THE HELEN KELLER CHALLENGE

Helen Keller's Speech at 1925 International Convention Cedar Point, Ohio, USA June 30, 1925

Dear Lions and Ladies:

I suppose you have heard the legend that represents opportunity as a capricious lady, who knocks at every door but once, and if the door isn't opened quickly, she passes on, never to return. And that is as it should be. Lovely, desirable ladies won't wait. You have to go out and grab 'em.

I am your opportunity. I am knocking at your door. I want to be adopted. The legend doesn't say what you are to do when several beautiful opportunities present themselves at the same door. I guess you have to choose the one you love best. I hope you will adopt me. I am the youngest here, and what I offer you is full of splendid opportunities for service.

The American Foundation for the Blind is only four years old. It grew out of the imperative needs of the blind, and was called into existence by the sightless themselves. It is national and international in scope and in importance. It represents the best and most enlightened thought on our subject that has been reached so far. Its object is to make the lives of the blind more worthwhile everywhere by increasing their economic value and giving them the joy of normal activity.


Try to imagine how you would feel if you were suddenly stricken blind today. Picture yourself stumbling and groping at noonday as in the night; your work, your independence, gone. In that dark world wouldn't you be glad if a friend took you by the hand and said, "Come with me and I will teach you how to do some of the things you used to do when you could see?" That is just the kind of friend the American Foundation is going to be to all the blind in this country if seeing people will give it the support it must have.



You have heard how through a little word dropped from the fingers of another, a ray of light from another soul touched the darkness of my mind and I found myself, found the world, found God. It is because my teacher learned about me and broke through the dark, silent imprisonment which held me that I am able to work for myself and for others. It is the caring we want more than money. The gift without the sympathy and interest of the giver is empty. If you care, if we can make the people of this great country care, the blind will indeed triumph over blindness.

The opportunity I bring to you, Lions, is this: To foster and sponsor the work of the American Foundation for the Blind. Will you not help me hasten the day when there shall be no preventable blindness; no little deaf, blind child untaught; no blind man or woman unaided? I appeal to you Lions, you who have your sight, your hearing, you who are strong and brave and kind. Will you not constitute yourselves Knights of the Blind in this crusade against darkness?

I thank you.

On **World Sight Day, 09 October 2014, Lions of Chiredzi** convened an eye clinic at South Eastern College. 63 pupils and staff members were screened with at least 15 found to be in need of attention. Thanks to Mr. Gwisayi, an eye specialist from Mkwasine Estates who conducted the screening free of charge and the 13 Lions and Prospective Lions from Chiredzi who attended the event.





'The mission of the Lions' SightFirst program is to support the development of comprehensive eye care systems to fight the major causes of blindness and vision loss and care for the blind and visually impaired. The program funds high quality, sustainable projects that deliver eye care services, develop infrastructure, train personnel and/or provide rehabilitation & education in underserved communities.

Since its inception in 1990, LCIF's SightFirst program has played a key role in reducing blindness, especially blindness due to cataract. To date, the SightFirst program has awarded **US\$71.6 million for 526 cataract-related projects**.

HANDOVER OF MTSILIZA PRIMARY SCHOOL LIBRARY BY THE LIONS CLUB OF LILONGWE

It was all smiles at the Mtsiliza Primary School on Friday, 3rd October 2014 when the Lions Club of Lilongwe donated a spacious library to the school. You just had to look at the glowing faces of the beneficiaries of the project, the students and their teachers for you to understand and appreciate the happiness and excitement within them.

The students' performances that included drama, singing, dancing and poetry recitals just clearly showed how excited they were to finally have a well-stocked library where they will now sit and engross themselves in books to enhance their knowledge and understanding of a variety of subject areas.

For the Lions Club, this was a culmination of a journey that started a couple of years ago. The happiness and a sense of satisfaction at what they had come to achieve was apparent on the faces of the Lions who had taken their time off from their respective work places to come and witness this colorful occasion.

The library was constructed to a tune of slightly over MK2.4 million by the charitable organization, Lions Club of Lilongwe whose current President is a renown educationist Lion Maina Mkandawire of the famous Bambino Schools of Lilongwe. In her speech, she emphasized about the importance the club puts in promoting education thereby giving opportunities to many young Malawian girls and boys an opportunity to attain and achieve a good education that will act as a catalyst for both personal and national socio-economic development. She also pledged continued support from the organization realizing that there are many problems that the school in particular and the community at large are facing. However, she also appealed to the school authorities and the community of Mtsiliza to take good care of the library among the other school learning facilities.

