Whereas at the Multiple District 22 Council of Governor's (COG) meeting on Sunday, March 4,

2018, the Council voted to spend some of the unencumbered funds in the General Administrative Fund;

Whereas at the Multiple District 22 Council of Governor's (COG) special meeting on Thursday, March 29, the Council voted to present this resolution to the 2018 Multiple District Convention delegates;

Whereas the requirements of the Multiple District Constitution Article V, Section 6e and By-Laws Article II, Section 1g, 1l and 1k have been followed; and

Whereas the delegates of the 2018 Multiple District Convention by majority vote of those voting at the second Sub-District business meetings are being asked to approve the following:

Be it Resolved:

That each District in the Multiple will receive a total grant of \$5,000.00 to be used for the specific purposes as listed in items 1 and 2 below.

1) Each District in the Multiple will receive a \$2,000.00 grant for the specific purpose of membership recruitment and retention and programs such as Lions 101 and New Member Orientation as determined by each District's Global Action Team (GAT).

2) Each District in the Multiple will receive a \$3,000.00 grant for the specific purpose of using the funds for Public Relations in a manner to be determined by each District's Global Action Team (GAT).

Be it Further Resolved:

Each District's 2017-2018 Governor will work with their respective Cabinets to manage these funds.

22-B Charitable Foundation Exists

Yes, 22-B does have a Charitable Foundation. It provides funds to clubs, a collection of clubs, or zones to help with community projects when extra funds are needed. The Foundation will provide up to 50% of the cost of a project which includes Lions active involvement. As an example, the Kent Island and Queenstown Lions Clubs recently received a grant for \$500 for a community youth project in Queen Anne's County.

There are two ways you can help with the Foundation. First, apply for a grant to help with your Lions project. Consider a Lions Legacy Project to help celebrate our 100 years as Lions. Funds are available. The application form for grants can be found in this newsletter.

The other way to help is by donating to the Foundation. A good way to do this is by recognizing a Lion or a community leader with a Darley Travers Fellowship. They come in four levels: Basic Pin at \$100, Sapphire Pin at \$250, Ruby Pin at \$500, and Diamond Pin at \$1000. The Diamond level also includes a distinctive plaque. The required donation for the pins is cumulative. For example, a recipient of a Basic Pin may upgrade to Sapphire for an additional \$150. To date, we have awarded 70 Basic Pins, 6 Sapphire Pins, 1 Ruby Pin, and 16 Diamond Pins. Any club will also receive special recognition when they become a 100% Darley Travers Fellow club. Thus far, Salisbury Metro Lions Club has received this distinction.



- The International PU-101 Form (New Club Officer report for Lioness) must be mailed (post marked) or filed on-line by April 30, 2017.
- 3. Must attend or be represented at three (3) Zone meetings.
- 4. President, Secretary and Treasurer must attend, or be represented at the New Officer Training
- or complete the on-line training. Additional credit will be given for doing both
- 5. Coordinate work hours per activity with King Lion.
- Must submit a list of Club Delegates and Alternates for the MD22 Convention to the Cabinet Secretary no later than April 15, 2018. Submit a negative report in the event no delegates are attending.

AWARDS FOR LIONESS CLUBS

The awards for Lioness Clubs will be the same as for Lions Clubs, except:

- 1. The requirement to submit reports to Lions Clubs International is not required.
- Submit the New Officer Report (PU101) to District Governor and the Cabinet Secretary no later than April 30, 2018 but not to Lions Clubs International.



This should be a fun evening - come out and help us celebrate.














Somerset Intermediate/ Crisfield Academy/High Leo Clubs





