually. She said that for the past 25 years, more than eight million children from nearly 100 countries have participated in the contest. The next speaker was Mr. Israel Ndlovu, Education Officer Arts and Culture who spoke on 'Art and the Ministry of Arts

and Culture. It was interesting to discover facts about the Schools involved in the innovative art schemes that the Ministry has put in place.

After that informative speech, the Guest of Honour for the afternoon, Rev. Paul Bayethe Damasane, Principal Director Sport, Arts and Culture spoke on the impact that Lions had on his life and still has on the child and the community as a whole 'ubuntu'. It was a stimulating speech and he said that this contest assisted the development of art by 'promoting a focus on creativity'.

After his speech it was time for Rev.Paul Bayethe Damasane to present the certificates to all the participants and the prize money to the Contest winners.

In the Government School section the winners were:

First place – Nqobizitha Ntuta, Sobukhazi High;

**Second and Third Places** - Tafadzwa Madzorera and Tapiwa Tekede from King George VI School.

In the Private School section the winners were:

First Place – Michaela Hallamore, Whitestone School;

Second Place- Shayla Doolabh, Petra Junior;

**Third Place** – Rodney Malambo, Falcon College.

A total of Seventeen Merit awards, from both sections, were also presented. The Prize money for this event was \$50 each First Place winner, \$30 each Second Place winner, \$20 each Third place winner and \$5 plus a Stationery Set each for the 17 Merit winners.

The winning Posters will now be judged at District 412 Level at the Lions Cabinet meeting to be held in Kwekwe at the end of November. The Lions District 412 consists of Botswana, Malawi, Mozambigue and Zimbabwe.

After the Presentation Ceremony a vote of thanks was extended on behalf of the Lions Club of Matopos by Lion Maurice Nyamuda, Assistant G.M.T.L.

The guests were invited to have refreshments and that heralded the end of the afternoon's proceedings. A list of the sponsors of the Contest and Exhibition is on display in the small galleries, where the Peace Poster Art Contest Exhibition will be from the 26 October to 30 November, 2013. All are encouraged to view the children's work.

### Stop to think.....

a) Being a Lion is a Gift in itself so prove to those you serve.

b) For District 412 to keep providing all this service and "Living our Dream" of "Service Through Integration" we must first remain a viable district and to do that we must pay our individual membership club dues, then our District and International club dues promptly, if you have not already done so please do so now and not tomorrow. c) Remember if we are not paid up the District will seize to exist, so let's pay to save our District.

d) To be a viable district we need to be 1250 members strong and a minimum

of 35 clubs. We started the 2013-2014 lionistic year on a membership of 964 members only and we only managed to keep our district status because we had 49 clubs which is more than 35 clubs required. However at the rate we are going with so many clubs going onto suspension and status quo we are in a serious risk of losing such an important vehicle for serving those less privileged than we are. Currently we have 51 clubs and a district strength of 1009 which means we are far from the ideal number of lions required, so let us keep on recruiting new members give them adequate and appropriate orientation as well as encouraging all lions to pay

their dues to enable us to retain our goodwill and service to the four countries in our District. (Malawi, Mozambique, Zimbabwe and Botswana).

e)As our International President Barry J. Palmer says we need to aim at getting 50/50 women/men membership ratios by 2017. So as we recruit new members there is need to retain our old members but we must focus on recruiting female lion members.

So fellow Lions of District 412 Go for it!! and lets Follow our Dream to Reality as we offer Service Through Integration.







## LION AGGREY CHIMOMBE PASSES ON By Eric Musesengwe

Lion Aggripa Chimombe affectionately known as Lion Aggrey passed on to higher service on Thursday 10 October 2013. Lion Aggrey joined the Sebakwe Lions Club in 1998. A keen and enthusiastic Lion he was that the following year he was elected Vice President of the club. Fate took its toll in 2000 when he was involved in a car crash which cost him a permanent hip disability. This also caused him to go on early health retirement caused by this immobility situation. He was a High School Headmaster.

Although retired on medical grounds he didn't condemn himself as a disabled person who would whine and whimper day in and out. He embarked on writing ,first his autobiography and went on to write about the Dutch Reformed Church now the Reformed Church in Zimbabwe. He researched on its entry and influence into Zimbabwe from an African point of view. The manuscript is yet to be published.