In his speech, the guest of honour at the function who is also the Head of National Library Services, Mr Grey Nyali echoed Lion Maina's remarks on the need for the community to care for the library and the books therein. He also spoke about the need and importance for each school to have a library as a very vital component in the education system. Mr Nyali expressed his gratitude for the work that the Lions Club had done, giving Mtsiliza LEA School such a beautiful and well stocked library. He also called on educational authorities in the country to make the construction of a library an integral part of any school construction project. On his part, he pledged his department's continued support to the newly opened library and other libraries in the country. Perhaps to show that he meant what he said, the National Library Services donated two boxes of textbooks to the new library and announced the construction of a community library in Mtsiliza next year.

The occasion was also attended by Local Educational and Traditional Leaders, the Head Teacher and students of Bambino High School. In their speeches, the leaders commended Lions Club of Lilongwe for the gift of the Library and advised the students and everyone concerned to care for the books and in the library and not steal them. The Students of Bambino High School through a newly established Leo Club under the Lions Club of Lilongwe have pledged to facilitate the reading action at Mtsiliza Primary School every Wednesday afternoon during school time.

EARLY CHRISTMAS FOR THE ELDERLY

Spotting a grey beard that tells the story of a man who has seen better days, Tongoona Murefu (81) waits anxiously for the waitress to serve him the grilled drumsticks. His eyes remain fixed on the waitress as his facial expression denotes that of a man who doesn't want to miss out on the mouthwatering food. Or is it that it has been long

since he ate food at the hotel? Or maybe he is going down memory lane to days when he was still able to do things for himself? Only he knew what he was thinking, but all those who were around could tell that the octogenarian could no longer afford to wait to for his own share of the food.

With Christmas just two months away, last Saturday, 18 October 2014 a number of old men and women at the Mother

Theresa Home in Waterfalls had an early Christmas treat, thanks to Cresta Hotel and **Lions Club of Harare West** who organized a mini-party that also saw a donation of a number of goods to the elderly people. "Cresta Oasis Hotels has a social responsibility where annually we dip into our pockets and assist the less privileged.

"But this is the first time we have donated something here, and thanks to Lions Club Harare West for identifying the area of need. "We also help other organizations in the country as part of our social responsibility programme," said Chipo Mandela, Cresta Hotels Head of Finance and Administration.

To the sponsors, it was just a donation but to the habitats of Mother Theresa it was a thing not to forget. It was an interesting sight as elders, most of them with a few teeth, tried to munch the chicken and other food stuffs. They faced difficulties in dealing with the bones but at the end of the day, nothing was left in their plates.

It is not that they do not eat good food at the home, but it was the atmosphere created by the visitors that left the elderly grateful.

"This is great food, my son who worked at Sheraton used to bring this kind of food home sometime back," said one elderly man.

Mother Theresa has 55 and 25 elderly women and men. The eldest is 102 years old but it is the story of how these people ended at the Roman Catholic premise that is most striking. There are 18 permanent workers who take care

of the elderly while six sisters run the charity organization. A senior sister who works at the home who declined to disclose her name to The Zimbabwe Mail said most of the old people at Mother Theresa were neglected in hospitals by their relatives.

"Most of these elderly people were neglected by their

relatives and left in hospitals. So hospitals approach us asking for a place for people of this kind, and this is how they end up here. Some of these people come from as far as Malawi.

"We also take care of the terminally ill neglected people, for example those suffering from HIV," she said.

Despite being confined and neglected, each one of the people has one thing in common, to live each day that comes,

praise the Lord for it and fight to the last day.

"This is not the first time for us to be here, we have been sourcing goods for this organization after realizing their plight. We are happy that Cresta Group of Hotels came on board by providing lunch for these people, among other goods. The elderly people benefitted towels, blankets and sheets, among other things," said Caleb Jera, President of Lions Club of Harare West.

The Lions Club is an organization that has branches all over the world, and whose objective is to source goods and money for social development.

Mother Theresa Home in Waterfalls has accommodated a number of elderly people in the country. The centre derives its name from the famous philanthropist and care-giver, Mother Theresa of India.

Special appreciation goes to Lion Morgan and Lion Nancy Tembo (couple) who donated all the trophies worth US\$ 1000!