From his desk he would advise and suggest his ideas to his club Sebakwe through me and other Lions who visited him. On other occasions he would ask his wife Lion Eunice to drive him to club meetings or Zone meetings. During his presence in these meetings his contributions were constructive and practical and at times spicing them with lots of humour.

In addition to his contributions he told me that he was grateful that he was visited by District Governors at his residence due to his immobility after the accident. The first visit was by P.D.G Faisal Karim from Muzuzu Malawi in September 2005. In August 2009 he met P.D.G, T.K Ramkumar from Lobatse Botswana in Redcliff. This was followed by P.D.G Dr Pateson Mapanda of Redcliff Zimbabwe in 2010. In June 2013 he was visited by I.P.D.G Clement Ndala from Lilongwe Malawi and D.G Clever Mugadza from Harare Zimbabwe and Zone 2D Chairperson Lion Robert Marapira in September 2013. At the time of his death he was 69 years of age having been born in 1944 in Gutu Masvingo. On hearing of his passing condolence messages came flow all over District 412. He is survived by his wife Eunice, sons Brighton, Tamuka, Simbarashe and daughter in law Evelyn.

## **MESSAGE FROM THE SECOND VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR**



### **GLOBAL MEMBERSHIP TEAM (GMT)**

On 1st July, 2013, the lions' family in the international community, in the 207 countries and geographical areas, and in over 46 000 clubs stood at 1 360 465. Today, on 14th November, 2013 there are 1 367 920 lions in the world. Simple "abacus" translates this net growth to be 6455.

The opening balance in our single district which is yet to be fully constituted at 1 250 membership was at 964 on 1st July 2013. Today, the membership is at 1017, with a positive or cumulative variance of 53. But alas whilst we gained 149 members we dropped 96. The aspect of retention against attrition needs

underscoring and duly paying attention to the same. We are at the penultimate end of our half year. Whlist, "following our dreams" through integration "the goal was to add 300 members, the situation on the ground calls that we pull up our socks.

We now have 52 clubs from 51. We are celebratory that Chinhoyi Lions Clubs #120290 came to the fold at a colourful charter dinner on19th October at Mazvikadeyi Resort in Banket, Zimbabwe .Only 16 of the clubs have documented activity reports with International. The other 36 are reported dormant! 53% of the clubs have membership less than 20, we therefore need to recruit more members in our clubs. Sadly in 2013 alone we lost by cancellation 10 clubs in the district.

### **GLOBAL LEADERSHIP TEAM (GLT)**

We are celebratory that all the four regions have successfully held their region Conferences! PDG, Tengemanangathe Ramkumar, the GLT District Coordinator has communicated that we are welcome to participate in the District 410 Regional Lions ' Leadership Conference in Wellington , in the Cape ,South Africa ,may we take note of and attend to the same! GLT Coordinator Zimbabwe, PDG, Dr PTT. Mapanda is suggesting we could team up, both strategically and in the future with District 413, Zambia and have a

## THE HISTORY OF THE MATOPOS LIONS PEACE POSTER ART CONTEST EXHIBITION

In the 2009/2010 Lionistic year Lion Ruth was "tasked" to organise the Contest. Lion Ruth felt the Contest would be best served, if the participants had some art workshops before competing. The theme that year was, "The Power of Peace" and three Government schools (Inzwananzi Junior, Sobukhazi High and Ngwalongwalo Junior) were invited to attend the first workshop, at the National Art Gallery in Bulawayo.

Clifford Zulu, who was the Art Gallery Education Officer, was the Art facilitator at the workshops in July 2010, catering for about 30 children. In October 2010, Jeanette Johnson, Ann Visser and Khumbulani Mpofu judged this first local Contest.

Lion Ruth has since organised and run three more Art workshops with the help of a few Lions and Brian Kumira. (2010/2011; 2011/2012; 2012/2013)

#### The Workshops

The workshop in 2010, consisted of two weekends in July of intensive Art training for the three Government Schools, (Sobukhazi High, Inzwananzi Junior and Ngwalongwalo Primary) using different mediums. The theme was discussed and the children tried to express it. The work created was unique and expressed the young artist's life experience, culture and vision.

At these workshops the children were given lunch, juice, sweets, biscuits and all art equipment. At the end of each Saturday the children left the Gallery with a small treat (e.g. a packet of milk or lacto, chips, oranges) that had been sourced from sponsoring companies. On the last Saturday each child got a pencil and the schools got an equal share of the paint. This has now become the norm at

all the workshops catering for about 60 children. In 2012 the First and Second place winners were boys, from the Government schools, who had come up through the system having attended the first workshop in 2010, as eleven year olds and winning as thirteen year olds in 2012. The standard had so improved.

### The Workshop for the Private Schools

In 2011, Lion Ruth then asked the club if she could expand the contest and set about inviting new Government and Private schools, including King George VI School. Masiyephambili Junior School won the contest. The children from the Private schools paid \$5 for their lunches provided at cost by Art Grove Coffee Shop, had juice and biscuits and paid a \$5 participation fee for the July workshops. These were on the last two Saturdays in July. At the end of their workshops they left with their pencils. For the past two years they have only had one Saturday, as the School calendar has changed thereby affecting the workshop.

### **The Exhibition**

The Posters are delivered to the Art Gallery the Thursday before the week of the Exhibition. Lion Ruth with the help of the Art Facilitator, Clifford or Brian and if he is able, Lion Daniel, sets up the Exhibition for judging. Each School is Anonymous as they have a tag displayed using letters of the Alphabet and each piece has a number to denote its section E.g. School: A Poster: A1.

The judges take two days to finalise judgement. After this the display is then changed and the judges get the opportunity to see the names of the winning schools/child. The Alphabetical names are replaced by School names and each child's work gets a tag displaying the individuals name, school and

Grade/Form/Age. The Art Grove Coffee Shop has sponsored lunches for the judges for the past two years. This year they were unable to, so Lion Ruth made Hamburgers and salads in the Gallery kitchen! This year, 2013, forty - four Government School children and seventeen Private School children exhibited their posters.

Senator David Coltart, then the Minister of Education. Sports. Art and Culture was our First Exhibition Guest of Honour in 2010. We have since had the Mayor of Bulawayo Clr.T. Moyo in 2011, Mr. Dan Moyo Provincial Education Director for Bulawayo in 2012 and Rev.Paul Bayethe Damasane Principal Director Sport, Arts and Culture in 2013. This year we also had Mr. Israel Ndlovu Education Officer Arts and Culture as a Guest speaker.

The Prize money is \$50 First, \$30 Second, \$20 Third and ten Merit winners each get \$5. This year the Private School Posters and the Government School Posters were judged separately as two entries are being submitted. Thanks to assistance from sponsors, there were 20 Merit winners and their prize was \$5 and a little stationary set. Every participating School and child receives a certificate. This year we were able to present our Art Facilitator with a hamper.

Refreshments are served at the end of the Presentation Ceremony to all present.

International has advised that Lions of Zimbabwe are expected to pay full International Dues WEF 01 January 2014

#### Budget 2013 -14 (Need for revision)

- The guiding principal of our District Rules of Audit state that the Budgeted expenses are very much dependent on income as the total amount of expenditure incurred in any fiscal year shall not exceed the amount of revenue earned during the same fiscal year unless otherwise approved by the floor of Convention.
- 2 The approved Budget is required to be amended for the following reasons:
- The budget was worked out on a District strength of 1200. The strength of the District as of 16 July 2013 was only 983.
- The decision of the Cabinet on the DG not required to deposit Office Expenses claimed from International in the District account reduces income by US\$ 4500 and is deficit of US\$ 7590.
- At the 4<sup>th</sup> Cabinet Meeting -2012-2013 it was recommended that Regional Lions Leadership Institute be conducted in the District. In order to plan for an RLLI in 2014-15, district contribution of US \$ 10000 as its share has to be planned for.
- Finance Committee is therefore requested to examine the District Dues for the District presently
  at US\$ 21.00. It is felt that US\$21.00 would not suffice and may have to be increased for
  second half of 2013-14 in view of the reduced income, deficit and increased expenditure.
